PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD REGARDING THE EE/CA FOR THE CHEMICAL WARFARE MATERIEL REMOVAL PROJECT AT DUNN FIELD

June 17, 1999 The Memphis Depot "J" Street Cafe, Building 274

The public comment period regarding the Engineering Evaluation and Cost Analysis (EE/CA) for the Chemical Warfare Materiel Removal Project at Dunn Field was held following the Restoration Advisory Board (RAB) meeting and the Technical Presentation meeting at 7:45 p.m., on June 17, 1999 at the Memphis Depot, Memphis, Tennessee, 2163 Airways Boulevard. The attendance list is attached.

PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

1	MR. PHILLIPS	We would like to begin the verbal public comment period. While
2		everyone is getting back to their seat, I'd like to make a little bit of
3		an announcement Like I said, the comments that we're going to
4		hear tonight are very important to us. They are important to the
5		community. The official public comment period goes on until July
6		10th. It may be extended for an additional 30 days upon request
7		At the end of that public comment period, the Defense Logistics
8		Agency (DLA), the lead agency here responsible for responding to
9		the comments, will not necessarily immediately provide or produce
10		the individual responses to the comments. As you saw tonight,
11		many agencies are involved here and some of those agencies might
12		have to respond to a particular question. But they'll send their
13		response to us and we'll provide the response to all the public
14		comments.

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2		This will not be the end of public involvement with this project As
3		we get further down the road as the gentleman said - speakers on
4		duty tonight - as the Site Safety Submission gets to approval and it
5		goes through the last step. I wanted to introduce a gentleman, Dr.
6		Paul Joe from the National Center for Environmental Health which
7		is part of the Health and Human Services. As this Site Safety
8	_ 1.211.2 = Educ + Vietnakkive* e	Submission goes through its review process and the Department of
9		Health and Human Services approves it, that document will become
10		available for public review. I'm sure we will have additional
11		meetings on this - additional discussions at the RAB - meeting as
12		the particulars of the plan and details are solidified. So tonight will
13		not be the only presentations that we make on this issue This is
14		just the beginning. I would like to point that out. The comments
15		should be on the proposed action we're planning on taking which
16		was presented tonight, and with that I would like to turn it over to
17		Beverly. You want to introduce her?
18	MS. MOORE:	Before we get started - we've got lots of conversations going on
19		throughout the room. So everyone please take a seat, or you can
20		step outside if you're not going to listen, so we can gather this
21		information from the public. It's very important that we get this
22		information to make sure we have the questions and comments
23	r	from the community so we can address the concerns and questions
24		of the community. To help us expedite and to make sure that we
25		understand the rules, we contracted a meeting facilitator last month
26 ,		for the public meeting for Parcels 28 and 35, the old paint shop and
27		maintenance area and this month for the CWM removal. You met

1		her husband Howard Robertson, this is the other half - Beverly
2		Robertson.
3		
4		Beverly is a product of the Depot community - from Orange
5		Mound. Beverly's background is in marketing with Holiday Inn
6		when it was based here in Memphis. She's traveled all over the
7		world in marketing and public relations for Holiday Inns. When
8	ar Takkar ar Tariak	Holiday Inns relocated, she and her husband Howard opened their
9		own advertising, public relations and communications firm - Trust
10		Marketing. And along with that in the past year, Beverly has taken
11		on the position of Executive Director of the Civil Rights Museum in
12		Memphis. So all you guys who are visiting, when you make your
13		trip to Memphis, be sure to stop by the Civil Rights Museum. With
14		no further ado, I'll present to you Beverly Robertson, meeting
15		facilitator for tonight's public comment meeting She will explain
16		the process to you. Welcome Beverly, and you all welcome
17		Beverly.
18	MS. ROBERTSON:	Thank you very much, Alma. This public comment period is going
19		to be for the collection of comments relative to the removal action
20		and that certainly is related to the removal of chemical warfare
21		materiel - Dunn Field. If you require any further clarification on
22		the presentation, the Environmental Protection Agency and the
23	•	Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation and its
24		employees and contractors, will be available for a period to talk
25		with you after the comment period is over. You can review the
26		document which is available at the four Information Repositories,
27		and they include Cherokee Library, the Main Library, Memphis and

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couple of areas that I've been personally advised of there's been 1 some dumping of the products buried there They don't seem to be 2 3 highlighted on the map that was shown to us tonight. I think it would be inappropriate to try and say that we're doing a full 4 cleanup if we're not really - not done some test borings, some 5 sample wells or some sample drillings into those areas. And how 6 7 this hasn't been brought to the attention of people who are doing it. I don't know because we seem to bring it up - I personally know I 8 9 brought it up several times. 10 11 So I guess I'm a little offended. Somebody comes here to talk to 12 you today and say what they know about the Defense Depot when we've been making these comments for years. And obviously they 13 14 are not being heard by the right people So readers, hearers of this 15 message, I want you to know that I don't think we have done a 16 thorough enough job evaluating what's really at the Defense Depot 17 - Dunn Field, particularly the area south of the pistol range. The 18 pistol range should be included, and the area west - I'm sorry --19 east of the north end of Dunn Field. The eastern part of Dunn Field 20 is left off the map. So I don't know if that's for future exploration 21 and/or future remediation or what, but I just think we've got to 22 expand the scope. And my concerns are real. I would like something done about it. 23 24 MR. PHILLIPS: Thank you, Mr. Clay. Any additional comments? Ms. Bradshaw? MS. BRADSHAW: 25 I had asked a question earlier about the condition of the bombs. 26 And the gentleman that spoke about the chemical warfare removal

5	1	this, is that we don't know the pros and cons about their work.	
6]	How can we trust this group of men saying we're doing everything	
7	•	we can to ensure your safety. And we have the community do	
8	,	not have a emergency response plan presented to them. We should	
9	1	have got that emergency response plan a year ago. And I feel like	
10		I'm repeating myself over and over again. I haven't got any answers	
11	:	and it doesn't look like I'm going to get any answers	
12			
13]	I feel like that this should have happened way in advance from the	
14	1	time of remediation of these bombs, non-stockpile chemical warfare	
15	1	materiel or whatever you want to call it. But I would like for him	
16	1	to answer my question. Were there any problems on these three	
17	!	sites and he said that he would give us information from the cradle	
18	1	to the grave about these bombs. I know what happened to the	
19	1	bombs and certain data, and I'm very disturbed about it. These	
20	1	bombs went into another black community and they are laying there	
21	:	and sitting there right now in Alabama. So I would like to know in	
22	•	advance what are you going to do with these bombs and are they	
23	E.	going to another community that will be problem to another	yen. Ten
24	·	community? Thank you.	
25	MS. ROBERTSON: T	Thank you very much, Ms. Bradshaw, for your comments. Any	
26	ŧ	additional comments? There were a couple of comments that were	

1		raised on the floor. Those were two Were there any additional
2		comments? Mr Tyler?
3	MR. TYLER	My name is Stanley Tyler. First of all, I would thank everybody for
4		coming out and sitting at the table and putting up with my
5		questions. Thank you very much. My first question is this
6		company, UXB International. What percentage of minority or
7		black participation will you have or they have in the cleanup with
8	,	your company? That is question number one. Question number
9		two; as the cleanup proceeds, will there be access on your Internet
10		site where I'd like to download some of the information to
11		distribute some of the information to the Depot community? That's
12		question number two.
13		•
14		And question number three; the helicopter that will be removing the
15		so-called waste - will there be a flight plan laid out as to what path
16		you're going to fly over, residential, commercial highway with
17		notice so that people in the community have access to it? Number
18		four sorry about all the questions. It's the most important one -
19		the community contingency plan has not been formulated I've been
20		told. But once it's formulated, will the community be able to have
21		access to these mailouts, Internet, television, radio, and some
22		logical response so they won't be like Exxon Valdez? Oil in the
23,		neighborhood - now they're going to clean it up. We want to have
24		clear and concise plans. People in the community need to know
25		that containment contingency plans are there in place so if anything
26		happens, they won't read about it in the Commercial Appeal a day

1		later and have a rush for everybody to find out what happened.
2		Thank you very much.
3	MS. ROBERTSON	Thank you, Mr Tyler. Any additional comments regarding the
4		removal of chemical warfare materiel at Dunn Field? Any
5		additional comments? Any more comments? Well, in response to
6		the comments that have been raised, at the end of the 50 day period
7		there will be a Responsiveness Summary prepared and that
8		summary will be available at those four locations identified. We
9	•	certainly appreciate the comments you have given tonight. And I'm
10		sure that those responses will be forthcoming 50 days from now.
11		Shawn?
12	MR. PHILLIPS:	I would like to say before this meeting is adjourned that we will be
13		here until the end of the 60 minute verbal comment period in case
14		people come in late And if there's no immediate comments right
15		now, we will if the transcriber would like to take a five minute
16		break or whatever, he can do so. Are there additional public
17		comments?
18	MS. BRADSHAW	I might say and put this on record is that people don't like to come
19		up on the Depot. They honestly don't want to come up here, and
20		these type of comment periods should be placed outside the Depot.
21		Because it will be convenient for them to walk to the school and
22		make things kind of accessible to them. I really don't think that
23		people what we're hearing from people is why do you go up on
24		the contaminated Depot? They don't trust the government and
25		don't trust the fact that they have to come up here. They feel like
26		that you're doing something to them when they come up here for a
27		meeting.

1	MS. ROBERTSON	Thank you, Ms. Bradshaw.
2	MR PHILLIPS	It was pointed out to me that how I should technically do this is,
3		say we will go "off-line" until there are other public comments?
4		And what I mean by "off-line" is we will turn off the tape recorder
5		and the transcriptionist will stop. We will monitor the door and if
6		anybody has any additional comments, would you please ask
7		myself, Alma or Ms. Robertson if we could go back on record. But
8	, · · · · · · · · · · · · · · · · · · ·	we will remain here for the duration of the 60 minute hour-long
9		public comment period. Thank you.
