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U.S. Army Corps of Engineers seeks public comments on Phase II Engineering Evaluation and Cost Analysis for Camp Sibert cleanup

Gadsden, Ala. – The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers invites the public to review and comment on the Phase II Engineering Evaluation and Cost Analysis for the cleanup of Camp Sibert, a formerly used defense site near Gadsden, Ala., that the military used for chemical weapons training during World War II.

In Phase II, the corps investigated eight chemical weapons and munitions sites and recommended removal action for Site 2A, a decontamination training area and suspected contaminated material burial site. The EE/CA can only recommend a final remedy for a removal action. Site 2 qualifies for removal action, therefore, it was recommended.

The Phase II EE/CA report is available for review in the government documents section of the Gadsden Public Library.

“The Engineering Evaluation and Cost Analysis, more commonly referred to as an EE/CA, explains what has been discovered, what the proposals are for cleaning up specific sites and what the cleanup will cost,” said E. Patrick Robbins, Mobile District public affairs officer.

“It is important for us to share this information with the public so everyone knows what the situation is and to get input from the public on the proposals,” Robbins continued. “We encourage anyone who has an interest to review the document and provide comments. Their comments will be considered in the final decision-making process.”
