The Memphis Depot Public Comment Meeting was held at 6:00 p.m. on August 15, 2002, at the South Memphis Senior Citizen's Center located at 1620 Marjorie, Memphis, Tennessee. The attendance list is attached.

### WELCOME AND INTRODUCTION

| 1  | MS. MOORE: | Good evening. Can I have everyone's attention, please. We are       |

| 4  |            | on Dunn Field. I trust that you have an agenda that we have         |
| 5  |            | provided for you, as well as a copy of the presentation. And if you |
| 6  |            | do not have this quick reference fact sheet, we have some available |
| 7  |            | for you entitled "Conducting non-time-critical removal actions      |
| 8  |            | under CERCLA (Comprehensive Environmental Response,                 |
| 9  |            | Compensation, and Liability Act)." We have that handout for you     |
| 10 |            | as well, so, you need to get that. Adrienne will be handing one out |
| 11 |            | to you and she's coming up with some now.                           |

| 13 |            | My name is Alma Moore, and I'm the community relations              |
| 14 |            | specialist here at the Memphis Depot. Well, not here, but over at   |

| 14 |            | Turpin Ballard, regulator from EPA (Environmental Protection         |
| 15 |            | Agency), Jim Morrison, our regulator from the Tennessee              |
| 16 |            | Department of Environment and Conservation, Bruce Railey,            |
| 17 |            | Program Manager, who is with the Corps of Engineers in               |
| 18 |            | Huntsville, Trevor Diggins from Frontline and Adrienne Hill with     |
| 19 |            | Frontline.   |

| 21 |            | And, of course, we have a court reporter here. We ask that all       |
| 22 |            | that the presenters speak slowly and any public comments, when       |
| 23 |            | we get to that period, if you will please speak slowly.              |

| 26 |            | meetings before. It is not an opportunity to allow for answers to    |
| 27 |            | questions. We are here to provide the information from the BCT       |
| 28 |            | (Base Cleanup Team) regarding a cleanup alternative, to ask for      |
| 29 |            | points of clarification and to provide an opportunity for the public |

| 8  | MS. MOORE:    | First I would like to introduce our presenter from CH2M Hill,        |
| 9  |               | David Nelson. David Nelson is a professional geologist who was       |
| 10 |               | trained at the University of Georgia. He's worked in the CERCLA      |
| 11 |               | process for eight years. He's been a project manager for CH2M        |
| 12 |               | Hill for two years. He's married, and he's the father of a two and a |
| 13 |               | half month old daughter. Her name is Georgia. David has been at      |
| 14 |               | Depot meetings before with Steve Offner.                             |

| 16 |               | Steve is out of town, and David Nelson will present to us for the    |
| 17 |               | first time. So, please give David Nelson your attention as he        |
| 18 |               | makes the presentation, and there will be points of clarification    |
| 19 |               | after the presentation. Thank you.                                   |

| 21 | MR. NELSON:   | All right, thank you, Alma. Our presentation tonight is regarding    |
| 22 |               | Site 60 on Dunn Field, also known as the former pistol range. We     |
| 23 |               | are going to be discussing an Engineering Evaluation Cost            |
| 24 |               | Analysis (EE/CA) of Site 60.   |
| 25 |               |  |
| 26 |               | Presentation overview: basically what is an EE/CA? Why do we         |
| 27 |               | need this EE/CA? The EE/CA process: we're also going to look at      |
| 28 |               | a site location map of Site 60.                                      |
| 29 |               |  |
| 30 |               | We'll discuss the removal action objectives, describe the preferred  |
| 31 |               | cleanup alternative for Site 60, describe the schedule of activities |

| 1  |             | and also describe how the community can be involved and how to         |

| 4  |             | What is an EE/CA? The EE/CA is known as an Engineering                 |
| 5  |             | Evaluation Cost Analysis or, as it says there, the acronym is          |
| 6  |             | EE/CA. The EE/CA basically describes environmental conditions          |
| 7  |             | of an area, in this case, Site 60 in the Northeast Open Area of Dunn   |
| 8  |             | Field.   |
| 9  |             |  |
| 10 |             | The EE/CA provides a recommended cleanup alternative. The              |
| 11 |             | EE/CA goes through and describes alternatives, and after               |
| 12 |             | describing each one and the methods, as well as costs associated       |
| 13 |             | with that, it selects or recommends which is the preferred             |
| 14 |             | alternative.   |
| 15 |             |  |
| 16 | MR. NELSON: | The EE/CA is part of a non-time-critical or early removal action.      |
| 17 |             | This is in the CERCLA guidance for removal actions. There are          |
| 18 |             | three types. The Site 60 one happens to fall under a non-time-         |
| 19 |             | critical, and in this case is in advance of the Dunn Field Proposed    |
| 20 |             | Plan. Currently, Dunn Field is in the Feasibility Study phase. The     |
| 21 |             | next step would be the Proposed Plan. As I said, the EE/CA comes       |
| 22 |             | from a CERCLA guidance. The requirements for an EE/CA are              |
| 23 |             | under CERCLA, as well as the NCP (National Contingency Plan).          |
| 24 |             |  |
| 25 |             | So, why is an EE/CA necessary? Well, the Dunn Field Risk               |
| 26 |             | Assessment, which is part of the Remedial Investigation which was      |
| 27 |             | finalized in July of this year, concluded that the surface soil in the |
| 28 |             | Northeast Open Area, is safe for residential recreation, basically,    |
| 29 |             | for an unrestricted use, except for the former Site 60 or the former   |
| 30 |             | pistol range known as Site 60.   |
| 31 |             |  |

One sample out of the six that were collected in this area did not 1 meet the criteria -- the screening criteria for lead, which basically 2 meant that that site would not be available for unrestricted use. 3 The BCT, after reviewing the Risk Assessment, recommended that the soil containing lead be removed so that the unrestricted use of 5 the site could proceed. This was based on their findings or the finding in the Risk Assessment as well as the RI. 7 8 The EE/CA process is made up of nine steps, and we're now in 9 step five. These are the first four steps (Indicating) which we've 10 11 already moved through. Step five is the public comment period, which is what we're in now. The public comment period began on 12 13 July 25th and will end next Friday, not tomorrow, but a week from 14 tomorrow. 15 MR. NELSON: 16 The public meeting is tonight, and the EE/CA is available, as Alma 17 mentioned, in the Depot's Information Repositories. 18 Following the public comment period, an Action Memorandum 19 will be produced. This Action Memorandum, basically, outlines 20 21 the removal plan for Site 60. The Action Memorandum includes a 22 Responsiveness Summary, which is basically an answer to any 23 comments that were received on the EE/CA from the public. 24 25 The Removal Action implementation will follow the Action 26 Memorandum. This implementation basically describes what is 27 going to happen at Site 60 as far as any remedial activities. 28 Steps eight and nine are the EE/CA process, the Removal Site 29 Closeout. Once the EE/CA or once the Removal Action has been 30 completed, any remaining activities such as, in this case, surface

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regrading and seeding of the excavation areas will take place.

And then, finally, the step nine is Post Removal Site Control. The 2 only site control necessary for Site 60 will be just the Removal 3 Action report. All material will be removed, and the site will be 4 available for unrestricted use. 5 This is an aerial photograph of Dunn Field. As you can see in the 7 left-hand portion of that square, there's a forested area. That's the 8 old bullet stop area of the pistol range. To the right, kind of near 9 the arrow, is the firing range where everyone stood to shoot their 10 guns, over to the left in this case (Indicating). 11 12 This is the Northeast Open Area of Dunn Field. There is a road at MR. NELSON: 13 the top of Dunn Field, and that is Person Avenue. And then Hays 14 Road is to the right of Dunn Field there (Indicating). So, the 15 removal action objectives in this case are to ensure ongoing 16 protection of the environment and the community. We also want 17 to restore the soil to safe conditions for future unrestricted use, and 18 while doing this, of course, comply with all federal, state and local 19 requirements and minimize the volume of materials that have to be 20 removed from the site. 21 22 The removal action should also be, and in this case is, utilizing the 23 most efficient and cost effective cleanup. The way that was done 24 25 was to look at what has been done -- what has gone on at the Depot before in similar EE/CA activities. And, in this case, we have the 26 experiences learned from Sites 35 and 28 on the Main Installation 27 as well as Building 949 on the Main Installation - similar 28 29 contaminants, surface soil contaminants and removing those -- or conducted using what's known as dig-and-haul. That's the slang 30

term for excavation and removal.

| 2   |             | One of the removal action objectives, of course, is to minimize any    |
| 3   |             | long-term maintenance or monitoring requirements. Well, in this        |
| 4   |             | case, once the soil is excavated, there are no long-term               |
| 5   |             | requirements necessary because anything that would have created a      |
| 6   |             | hazard would be removed.   |
| 7   |             |  |
| 8   |             | The BCT recommended, after reviewing the objectives for the            |
| 9   |             | removal action, that the surface soil does not meet the risk-based     |
| 10  |             | screening criteria to be removed. And in this once this is             |
| 11  |             | completed, the alternative would meet the objectives as we             |
| 12  |             | described earlier - technically feasible, cost is reasonable and       |
| 13  |             | acceptable, and would meet the risk-based cleanup criteria.            |
| 14  |             |  |
| 15  | MR. NELSON: | The removal action steps are very common for a dig-and-haul            |
| 16  |             | project. As I said, they were used on Sites 35 and 28 and were         |
| 17  |             | used again on Building 949. These include, for Site 60,                |
| 18  |             | specifically, clear and removal of the trees that have gown up over    |
| 19  |             | the years since the facility hasn't been used.                         |
| 20  |             |  |
| 21  |             | There are sites excuse me. There are areas A through G that are        |
| 22  |             | going to be cleaned up in this former Site 60 area. Area C, which      |
| 23  |             | is the former bullet stop area, will have 24 inches of soil removed,   |
| 24  |             | the thinking being that the bullets would travel into the dirt further |
| 25  |             | there. In all the other areas we will remove up to 12 inches of soil.  |
| 26  |             |  |
| 27  |             | Also, there is a building associated with the firing range and some    |
| 28  |             | other target posts and other debris that will be removed as well.      |
| 29  |             | Confirmatory sampling or confirmation sampling will take place in      |
| 30  |             | all the excavated pits as well as walls, just to make sure that the    |
| 3 1 |             | lead that's above the criteria will be removed                         |

After the excavations, after confirmation is returned that the 1 excavations are clean, so to speak, the slopes will be graded and 2 excavated areas will be replaced with clean backfill. 3 4 Engineering controls would be executed to minimize any dust 5 generation as well as manage any storm water that is generated. 6 Another engineering control would be -- that's usually taken in 7 these projects is to use dust covers on trucks that will be removing 8 the soil from the site, using water basically to spray down the 9 excavated areas and also the soil once it's removed from 10 excavation. There are various methods, and they will all be 11 employed to make sure dust is not generated and storm water 12 doesn't leave the site. And, finally, any of the soil that is excavated 13 will be transported and disposed of at licensed facilities. 14 15 16 MR. NELSON: Scheduled activities: During the summer of 2002 the Site 60 EE/CA document has been developed and is available, as Alma 17 said, in the Information Repositories. The public comment period 18 19 we are now in. The public comment meeting is tonight. 20 During the fall of 2002, the Site 60 Action Memorandum will be 21 22 developed, which includes a Responsiveness Summary to any 23 public comments. The Removal Action Work Plan will be 24 developed, and the removal action at Site 60 will take place. I think that based on previous experience in removal actions, it will 25 26 probably take about one month to complete. 27 28 In the winter of 2002 any remaining activities will be completed. and the Removal Action Report will be developed. Community 29 30 involvement in this case involves a public comment period, as I 31 stated earlier. It is now in progress. We started on July 25th and

| 1  |               | will be completed on August 23rd. The EE/CA is available at            |

| 4  |               | The Responsiveness Summary in the Action Memorandum, which             |
| 5  |               | will follow the public comment period, is also going to be             |
| 6  |               | available in the Information Repositories. Information is provided     |
| 7  |               | in the EnviroNews newsletter for the Memphis Depot. A Removal          |
| 8  |               | Action Report will be available also in the Information                |
| 9  |               | Repositories, as well as reference material. In this case, there is    |
| 10 |               | the guidance document called "The guidance on conducting non-          |
| 11 |               | time-critical removal actions under CERCLA." As Alma                   |
| 12 |               | mentioned, there is a quick fact sheet on that document available      |
| 13 |               | tonight.   |
| 14 |               |  |
| 15 |               | And if you would like to submit any public comments, that can be       |
| 16 |               | done in writing, mail, fax or email or you can call Clyde Hunt at      |
| 17 |               | the phone number listed above. If you would prefer to mail them,       |
| 18 |               | his address is there. The phone and fax number is provided, and        |
| 19 |               | his email address is listed at the bottom of the slide here            |
| 20 |               | (Indicating). And, actually, I think that's the last slide. So that is |
| 21 |               | the end of the presentation.   |
| 22 | MS. MOORE:    | Are there any points of clarification from any community               |
| 23 |               | members? Do you need any points of clarification? Not any public       |
| 24 |               | comments? If you would come to the microphone and state your           |
| 25 |               | name, and we'll be glad to clarify.                                    |
| 26 | MR. WILLIAMS: | Okay, a couple of points of clarification here. First of all, you said |
| 27 |               | that Site 60 is the only restricted area. Am I right? All right, point |
| 28 |               | of clarification: Are we saying that everything else over in Dunn      |
| 29 |               | Field is all right? Because you're saying 60 is the only area that we  |
| 30 |               | have to deal with at the present time. So, once we do that,            |
| 31 |               | everything is A-okay. That's a point of clarification.                 |

| 1        | MR. NELSON:   | Site 60 is the only area in the Northeast Open Area of Dunn Field   |
|----------|---------------|---|
| 2        |               | that requires this action. The EE/CA covers Site 60.  |
| 3        | MR. WILLIAMS: | You missed the point.   |
| 4        | MR. HUNT:     | Okay, just to provide some clarity to your question. This evening   |
| 5        |               | we're addressing only the Northeast portion of Dunn Field, which  |
| 6        |               | is Site 60.   |
| 7        | MR. WILLIAMS; | Yes, I understand but   |
| 8        | MR. HUNT:     | We're not addressing anything else.   |
| 9        | MR. WILLIAMS: | I understand, but in here he said somewhere in here I didn't  |
| 10       |               | just put a mark on it, but somewhere he said in here that that was  |
| 11       |               | the only restricted area. So, that's the reason I brought that up. He   |
| 12       |               | said that was the only restricted area, and once that was done, then  |
| 13       |               | there would be no other restricted area. That's the reason I brought  |
| 14       |               | it up. Point of clarification.  |
| 15       | MS. MOORE:    | Anymore points of clarification? (Brief pause.)   |

| 22 |             | David Nelson, our presenter from CH2M Hill on this evening,          |
| 23 |             | made a presentation and provided time for clarification of the       |

| 4  |                 | I would like to open the mike for comments. We welcome you at         |
| 5  |                 | this time.  |
| 6  | MR. WILLIAMS:   | Mondell Williams. A little earlier you stated about managing the      |
| 7  |                 | storm drains and the runoff of the water from Site 60. My thing is    |
| 8  |                 | during previous presentations we discussed runoffs coming to that     |
| 9  |                 | area. So, have we solved the problem of the runoffs that's coming     |
| 10 |                 | from other private lots that's running onto this area? Since, at one  |
| 11 |                 | time it was discussed that the contamination was not part of the      |
| 12 |                 | area that's being taken care of. It was that other private properties |
| 13 |                 | had water or had the contamination flow coming from another           |
| 14 |                 | piece of property onto this property. And I was just wondering        |
| 15 |                 | will that be contained as well when we contain or manage the          |
| 16 |                 | storm drains and the soils to keep it from blowing when we remove     |
| 17 |                 | it from the Dunn Field Site 60.                                       |
| 18 | MR. HUNT:       | Thank you for your comment.   |
| 19 | MS. DORIS BRADS | SHAW: I'm Doris Bradshaw, president of the Defense Depot              |
| 20 |                 | Memphis, Tennessee Concerned Citizens. I know that you are            |
| 21 |                 | trying to focus on Site 60, but I don't know what you're going to     |
| 22 |                 | focus on the whole Dunn Field, period. And I know that you want       |
| 23 |                 | us to maintain our comments just for Site 60, but you know I work     |
| 24 |                 | on both sides of the line. Because I'm going to talk about the        |
| 25 |                 | whole area. Because this is my concern.                               |
| 26 |                 |   |
| 27 |                 | Lead is a dangerous element that is in the earth on Dunn Field. I'm   |
| 28 |                 | wondering if DLA, the Defense Logistic Agency, is going to do a       |
| 29 |                 | sloppy cleanup like they did with the mustard gas soil when they      |
| 80 |                 | laid it out in the open with just open parts and the wind hit this    |

| 1  | dust, and when they came and got the dirt on trucks that was not          |

| 4  | I want to know if you're going to use containment tents in the            |
| 5  | process of the cleanup, and how are you going to protect the kids         |
| 6  | from just any molecule of lead? Because our body is already over          |
| 7  | burdened with all types of chemicals in that area.                        |

| 9  | MS. DORIS BRADSHAW: Now, you want to focus on one chemical. I'm wondering |
| 10 | about all the other chemicals that lies around in that area. Why are      |
| 11 | you trying to get rid of just the lead? I know I wasn't here for the      |
| 12 | presentation, but I read the material that you sent out. I want to        |
| 13 | know that I want to be reassured that the children in that area is        |
| 14 | going to be protected from any cleanup of lead or any other type of       |
| 15 | chemical. And how are you going to do that?                               |
| 16 |   |
| 17 | Now, you said you didn't want to address any questions tonight,           |
| 18 | but I want these questions answered before I say yeah or nay that         |
| 19 | this is okay. And I think that our community would feel secure if         |
| 20 | they know that this is not going to be another sloppy cleanup.            |
| 21 |   |
| 22 | I read also in that little pamphlet where Jan Reitman got an award        |
| 23 | for some little old stuff that DLA has been doing as far as the           |
| 24 | Brownfields section, but I want you to know that none of these            |
| 25 | communities throughout the country that is dealing with DLA, the          |
| 26 | Defense Logistic Agency, is not happy with these cleanups. And I          |
| 27 | feel like that's just that's not a good thing, to make people             |
| 28 | believe that something is going on so well, and it's not.                 |
| 9  |   |
| 0  | Because you don't see the bad side in the newsletters. Like one           |
| 1  | side of the information that you sent us everything is all rosy and       |

good, and we have had problems after problems with the mustard gas soil. We had problems after problems with the dieldrin cleanup, and now even -- I don't even know if you cleaned up the metal buildings that was over there that you was supposed to sandblast. I don't even know if you all even thought to look at what is happening while you're doing the cleanup.

MS. D. BRADSHAW: The first time you put a shovel in Dunn Field, five people on one

BRADSHAW: The first time you put a shovel in Dunn Field, five people on one street died. I don't know if it came from Dunn Field or what. It was birds that died over in that area. DLA never did address these issues. Now they're going to expose the children again to dirty lead, and knowing that black youth, black children, black boys, period, can't stand the body burden of lead period. They act worse than any other child. They react in school. They have all types of learning disorders from lead.

And I want to know are you going to put a containment tent over this stuff while you're doing it or what are you going to do? Then I would be satisfied.

And I feel like when you do these announcements, we have told people over and over -- Alma, I'm not going to attack how you get the message out, but I have been asking around to see if people got the announcements at the church. Because I know that's one of the things that you normally do is send out the flyers and stuff. But make sure of that when this is happening. I think that we need 30 more days, maybe 90 days for people -- it takes y'all years to get this information together, and then you're going to give the community 30 days to read this mess after it took you two or three years to put a packet together and then tell us to "Look over this."

You've got 30 days to remember this or understand this language," 1 and then expect us to talk intelligently on the matter. 2 3 Now, it's not just DLA. It's all the government agencies. When you prepare all these different materials, the community needs just 5 as long as it took you to write it. And I think that would be fair, 6 that we have just as much time as it took you to write it for us to 7 look over this material. And, believe me, I'm asking for 90 more 8 days so that we can dissect this material so that we can understand 9 what this is about, and we call the community meeting on our own. 10 Because you calling the community meeting, it's not going to 11 work. It never has worked, and I don't know what's going through 12 your mind. I guess you don't want it to work when we say it 13 doesn't matter. Because that's how I feel. Because you keep 14 continuing to do the same thing over and over. Thank you. 15 Thank you for your comment. Just as a reminder to everyone, our MR. HUNT: 16 public comment period began on July 25, 2002 and it will end on 17 August 23, 2002 and there are several ways to provide your 18 comments. You may either provide your comment on this evening 19 or you can write it to me or fax or call. 20 MS. MARQUITA BRADSHAW: My name is Marquita Bradshaw, and I know the 21 effects of lead as far as children. I know several day cares around 22 that site, not only just the children, but the adults that live in close 23 proximity of that site. 24 25 I understand that this would be the same process, basically, that 26 was used before in cleaning up the mustard gas. I want to make a 27 comment on some of the health affects that have been seen within 28 the community. We have had -- as soon as any type of excavation 29 of any type of materials are moved from the Depot, we see it in the 30 community instantaneously through people that are already sick 31

because their body -- their resistence levels are already low, and so 1 it wipes out many people in the community at a time. And you can 2 see the effects on the streets, and the ambulance and the police 3 department. Because once -- you know, once somebody calls 911 because they are dead, you see the pattern on the streets. 5 6 MS. M. BRADSHAW: And the ambulances and the fire departments become frequent in 7 our neighborhood when these excavations happen. And we begin 8 to see the pattern that's set forth each and every time you start to 9 dig at Dunn Field or anywhere else over there, any type of 10 excavation. Whether it's to put new power lines or anything on that 11 site, it causes havoc on human life. Among the living some of the 12 health affects from the excavation of dirt over there has caused, 13 between just my friends, within real close proximity, maybe 14 walking distance, like across the street wise, as far as the women's 15 health affects is excessive bleeding every time any type of -- with 16 the DLA and the mustard gas, excessive bleeding, and with the 17 18 lead, also. I'm sure it's going to attack the reproductive system just as the other things before, not only the mental affect that is has on 19 the children. Because you cannot reverse the process of the brain 20 damage associated with lead. 21

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And I brought this up when we first started talking about lead removal. I had the opportunity to be present at that meeting, and I asked will the children's health be -- and he assured me that it would be some type of containment.

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The containment that you have used before has not worked, and we cannot afford to do that again. Because the human life toll has just gotten too far. And people shouldn't have to live each and every day afraid about what's going on over there on that Depot, when

somebody is trying to restore it and give the land over to somebody 1 else. 2 3 And there's 290 other chemicals that no one has ever talked about besides the three chemicals that you're removing, and the 5 byproducts from those chemicals and how they affect human life. 6 It's just not lead over there in that dirt. Have you even thought 7 about the workers that would be coming over there who the work 8 would be contracted out, where people are not in HAZMAT suits 9 that come over there and risk their lives, and they are trying to 10 provide for their children, and they may not go home? 11 12 And for this process to go on, you have to reassure us that this 13 process will be done correctly. And the community needs to be 14 evacuated. Those schools do not need to be in operation when this 15 happens. Because we cannot afford for any mistakes to happen. 16 And with y'all's law, anything that will go wrong will absolutely go 17 wrong, in my own terms, it will happen. Thank you very much. 18 You need to assure the community that nothing else will happen to 19 our health and our lives. 20 Thank you for your comment. Any comment that you have on this MR. HUNT: 21 evening, we ask that you deal specifically with the cleanup 22 alternative that's presented in the EE/CA relating to the removal of 23 soil containing lead at the former pistol range on Dunn Field. 24 Do you have anymore comments? 25 Ms. Joy Brown. I'm 53 years old, and if anybody is familiar with MS. BROWN: 26 Father Bertrand High School, it's called Sandusky High School 27 now. I went all the way through high school at Father Bertrand, 28 and I graduated in 1967. And Father Bertrand is not – it's up near 29 Hamilton, which is not too far from the Army Depot and the 30 problems that you're talking about. 31

| 1  |            | When we grew up, it was an area over near the Depot that had           |

| 2  |            | tents on top of it with bombs up under there. And when I was a         |
| 3  |            | teenager, we were not allowed to go in that area because our           |
| 4  |            | parents said that it was a lot of people leaving hexes and things like |
| 5  |            | that. And they just said that it was a lot of people dying over there  |
| 6  |            | from cancer and all kinds of things.                                   |

| 8  | MS. BROWN: | At the time, we didn't know about the chemicals in that area. It's     |
| 9  |            | been there since World War II, and there's no way that you're          |
| 10 |            | going to be able to clean lead or that gas or whatever is out of there |
| 11 |            | in ten years or twenty years. After every year that that stuff has     |
| 12 |            | been over there, I would put about maybe 50 years into one of          |
| 13 |            | those chemicals, and we're still not going to have the land back.      |
| 14 |            |  |
| 15 |            | And as far as mother earth is concerned, I'm not worried about         |
| 16 |            | mother earth. She takes care of herself. She will take care of         |
| 17 |            | herself. It's the people that are running these things over there      |
| 18 |            | that's messing it up. What about the people that worked at the         |
| 19 |            | Army Depot? Have y'all ever asked about how many people died           |
| 20 |            | of cancer? I know three of them. One of them is a neighbor of          |
| 21 |            | mine, and he was sick for years.                                       |

| 23 |            | And what about the people that live around there or the people that    |
| 24 |            | went to school there who have moved to Timbuktu? And they died         |
| 25 |            | from certain cancers and stuff. I have five children, two adopted      |
| 26 |            | and three birth children. Neither one of my birth children will be     |
| 27 |            | able to have children. So that tells me I'm dead. When my last         |
| 28 |            | child dies, I'm gone. My husband is gone.                              |

| 30 |            | Now, back and forth, it's all about money. We all know that's what     |
| 31 |            | it is and it's like this: Vou're not going to do anything about it     |

You're going to patch it up like putting a Band-Aid on a three-inch 1 wound that's in your throat. It's not going to do any good. 2 3 Now, we're all on one side or another. Nobody is straddling the 4 fence. What we both need to do is straddle the fence. We'll never 5 be able to get rid of those chemicals over there, but try to do 6 something about it now. Because that child who is brain damaged 7 or the person that can't have children or whatever, you don't know what these people will do to you, to me, to anybody. It's going to 9 affect us all. 10 11 What about the people that worked at the Army Depot? It was just 12 MS. BROWN as many white folk over there as was black folks. Y'all dying, too. 13 And black folk is like weeds. We can grow anywhere. 14 15 I'm telling you right now, you better do something about this. I 16 don't know all the big words and all the stuff and everything that 17 y'all know, and some people here look mighty, mighty bored. 18 Some people think it's funny. Some people are here for the money. 19 Some people are here for the real thing, to try to do something 20 about this. Because this is affecting all of us. 21 22 People that lived in the state of Washington, have never been to 23 Memphis in their life, it's affecting them. It's affecting them. So 24 we better get busy and start doing something, trying not to make 25 money off all of this, do something, clean it up. Like my grandma 26 27 said, we should have nipped it in bud, but it's too late now. It's going to take us two, three four hundred years to clean that 28 29 doggone place up, and that's the gospel truth, and y'all better think 30 about this. That's all I've got to say. MR. HUNT: Thank you for your comment. 31

| 14 | MR. WILLIAMS:    | I would like to make another comment. In Site 60 excuse me.         |
| 15 |                  | My name is Mondell Williams, the Community RAB co-chair. My         |
| 16 |                  | question is or my statement is: During the process of Site 60       |
| 17 |                  | where the excavation will be done, my question is how far has the   |
| 18 |                  | water penetrated the soil, and what has been the effects of the     |
| 19 |                  | water with the Memphis Sand, the aquifer? Has the runoff or has     |
| 20 |                  | the water penetrated the soil enough to contaminate the aquifers    |
| 21 |                  | and how do we look toward fresh drinking water or the crack in the  |
| 22 |                  | clay aquifer? Is it anywhere near Site 60? And, basically, what     |

| 24 | MR. HUNT:        | Thank you for your comment.   |
| 25 | MS. DORIS BRADSI | HAW: I didn't know I could come back up.                            |
| 26 | MR. HUNT:        | State your name.  |
| 27 | MS. DORIS BRADSI | HAW: My name is Doris Bradshaw, president of the Defense            |
| 28 |                  | Depot Memphis, Tennessee Concerned Citizen's Committee, also        |
| 29 |                  | community liaison for the Coalition of the Black Trade Unions of    |
| 30 |                  | the Carotene. I want to know is there going to be a land use policy |
| 31 |                  | in place? Because what I'm seeing at the main facility is we were   |

told that when the children -- when you all cleaned up the area that was supposed to be for the homeless people, the buildings that -- where the officers used to stay when they come to Memphis, we were told that you were going to clean up so many inches of the soil. I think it was six inches. And that -- and the question came up "Will there be any gardens? What if the people decide to plant gardens?" And, you know, low and behold I passed by there, and there was a garden and two little boys running around that site. So we were lied to again. Because we were worried about the children kicking up more than six inches of soil.

MS. D. BRADSHAW: Now, it may have stated twelve inches, but I think it was six inches of soil that you were supposed to clean up. How can we be reassured that as you do these cleanups and giving leases to the city, turning leases over to the city, giving land to the city, that the people that you're giving this land to is going to hold accountable to these land use policies?

Now, clean ups are going on all over America on these military sites, but when we're told that there is supposed to be a land use policy -- I may be calling the name wrong, but you know exactly what I'm talking about. How can the communities be reassured that you don't go plant a darn garden over on Dunn Field or you don't start building houses on Dunn Field? Because you said the lead is gone, and there's still 200 and something more chemicals laying over there.

How can the community be reassured that you're not going to give this land to somebody that is going to develop this land and just start digging and exposing us to more chemicals? I want to know how many inches of this soil you're going to dig up, where it's going and where it's going to end up at. And I hope not into another poor black community, as always, like Tunica got one truck load over there, and I don't know where the scrap iron went to. But I did hear on the news that there was radiation on some of the scrap iron, and low and behold, the Defense Depot in Ripley—the Defense Depot was getting rid of scrap metal. So, I don't know if it was yours or somebody else's.

MS. D. BRADSHAW: But we need to know from the cradle to the grave on everything that is done here on the Defense Depot. I'm requesting all information be given to the organization of the Concerned Citizen's Committee, all. I'm tired of asking for information after every report comes out that I've got to ask for another report. Because this is on record. And I get nothing.

I don't feel like I should have to write anyone. Because when the Mid-South Peace and Justice sat on this Board, every document there was, the Mid-South Peace and Justice got those documents. I want it all. I think our organization needs it all to start looking through this and preparing for it so that we can give to the community from the community point of view. That's the only way that we can understand by looking at your reports. Because we can't even make a report. Because we don't have the engineers or the doctors to do it.

If you have the land use form in place, I want to see it, and if this part of the EE/CA -- the E-E-C-A, is that what it's called? The EE/CA? I want to make sure that we have all the information as you go, step by step. Because I don't want to see someone using Dunn Field as farm and giving vegetables to the community. Thank you.
