Walter F. George Lake Hunting Regulations

1. A permit is required to hunt Corps of Engineers managed property at Walter F. George Lake and may be obtained from the Resource Management Office in Ft. Gaines, Georgia. The state of Georgia manages several leased areas on the lake, for information on these areas contact the Georgia Department of Natural Resources, Wildlife Resources Division in Albany at (229) 430-4256. For permits and other information pertaining to the Eufaula National Wildlife Refuge, contact the Refuge Manager at (334) 687-4065.
2. **All state and federal hunting regulations and seasons apply in addition to Corps of Engineers regulations. Hunter orange must be worn (size prescribed by each state) while deer hunting in each state, including archery seasons.** Hunters under the age of 16 must be accompanied and closely supervised by a responsible adult. It is the responsibility of the permit holder to be familiar with the Corps regulations contained herein, as well as any state and federal regulations as applicable.
3. With the exception of alligator hunting, night hunting is prohibited on Corps managed property.
4. With the exception of waterfowl retrieval, hunting of any kind with dogs is prohibited on Corps managed property.
5. Baiting is not allowed on Corps managed property.
6. Off-road operation, driving around a barricade, and the operation of any non-licensed vehicles, such as motorcycles and **all-terrain vehicles to include four wheelers and three wheelers are prohibited on Corps managed property. DO NOT BLOCK GATES AND ENTRANCES!**
7. No hunting or shooting is permitted within 300 feet of any dock, dwelling, business, church, school, recreation area, dam, powerhouse, or public road.
8. Only climbing, ladder, or other temporary stands that are not permanently attached to trees are allowed. Stands must be removed from Corps managed property when not occupied.
9. **Hunting is permitted ONLY in those "Hunting Areas" specified below in this regulation and, from boat only, for waterfowl on the waters of Walter F. George Lake at least 600 feet distant from docks, structures, vessels, roads, public parks, and other developed areas such as subdivisions. Hunting is prohibited on all Corps "fringe" lands outside of the specified "Hunting Areas".**
10. No hunting is permitted on Corps managed property at Lake George W. Andrews.
11. The Corps of Engineers property line is designated by 4-inch **RED BANDS** painted on trees or posts facing the property line. More information on this line may be obtained at the Corps of Engineers Resource Management Office in Ft. Gaines, Georgia. Permission to cross private property to reach adjacent Corps property can only be granted by the property owner.
12. **Failure to comply with any of the above conditions may result in permanent revocation or restrictions of hunting privileges on Corps managed property.**
13. At the conclusion of the spring turkey hunting season, the hunter survey must be submitted to the Resource Management Office. **Failure to complete and turn in the hunter survey may result in revocation of hunting privileges for future permits. The survey may be mailed or filled out online. (See web address at the bottom of page 2)**

14. BIG GAME:

- A. Big game hunting is limited to archery only.
- B. Deer and turkey are classified as “big game.”

15. SMALL GAME:

A. Small game hunters may use shotguns or archery. Only the use and possession of shotgun ammunition loaded with No. 6 shot or smaller is permitted. **TURKEYS ARE NOT CONSIDERED SMALL GAME.**

- B. Small game includes dove, quail, rabbits, and squirrels.
- C. Trapping is not permitted on Corps managed property.
- D. Hunting, chasing, harassing, or killing of bear, beaver, coyote, fox, opossum, raccoon, mountain lion (cougar), ground hog, otter, mink, skunk, bobcat, and all non-game wildlife is prohibited on Corps managed property.

16. FERAL HOGS:

- A. Feral hogs are no longer classified as big game on Corps managed lands in Alabama and Georgia.
- B. Feral hogs may be taken by small game hunters using small game shotgun ammunition or archery, by waterfowl hunters using waterfowl ammunition, and by big game hunters using archery only.

17. WATERFOWL HUNTING:

- A. Waterfowl hunting is permitted in the specified “Hunting Areas” and, from boats only, on lake waters at least 600 feet from docks, structures, vessels, roads, public parks, and other developed areas such as subdivisions.
- B. Waterfowl hunting from land is prohibited outside of the specified “Hunting Areas.”
- C. All annual seasons, limits and non-toxic shot requirements apply according to state and/or federal regulations. All waterfowl hunters age 16 and older are required to have a Federal Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp (duck stamp), Harvest Information Permit (H.I.P), and State Waterfowl Conservation Permit (duck stamp) in their possession, in addition to their state hunting license. Regulations vary for Georgia and Alabama.
- D. State boundaries are delineated by the green buoys which mark the west side of the river channel.

18. ALLIGATOR HUNTING:

Alligator hunting is to be conducted in accordance with all applicable state and federal regulations.

HUNTING AREAS:

1. SOUTH HUNTING AREA, HIGHLAND: 354 acres in east central Henry County, AL, located north of Henry County Road 46, east of Henry County Road 97, south of Highland Park, and is bordered on the east by Walter F. George Lake.
2. SOUTH HUNTING AREA, DAM SITE: 169 acres in east central Henry County, AL, located north of Henry County Road 46, west of Powerhouse Road, and south of the dam and dike.
3. GRAVEL POINT AREA: 103 acres in west-central Clay County, GA, located west of GA Hwy 39, west of Loki Drive and south of Gravel Point Road.
4. NORTH HUNTING AREA, HATCHECHUBBEE CREEK NORTH: 51 acres in southeast Russell County, AL, located north of Hatchechubbee Creek and West of AL Hwy 165.
5. NORTH HUNTING AREA, HATCHECHUBBEE CREEK SOUTH: 58 acres in Southeast Russell County, AL, located south of Hatchechubbee Creek and West of AL Hwy 165.
6. NORTH HUNTING AREA, FRINGE: 89 acre strip north of GA Hwy 39 Spur, bordering the east bank of the Chattahoochee River.
7. CENTRAL AREA: 123 acres in southwest Stewart County, GA located north of Rood Creek.
