| 1 | welcome, everybody. Good to see you all. |

| 2 | MR. LEVY: He's essentially |
| 3 | hostingus here and is a significant member |
| 4 | of the BRAC process that's been involved in |
| 5 | allthe closure aspects of the Installation |
| 6 | and knows intimately what we are doing |
| 7 | here, as well as what we will be doing in |
| 8 | the cleanup phases. |
| 9 | We're going to start out, |
| 10 | we've got two guest speaker presentations. |
| 11 | As I told you before, we needed to go |
| 12 | through and provide you with information a |
| 13 | it related to the process so that you'll |
| 14 | have a better understanding of where we're |
| 15 | going, why it is we're doing what we're |
| 16 | doing. The two individuals, Gary Harvey, |
| 17 | who is the Base Transition Coordinator for |
| 18 | Fort McClellan and our contractor for the |
| 19 | environmental baseline survey which is a |
| 20 | significantly important document from the |
| 21 | cleanup standpoint, we're going to talk to |
| 22 | you about the process on both of those. |
| 23 | We're not really going to get into cleanup |

| 1 | issues, yet. We've got a lot of different |
|-----|---|
| 2 | things we've got to get through as it |
| 3 | relates to the process. With that, Gary. |
| 4 | MR. HARVEY: Okay, I'm going |
| 5 | to give you a real brief, I'm going to be |
| 6 | up front, it should be brief. I don't wan |
| 7 | to teach you about the base closure |
| 8 | process, but what I do want to do is show |
| 9 | you that there is a process and I've got |
| 10 | slides. Can everybody see that? That |
| 11 | was the commission's recommendation, which |
| 12 | was approved by the Congress and by the |
| 13 | President. You see mainly where Pelham |
| 14 | Range is staying as is on to the National |
| 15 | Guard, moving the polygraph to Fort Jackson |
| 16 | and the chemical to Fort Leavenworth. The |
| 17 | CDTF which is pretty famous around here |
| 18 | operations until such time as replacement |
| 19 | capability is at Leavenworth. Show you |
| 20 | real briefly the migrations, a restatement |
| ,21 | of what you saw before. That, again, is |
| 22 | probably not news to most people in here. |
| 23 | The movement milestones as we go on down, |

| 1 | and I know there is a lot of rumors going |
|----|---|
| 2 | on, but these are the milestones, when the |
| 3 | moving starts, when it completes. Right |
| 4 | now, closure of Fort McClellan is scheduled |
| 5 | at the end of September 1999. Caretaker |
| 6 | operations, we don't know what that will |
| 7 | consist of until we are further along in |
| 8 | the process, whether the government will |
| 9 | provide a caretaker for us. But basically |
| 10 | as long as there is government property |
| 11 | here, there is going to be some sort of |
| 12 | caretaker operation until it's all gone. |
| 13 | It could be the LRA, it could be |
| 14 | government, could be a contractor. |
| 15 | My favorite chart right here, |
| 16 | you see it's probably pretty busy. If you |
| 17 | took all of the major decision points that |
| 18 | took place in the BRAC process, you'd |
| 19 | probably have a hundred and four of those |
| 20 | boxes up there. Quite a few. What I want |
| 21 | to do on this part is just show you that it |
| 22 | is all a process, many laws, many |

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| 1 | complete this puzzle. We start off with |

| 2 | the phases, the base wide media planning, |
| 3 | going into disposal and reuse decisions and |
| 4 | parcel by parcel decision implementation. |
| 5 | And a lot of these things will be going on |
| 6 | at the same time. We start off with the |
| 7 | LRA, that's our generic term for Local |
| 8 | Redevelopment Authority, which Charles is |
| 9 | member and Rob is the executive director |
| 10 | of, and right now Walt Phillips is the |
| 11 | chairman. We did, very early on form a |
| 12 | local redevelopment authority here at Fort |
| 13 | McClellan. In fact, it stood up on the is |
| 14 | of August before the BRAC decision was eve |
| 15 | final. They formed, were trained on 1 |
| 16 | August, they put in for a grant from the |
| 17 | Office of Economic Adjustment, which is a |
| 18 | DoD activity. Received their initial |
| 19 | planning to have a staff of three, Rob, |
| 20 | Amanda, the secretary down there, and a |
| 21 | person which you all know here, L.C. |
| 22 | Johnson, forms the authority. So that par |
| 23 | is well on the way. And the local |
| | |

- 1 redevelopment authority was formed by the
- 2 counsel of elected leaders who appointed
- 3 the various members. The latest actions
- 4 they have done besides negotiate with the
- 5 National Guard on the size of the enclave,
- 6 they have submitted or put out to industry
- 7 a request for a proposal for industry
- 8 redevelopment firms in particular to bid on
- 9 developing a redevolopment plan at Fort
- 10 McClellan. I understand, I think all of
- 11 those bids are in and they will probably
- 12 select sometime this summer, maybe as early
- as the first part of July, select a company
- 14 to develop a redevelopment plan for Fort
- 15 McClellan. So that part is going great.
- 16 After they get their
- 17 redevelopment plan, it will probably take a
- 18 year, you think, Rob? About a year or so.
- 19 In `97 we should have an idea of what it is
- the local community plans to do with what's
- 21 left here at Fort McClellan. They will
- 22 prepare the various applications, and
- 23 depending on what they are going to do, for

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- 1 example, if you had an airport there may b
- an application to the airport authority or
- 3 something in DC, where they support it,
- 4 whatever you do, whatever you need an
- 5 application for the land to use it for.
- 6 Down here, LEA military
- department interface, that's set up and
- 8 working well between Fort McClellan and the
- 9 community, and I am the interface, the
- 10 day-to-day interface with the LRA and Fort
- 11 McClellan, not in charge of anything, just
- interface coordinator. Col. MacPherson is
- in charge of the closure process. The Arm
- does it a little bit different than the
- 15 Navy and the Air Force. Navy and Air Force
- 16 run a more centralized. And the Army, we
- 17 use the chain of command for closure
- 18 process.
- 19 So the military department
- 20 starts their disposal the same time. And
- 21 then we get to the part you are interested
- in, and you can see all of all of these
- 23 bullets here, the environmental covers the

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- 1 biggest bunch. If we look at the first
- 2 part of the environmental, the
- 3 environmental impact statement or
- 4 environmental assessment or FONSI finding
- 5 of no significant impact.
- 6 MR. LEVY: What Gary is
- 7 trying to tell you is that the disposal
- 8 environmental impact statement goes on
- 9 concurrently with the EBS process and what
- 10 the restoration advisory board is doing in
- 11 recommending priority cleanup. That's a
- 12 whole separate process. It melts itself
- into the decision, the final decision in
- 14 the reuse planning. There will be scoping
- 15 and public participation associated with
- that. We as the RAB here are focusing on
- 17 base cleanup issues.
- 18 MR. HARVEY: Coming down
- 19 further you see the environmental
- 20 baseline survey, Ron will get into more
- 21 detail on that, which is basically a
- 22 snapshot of what the environmental
- 23 condition of Fort McClellan is right now

| 1 | and that doesinclude all of Fort McClellan |
|----|---|
| 2 | to include Pelham Range and EBS. TheEBS |
| 3 | report is due, I believe, first draft this |
| 4 | month, right, Ron? |
| 5 | MR. LEVY: That's right, the |
| 6 | week of the 24th. |
| 7 | MR. HARVEY: I'm sure y'all |
| 8 | will be very interested in that. |
| 9 | On that, it leads to a FOST |
| 10 | or a FOSL which is a finding of suitability |
| 11 | to transport, finding of suitability to |
| 12 | lease which you've got to have to be able |
| 13 | to get rid of property. Environmental |
| 14 | cleanup and compliance requires that Fort |
| 15 | McClellan form a BRAG cleanup team. That |
| 16 | team has been formed and had several |
| 17 | meetings. It's had scoping meetings and |
| 18 | has done a bottom up review and I'm sure |
| 19 | Ron will cover more of that. |
| 20 | MR. LEVY: Yeah, let me |
| 21 | interrupt again. The base cleanup team |
| 22 | consists of three individuals, myself, Bar |
| 23 | Reedy, who is sitting there on the |

- 1 left-hand corner and Chris Johnson. That'
- the Installation myself, and EPA, and
- 3 Alabama Department of Environmental
- 4 Management. We're also part of this RAB a
- 5 non-voting members, or they are part of
- 6 this RAB as non-voting members.
- 7 MR. HARVEY: And down here a
- 8 Fort McClellan you can see now these are
- 9 going back. We also have the LRA, Rob is
- 10 here representing the LRA. Charles, of
- 11 course, is the co-chair with Ron. And that
- 12 ought to keep, and of course Charles on the
- 13 local redevelopment authority as the chair
- of the environmental sub-committee of that
- group. So we hope by having it develop
- that way that this will all be wrapped
- 17 tight so that you and downtown will know
- 18 what's happening together. It's important.
- 19 We don't need to be going different ways.
- 20 We may have different ideas, but if we are
- 21 all in the same room, then we can work to
- 22 them.
- 23 The BRAC cleanup team is off

- 1 and running. In several, I think two
- 2 separate meetings, where they did the
- 3 scoping. Caretaker arrangement, what I
- 4 mentioned, we're not there yet on
- 5 caretaker. We don't know how much will be
- 6 here when the post closes. The caretaker
- 7 organization is only after closure of the
- 8 active component here at Fort McClellan.
- 9 We have no idea what that will look like,
- 10 probably will not know until next summer,
- if then.
- 12 So see, all of these are
- 13 feeding in here coming to the phase of
- 14 disposal and reuse decision making. Site
- 15 cleanup and close out, a very important
- 16 part. This is where you really fit in with
- 17 your recommendations and your advice to
- 18 Ron's BRAC cleanup team. And you see we're
- 19 all coming up here to complete disposal.
- 20 If you look at that, of all those ideas,
- 21 seven of them there, three of them have to
- do, and our major ones, have to do with the
- 23 environmental portion. Extremely

- 1 important.
- 2 MR. LEVY: Essentially we a
- 3 in the reuse decision making side of the
- 4 house. You see the middle section there,
- 5 as a restoration advisory board providing
- 6 advice to the Army. We fall in the
- 7 decision making process.
- 8 MR. HARVEY: Now, there's a
- 9 multitude of laws, regulations, some that
- 10 were put up when BRAC first started in `88,
- 11 `89, some go back to the Federal Real
- 12 Property Management act back in the `40's.
- 13 There's a lot of rules, a lot of
- 14 regulations and a lot of laws which you
- just can't throw out. So, and again, the
- 16 purpose not to teach you every little bit
- of base reuse, but to show you, and I have
- 18 some handouts, I'll give it to you later
- 19 and you can take them with you, put them in
- 20 the trash, whatever you like, but to show
- 21 you there is a process, a regulated process
- 22 we are going through. And our goal here a
- 23 Fort McClellan, Ron's goal is to turn over

| 1 | clean parcels that are available for use. |

| 2 | We've all got the same goal. Most of us |
| 3 | live in the community, we all want to see |
| 4 | Fort McClellan reused and become some sort |
| 5 | of economic engine for the area. So I |
| 6 | think everybody in the room has a stake in |
| 7 | this process. Now, if there are any |
| 8 | particular parts of this that you'd like t |
| 9 | go into, you want details, see me on the |
| 10 | side, we can sit here and go through them |
| 11 | ad infinitum, get you any details, copies |
| 12 | well, actually we'll do that as we go |
| 13 | through this process. I just wanted to |
| 14 | show you that there is a standardized |
| 15 | process to go through. |
| 16 | MR. CONROY: Is there a copy |
| 17 | of that flow chart anywhere in our details |
| 18 | today? |
| 19 | MR. HARVEY: Yes, I'll give |
| 20 | them to you. |
| 21 | MR. CONROY: Okay, thanks. |
| 22 | MR. HARVEY: Any questions? |

- 1 you want detail, I can go into any level o
- 2 detail you'd like on it.
- 3 MR. TURNER: Gary, we
- 4 appreciate your brevity, because I know our
- 5 meetings run long. I hope you'll attend
- our meetings, because we'll, of course,
- 7 need to refer to you frequently as to
- 8 questions regarding the BRAC process.
- 9 MR. HARVEY: Just like the
- 10 LRA meeting, I'll be at every one of these.
- 11 MR. TURNER: Great. And
- 12 perhaps we should plan on giving you more
- 13 time at future meetings to go into this
- 14 more. Of course you can't capsulize the
- 15 BRAC process in half an hour or an hour.
- 16 MR. HARVEY: To go through
- 17 all of it you are talking three or four
- 18 hours. But as issues come up that are min
- in the RAB process, then we can take that
- 20 finite issue and bring you the research
- 21 materials and give you any depth you want.
- 22 Same as we do in the LRA meetings.
- MR. TURNER: Great, Gary,

| 1 | thank you so much. Good presentation, we |

| 2 | appreciate it. |
| 3 | MR. LEVY: John Herbert is |
| 4 | from ES&E, Environmental Science and |
| 5 | Engineering. They are the Army's |
| 6 | contractor for putting together the |
| 7 | environmental baseline survey. Again, I |
| 8 | was telling you this is a significant |
| 9 | document from the standpoint of identifying |
| 10 | uncontaminated parcels and categorizing |
| 11 | those others. He's going to go through and |
| 12 | talk to you about the EBS process and even |
| 13 | touch on a little of CERFA, and I might add |
| 14 | some more to it after he's finished. CERFA |
| 15 | being the law that EBS is drawn from, |
| 16 | environmental baseline survey is drawn |
| 17 | from. What you see behind me here are some |
| 18 | of the maps that are coming out of the |
| 19 | environmental baseline survey that we will |
| 20 | be working with that identify the property |
| 21 | on Main Post and also on Pelham Range by |
| 22 | categories and by level of, I don't know if |
| 23 | the right word is contamination, but by |
| | |

| 1 | level, for lack of a better word, |
|----|---|
| 2 | contamination. That will be the engine |
| 3 | that drives our cleanup issues. Go ahead |
| 4 | John. |
| 5 | MR. HERBERT: Thank you, like |
| 6 | Ron said what I'm going to do is walk you |
| 7 | through the environmental baseline survey |
| 8 | process and try to explain to you where we |
| 9 | are right now in the process, how we're |
| 10 | coming up with the maps that you see on the |
| 11 | wall behind you, and how that feeds into |
| 12 | the rest of this process for the eventual |
| 13 | transfer of property back to the public. |
| 14 | Each of you should have in |
| 15 | front of you a little group of handouts |
| 16 | that I've put together. Actually these are |
| 17 | the slides that I'm going to be showing. I |
| 18 | thought it might help you to have that so |
| 19 | you could take notes or whatever. I know I |
| 20 | find it helpful when I have that. |
| 21 | I'm actually going to start with the |
| 22 | conclusion side, simply because it tells |
| 23 | you, and let me know if you can't see |
| | |

- 1 something, if it's too low on the screen,
- 2 if you've got a question, ask if it has to
- 3 do with what we're talking about right now.
- 4 I'll be glad to entertain questions and
- 5 answer them as best I can. The things that
- 6 we are going to be talking about in this
- 7 presentation are: the overall EBS process,
- 8 the purpose of the EBS, what it is we're
- 9 trying to accomplish, the categories of
- 10 environmental conditions, -- which is what
- 11 Ron was talking about a second ago -- where
- we are identifying different parcels on
- 13 base, different areas that were used for
- 14 different purposes in the past, and we're
- assigning them to one of seven categories
- in environmental condition. CERFA which is
- 17 the law that drives this whole thing, and
- 18 the FOST and FOSL, that is finding of
- 19 suitability to lease and finding of
- 20 suitability to transfer. And without those
- 21 legal instruments being completed, the
- 22 property cannot be transferred either
- 23 through lease or through deed. So I'm

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- going to slip this at the back, and we'll
- 2 see that slide again.
- 3 I know that we all hate
- 4 acronyms, and somebody mentioned that at
- 5 the first meeting, but these are some
- 6 acronyms that you are going to see in this
- 7 presentation, on these overheads, and I
- 8 just want to make sure that you guys are
- 9 aware of what these terms mean. As a
- 10 matter of fact, a copy of this should be in
- 11 the back of your handout. If you've got
- 12 it, you don't have to write any of this
- 13 stuff down. The EBS is the environmental
- 14 baseline survey. It is both the process
- we're going through right now, and it's
- 16 also the document that's going to be, that
- 17 you guys are going to receive at the end o
- 18 the month, and it's going to come out to
- 19 you in two volumes. It's going to be a
- 20 monstrously thick set of text. That's what
- 21 we're going to generate while we are
- 22 identifying what has, what kind of
- 23 activities have occurred at Fort McClellan

- and the environmental condition of the
- 2 property, okay. So the EBS is both the
- 3 process and the document. BRAC is the Bas
- 4 Realignment Closure Act. There are
- 5 actually two pieces of legislation, as I
- 6 understand it, that mandated that the
- 7 military is going to downsize and return
- 8 certain facilities back to the private
- 9 sector. The BCP is the BRAG cleanup plan,
- 10 that's a document that's going to help us
- 11 determine how to clean up parcels that have
- 12 been contaminated one way or another, and
- get them in a condition to turn back to the
- 14 private sector. CERCLA stands for
- 15 Comprehensive Environmental Response
- 16 Compensation Liability Act. And the reason
- 17 that CERCLA is important to us is because,
- 18 this next acronym CERFA, which is the
- 19 Community Environmental Response
- 20 Facilitation Act, and don't ask me to
- 21 repeat that one, because I'll have to pull
- 22 it back up to remember what it is. CERFA
- is an amendment to CERCLA. When the

| 1 | government decided to close military bases |
|----|---|
| 2 | and return them back to the public, they |
| 3 | amended CERCLA or the super fund act with |
| 4 | CERFA. And CERFA is what's driving this |
| 5 | entire process and making sure that when |
| 6 | property is transferred back to the private |
| 7 | sector the government is not transferring |
| 8 | contaminated property. |
| 9 | Now, if I'm going into too |
| 10 | much detail, let me know, and I'll try to |
| 11 | speed things along here. The environmental |
| 12 | baseline survey, which is what we're |
| 13 | talking about right now, again, it's both |
| 14 | process and a document, and it's a review |
| 15 | of the entire facility, both past |
| 16 | practices, both past uses and current uses. |
| 17 | And the intent is to identify parcels which |
| 18 | are uncontaminated by a certain definition, |
| 19 | and we'll do that a little bit later, how |
| 20 | CERFA the law we just talked about, how |
| 21 | CERFA defines uncontaminated. The main |
| 22 | thing is to identify properties in seven |
| 23 | categories, one of which is CERFA |

| 1 | uncontaminated. And those could be |
|----|---|
| 2 | transferred pretty much immediately. So |
| 3 | that's pretty much the purpose, let's just |
| 4 | suffice it to say, that there are DoD |
| 5 | policies that require that we go through |
| 6 | this process and establish the procedure b |
| 7 | which we go through this process. |
| 8 | Okay, these are some of the |
| 9 | activities that we have gone through while |
| 10 | we have been putting together the EBS. |
| 11 | We've reviewed documents that are on file |
| 12 | here at various places at Fort McClellan, |
| 13 | we've reviewed records that are on file |
| 14 | with the State. We have performed a title, |
| 15 | chain of title search to make sure that we |
| 16 | know what different parcels were used for |
| 17 | prior to Fort McClellan being established |
| 18 | as a military installation, both Main Post |
| 19 | and Pelham Range. And we've gone through |
| 20 | review of a lot of documents, lot of files, |
| 21 | lot of maps, trying to establish what has |
| 22 | actually transpired here at Fort McClellan |
| 23 | over the years. We've looked at aerial |
| | |

- 1 photographs, there are a lot of aerial
- 2 photographs here on file at the Directorate
- 3 of Environmental, we looked at a bunch of
- 4 those. We have interviewed people who are
- 5 working here currently, folks who have
- 6 retired and are living here locally, and
- 7 folks that retired and moved away. We
- 8 tried to speak to as many people who have
- 9 as much historical information as possible
- 10 about Fort McClellan and past practices
- 11 here. We visually inspected quite a few
- 12 sites at Fort McClellan that we have
- 13 identified, and tried to identify sources
- 14 of contamination. We physically inspected
- 15 adjacent properties, because we are
- 16 concerned not only about what's transpired
- 17 here at Fort McClellan but what may be
- 18 going on adjacent to the Post, because we
- don't want to transfer property where
- 20 contamination might be migrating from an
- 21 off Post facility on Post, okay. And we've
- 22 not conducted any sampling, but samplings
- 23 will occur at some sites later on in the

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| 1 | process. |
|----------------------|---|
| 2 | MR. CONROY: Is all of this |
| 3 | ongoing? |
| 4 | MR. HERBERT: Everything that |
| 5 | was on that last overhead is ongoing. We |
| 6 | hope we've completed many of those |
| 7 | activities. But we are getting additional |
| 8 | information as we go on, and I guess really |
| 9 | that's going to happen until we publish the |
| 10 | final document. |
| 11 | MR. CONROY: The door is |
| 12 | open? |
| 13 | MR. HERBERT: Well, there |
| 14 | will be a cutoff point at some point, but |
| 15 | naturally anything that's discovered after |
| 16 | |
| 10 | the final after the report goes out will |
| 17 | the final after the report goes out will be incorporated, if nothing else, in the |
| | |
| 17 | be incorporated, if nothing else, in the |
| 17 18 | be incorporated, if nothing else, in the FOST and FOSL process, finding of |
| 17 18 19 | be incorporated, if nothing else, in the FOST and FOSL process, finding of suitability to transfer, finding of |
| 17 18 19 20 | be incorporated, if nothing else, in the FOST and FOSL process, finding of suitability to transfer, finding of suitability to lease. When that legal |

| 1 | MR. LEVY: If you look at |
|----|---|
| 2 | this particular process more from an |
| 3 | archival standpoint, gathering information |
| 4 | that's already out there than from what |
| 5 | we're doing in the other side of the house, |
| 6 | site investigations, those are all feeding |
| 7 | into what he's putting together here. Kin |
| 8 | of a one-over Fort McClellan look at what' |
| 9 | out there. And we're still doing ongoing |
| 10 | investigations separate from this. |
| 11 | MR. REEDY: One thing, what I |
| 12 | heard you ask is how can we add new |
| 13 | information. Every year we have to update |
| 14 | the base closure plan, and in times past, |
| 15 | we have updated base closure plans at other |
| 16 | bases routinely, and covered things, and |
| 17 | I'm sure you will speak to this in a |
| 18 | minute, changed things from one category t |
| 19 | another category, based on information that |
| 20 | comes to light. What we are doing right |
| 21 | now is indeed a baseline survey, but it is |
| 22 | not by any means the final word. We hope |
| 23 | it to be, we're working trying to make it |

| 1 | as accurate and as comprehensive as we can, |
|----|---|
| 2 | but there's always the base closure plans |
| 3 | which will be updated. |
| 4 | MR. LEVY: We're lucky to |
| 5 | have Bart. Bart has plenty of experience |
| 6 | in the process because he's done other |
| 7 | installations before. |
| 8 | MR. CONROY: Specifically I' |
| 9 | thinking along the lines of interviews, I |
| 10 | bet all of us has had somebody come up to |
| 11 | us at one time or another and say, "Well, I |
| 12 | remember in 1963, and we did this, this, |
| 13 | this." I've got a half dozen names that |
| 14 | would come to mind. |
| 15 | MR. ANDERSON: That's exactly |
| 16 | what I was wanting to ask a question about. |
| 17 | Can we get a copy of, at some point in |
| 18 | time, just the list of people that have |
| 19 | been interviewed. And the reason I ask |
| 20 | that is certainly in my business as a |
| 21 | defense contractor, I've got ten guys that |
| 22 | I know for a fact one of them was present |
| 23 | when the mustard spill on the traffic |

| 1 | circle happened. And another one, and so |
|----|---|
| 2 | on, and the thing I'm thinking of, Mr. |
| 3 | Levy, in particular is, so much of what |
| 4 | happened before about 1970 is oral history. |
| 5 | We don't have good documentation on it. |
| 6 | And we have to rely on the memories of |
| 7 | people while we can still reach out and get |
| 8 | at them. And anything that people here in |
| 9 | the community can do to add names to that |
| 10 | network that you are building will make |
| 11 | that baseline survey more comprehensive. |
| 12 | MR. PEREZ: How far back have |
| 13 | the interviews gone, in time? |
| 14 | MR. HERBERT: Back into the |
| 15 | early `50's. Let me back up just a second |
| 16 | and address the issue of additional |
| 17 | knowledge. There are two ways additional |
| 18 | knowledge can come to light, one is finding |
| 19 | out about something historical, as far as |
| 20 | changing the way we view the environmental |
| 21 | condition of a piece of property, we find |
| 22 | out about something that has happened |
| 23 | historically, and that needs to be added t |
| | |

| 1 | the data base. The other thing is this is |
|----|---|
| 2 | a functioning military Installation, and |
| 3 | let's say we have a tanker truck roll over |
| 4 | on the road out here and spill some fuel, |
| 5 | that current event needs to be added to the |
| 6 | data base as well. So it's not like we are |
| 7 | just going to cut off when the report goes |
| 8 | out and there's not going to be any |
| 9 | additional consideration given to new |
| 10 | information or happenings. |
| 11 | Okay, to speak just a second |
| 12 | to the issue of the interview process, one |
| 13 | thing I find encouraging in my interviews, |
| 14 | and I've been handling mainly ranges and |
| 15 | chemical sites because this is such a large |
| 16 | Installation, we've had multiple people |
| 17 | working doing these interviews and looking |
| 18 | through files, and I was handling mainly |
| 19 | ranges and chemical sites. One thing I |
| 20 | find encouraging is I'm finding more and |
| 21 | more that one person will recommend I speak |
| 22 | to somebody else, speak to John Smith. |
| 23 | John Smith recommends I speak to two or |

- three people who I've already spoken to, so
- 2 it's kind of like the people I'm talking to
- 3 are referring me back to people I've
- 4 already spoken to. I find that very
- 5 refreshing. Just so you understand how the
- 6 interview process is going from my
- 7 standpoint.
- 8 MR. LEVY: will those
- 9 interviews, the records of interviews stay
- in the EBS?
- 11 MR. HERBERT: I had not
- 12 considered, I don't think at this point we
- have a list of people we have interviewed,
- 14 but the interview notes are included as an
- 15 appendix so you can see not only who we
- 16 spoke to, but what they told us.
- 17 MR. REEDY: So the list
- 18 exists, it's just not in a list form.
- 19 MR. HERBERT: If you wanted
- 20 us to put a list together about the project
- 21 as Page 1 as appendix whatever, that could
- 22 be done.
- 23 MR. BROWN: (Inaudible.)

- 1 MS. KINSBERRY: I think once
- 2 you see the interview notes, you won't need
- 3 it.
- 4 MR. HERBERT: I think you'll
- 5 see a lot of names you'll recognize.
- 6 MR. ANDERSON: But I know the
- 7 fellow I was saying was present at the
- 8 spill, I know for a fact he hasn't been
- 9 talked to.
- 10 MR. HERBERT: We've heard
- 11 about the mustard spill.
- 12 MR. ANDERSON: I'm sure
- 13 you've heard everything from three days to
- 14 ten days to clean it up too.
- 15 MR. KIMBROUGH: I have a
- 16 question, on the monitoring. If you have
- monitoring, and you probably know where I'm
- 18 coming from, will the monitors detect, for
- instance, radon, in wells, can you detect
- 20 -- you know that there's a leakage but you
- 21 detect nothing, is there going to be
- 22 continuing monitoring until this base is
- 23 turned over, or is that monitoring going to

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- 1 be it?
- 2 MR. LEVY: We're going to do
- 3 it in accordance to what our regulators
- 4 direct us to do, and in a case like that,
- 5 in fact we'll probably have some long-term
- 6 monitoring. Am I right, Bart?
- 7 MR. REEDY: I can't speak
- 8 directly to the contamination that you are
- 9 talking about, because frankly, I've not
- 10 had time to see the data, review the data.
- 11 But we are not, we, EPA, I'm federal EPA
- 12 again, and Chris is the State EPD. So we
- are not going to just draw a line and say,
- "Well, that's it, we're done messing with
- it." That is not going to happen. Does
- 16 that answer your question enough?
- 17 MR. KIMBROUGH: Partially,
- 18 MR. REEDY: Again, I think
- 19 the thing we might want to do here, we're
- 20 opening up a big can of worms with the EBS
- 21 here, and I think we'd all be pretty, as a
- 22 suggestion, maybe let the man finish this
- 23 little bit here. This is again, designed

| 1 | to be a snapshot in time and give us a |
|----|---|
| 2 | place to start so we're not out chasing |
| 3 | something in building six or twenty-eight |
| 4 | and spending all our time there, when we've |
| 5 | got an entire base to try and hand the key |
| 6 | over to you. And that's the purpose of |
| 7 | this document and this research. It is no |
| 8 | the final word. |
| 9 | MR. HERBERT: Right. Yeah, I |
| 10 | don't want to get off on too many tangents |
| 11 | here too far from talking about the EBS |
| 12 | process. I think we all need to be aware |
| 13 | of one thing, this is not the only thing |
| 14 | that's going on. There are a lot of other |
| 15 | things going on at the same time as this, |
| 16 | looking into these sites in a lot of |
| 17 | detail. All we're trying to do is identify |
| 18 | where there are parcels that may have been |
| 19 | contaminated, where there are parcels that |
| 20 | we believe are CERFA uncontaminated, and |
| 21 | I'll define that term in a minute, okay? |
| 22 | Col. MacPherson? |
| 23 | COL. MACPHERSON: Yeah, that |

- was my point, we're trying to get to a
- bottom line I guess would be to identify
- 3 what is CERFA clean, which means you can
- 4 arrive at a FOST or a FOSL. The point
- 5 you're making if that's not declared CERFA
- 6 clean, some remediation will have to be
- 7 done probably in order to arrive at being
- 8 CERFA clean. So if it's not to that
- 9 condition, probably can't be transferred
- over, you can't get a FOST or a FOSL, see.
- 11 So the real crux of your question, which I
- 12 think is what you are getting at, is if
- we've identified a problem with migration,
- 14 for example, ground water, are we going to
- 15 abandon that and just leave it to your
- 16 devices? No. The Army has that problem
- 17 and it has to stick with it.
- 18 MR. HERBERT: That brings up
- 19 another point, and I'd have to go to my
- 20 documentation here to quote it to you, I
- 21 can do that afterwards, but basically, the
- 22 Army is or the Department of Defense, the
- 23 U.S. Government is on the hook for its

| 1 | contamination whether it's discovered |
|----|---|
| 2 | before the property is transferred or |
| 3 | whether it's not discovered until after the |
| 4 | property is transferred. And that's part |
| 5 | of CERFA and CERCLA. |
| 6 | MR. LEVY: I don't think you |
| 7 | ought to get into that, why don't you just |
| 8 | continue on. |
| 9 | MR. HERBERT: Okay. The |
| 10 | purpose of the EBS here is to be the base |
| 11 | cleanup plan. We are identifying, we're |
| 12 | putting property into one of seven |
| 13 | environmental categories, and I'll be |
| 14 | talking about that in a few minutes. We're |
| 15 | identifying parcels that are CERFA |
| 16 | uncontaminated, and we're identifying |
| 17 | properties that are suitable for transfer |
| 18 | or lease to the private sector. That's |
| 19 | what this EBS process and what this |
| 20 | document are intended to do. Okay, the |
| 21 | seven categories, and I think this may, |
| 22 | this is something a number of people, I'm |
| 23 | sure, have some interest in. Category one |

| 1 | is various areas where and we're talking |
|----|---|
| 2 | here about hazardous materials, petroleum. |
| 3 | radon, lead base paint, these sorts of |
| 4 | things. Category one is where there has |
| 5 | never been any storage, disposal or a |
| 6 | release of hazardous substance of a |
| 7 | petroleum products. Now, when we're |
| 8 | looking at this we're looking at a one-yea |
| 9 | time period. There hasn't been anything |
| 10 | stored for more than a year, there hasn't |
| 11 | been any reported releases or we don't have |
| 12 | any reason to think that there might have |
| 13 | been any releases, okay? And those parcel |
| 14 | are colored white on these maps, and I |
| 15 | really don't want to talk about these maps, |
| 16 | but when you see white parcels, those are |
| 17 | defined as CERFA uncontaminated, and that' |
| 18 | category one, okay? In those areas, we |
| 19 | have no reason to believe that there has |
| 20 | been any storage, disposal or a release of |
| 21 | these constituents. |
| 22 | Okay, category two is where |
| 23 | there's storage. We differentiate that |
| | |

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- 1 because there is a little bit more
- 2 potential for a release, because we know
- 3 there has been storage there, but there ha,
- 4 been no documentation or reports of any
- 5 kind of release.
- 6 Category three, areas where
- 7 storage and release. Where there has been
- 8 storage and there's been a release, but
- 9 it's at concentrations that are not going
- 10 to be injurious to human health or the
- 11 environment. Seven categories, in order to
- make it legible I had to put it on three
- 13 slides, or three overheads, and that's the
- 14 way you have it on your handouts as well.
- 15 Category four, that's areas
- where okay, we've had storage, had a
- 17 release, and it's been remediated, it's
- 18 been cleaned up. As an example, you've got
- 19 an underground storage tank, it leaked, it
- 20 was detected. Came in dug up the tank,
- 21 cleaned up the soil, cleaned up the water.
- They monitored it and it's been remediated,
- there is no more problem, okay? That's

| 1 | category four. |
|----|--|
| 2 | Category five is where |
| 3 | there's been a release and they are in the |
| 4 | process of cleaning it up, but they haven' |
| 5 | finished yet. So, if you are talking about |
| 6 | a site where you know there's been a |
| 7 | release, but you haven't seen anything, |
| 8 | that would probably be category six. |
| 9 | Category six is an area where there is |
| 10 | storage, there's been a release, but you |
| 11 | haven't really started cleaning it up yet, |
| 12 | okay? Category seven is, we really don't |
| 13 | know a whole lot about the site and we nee |
| 14 | to do more work. |
| 15 | Okay, so we've looked at For |
| 16 | McClellan, and we have looked through all |
| 17 | sorts of records, talked to all sorts of |
| 18 | people, trying to identify what kinds of |
| 19 | operations, what kind of activities took |
| 20 | place where, and which of these seven |
| 21 | categories those parcels of land should |
| 22 | fall into. The intent is to make sure that |
| 23 | we don't turn over property that's |

| 1 | contaminated because we don't want people |
|----|---|
| 2 | to get hurt. |
| 3 | Okay, now, property that is |
| 4 | suitable for transfer by deed or by lease. |
| 5 | Categories one through four can be |
| 6 | transferred by deed and they can be leased. |
| 7 | Those are properties where they range from |
| 8 | CERFA uncontaminated meaning there's never |
| 9 | been storage much less a release, all the |
| 10 | way to we know there's been a release but |
| 11 | it's been cleaned up. Those properties car |
| 12 | be transferred by deed or by lease. |
| 13 | Categories five, six and seven can be |
| 14 | leased, but they cannot be transferred by |
| 15 | deed. And those are properties where |
| 16 | there's still some contamination, we know |
| 17 | there is still contamination in the ground |
| 18 | or water, or we just don't know. There are |
| 19 | certain parcels that wouldn't be |
| 20 | transferred or leased under any |
| 21 | circumstances at this point because they |
| 22 | are may be UXO issues. |
| 23 | MR. BROWN: Can you give us |

| 1 | an idea about the parcels of land that the |
|----|---|
| 2 | category of the ranges would be, can you |
| 3 | give us any idea on that? |
| 4 | MR. HERBERT: If you'll look |
| 5 | at the maps on the wall, and again, I don' |
| 6 | want to get into a whole lot of detail |
| 7 | here, if you look at the map over Ron's |
| 8 | head you see an awful lot of brown here, |
| 9 | and that's ranges. And some of those |
| 10 | ranges there has been nothing but lead |
| 11 | bullets fired off. At some of those range |
| 12 | there has been other stuff fired off that |
| 13 | you don't want to go walking through. So, |
| 14 | most of the, the category, and really we |
| 15 | not categorizing those parcels according to |
| 16 | this system, but ranges constitute the |
| 17 | largest single land use by acreage on Fort |
| 18 | McClellan, both on Main Post and on Pelham |
| 19 | Range. |
| 20 | MR. BROWN: Those would fall |
| 21 | in five or above? |
| 22 | MR. HERBERT: We know there |
| 23 | has been a release and there has been |

| 1 | nothing done yet to clean those up. |
|----|--|
| 2 | MR. LEVY: One of the things |
| 3 | you are going to hear about is those are |
| 4 | safety issues more so than they are |
| 5 | environmental issues, and the liability |
| 6 | associated with that, we're going to talk |
| 7 | more about that as we move through this. |
| 8 | MR. HERBERT: I really didn't |
| 9 | intend to spend time talking about that, |
| 10 | but we can certainly. There's no problem |
| 11 | with that. Okay, we're going to kind of |
| 12 | take a step back here, the environmental |
| 13 | baseline survey, the process and the |
| 14 | document we're putting out, is designed |
| 15 | primarily to identify CERFA uncontaminated |
| 16 | property. Okay, that is, here's the |
| 17 | definition of CERFA uncontaminated |
| 18 | property: Real property on which no |
| 19 | hazardous substance and no petroleum |
| 20 | products or their derivatives were stored |
| 21 | for one year or more known to have been |
| 22 | released or disposed of. We've been |
| 23 | pouring through lots of records trying to |

- 1 find any indications of releases of these
- 2 types of compounds so that we can make sure
- 3 we exclude them from category one. Again,
- 4 we don't want to tell you a site is clean
- 5 to find out later that it's not.
- 6 Okay, the EBS is the primary
- 7 tool by which we support the finding of
- 8 suitability to transfer or the finding of
- 9 suitability to lease, the FOST or FOSL. So
- 10 the EBS needs those two legal documents,
- and this is the data we use to justify
- 12 stating that yes, this property is suitable
- 13 to transfer by lease or by deed, one or the
- 14 other.
- 15 MR. LEVY: The local reuse
- 16 authority would be keenly interested in
- this, especially when they want to get
- 18 reuse, they want to be able to say we want
- 19 this property, what's its condition.
- 20 Through the EBS we establish what the
- 21 condition of the property is. In fact if
- 22 it's in category one and they are looking
- 23 to reuse it, it can be transferred.

| 1 | MR. HERBERT: Right. And |
|----|---|
| 2 | another thing, nothing can be transferred |
| 3 | until the FOST or the FOSL have been |
| 4 | completed. Okay, the only way that you |
| 5 | guys are going to get through this process |
| 6 | is if we all cooperate here and there is a |
| 7 | team approach. We've got the BRAC cleanup |
| 8 | team consisting of Ron, Chris, and Bart. |
| 9 | You guys are feeding your information to |
| 10 | them. They are interacting with the LRA |
| 11 | and the base transition coordinator Mr. |
| 12 | Harvey, who you heard from just a second |
| 13 | ago. So we've all got to make sure we're |
| 14 | communicating, real time, getting as much |
| 15 | information flow going as we can so that we |
| 16 | can speed through this process. This is a |
| 17 | process that's going to take some time. |
| 18 | It's not like any of this property is going |
| 19 | to be transferred tomorrow. |
| 20 | We're getting close to the |
| 21 | end here, the DoD FOST process, the finding |
| 22 | of suitability to transfer, it's basically |
| 23 | a determination that the property is |

| 1 | suitable to transfer. It's environmentally |
|----|---|
| 2 | suitable under CERCLA section, whatever, |
| 3 | 20.H which is CERFA, okay? It's a |
| 4 | determination based on the EBS, what my |
| 5 | company is working on putting togethe ${f r}$ |
| 6 | right now. There's DoD guidance that tell |
| 7 | us how this all needs to be done. And NEPA |
| 8 | is another set of regulations which Ron |
| 9 | referred to a minute ago talking about the |
| 10 | environmental impact statement that is |
| 11 | being done concurrentlywith the work we're |
| 12 | doing. The LRA suggests a certain set of |
| 13 | land reuse options, and those are all |
| 14 | evaluated for,I guess, environmental |
| 15 | impact and economic impact. That's all, |
| 16 | that stuff is being handled separately fro |
| 17 | what we're doing. |
| 18 | MR. REEDY: But it is |
| 19 | concurrent? |
| 20 | MR. HERBERT: It's ongoing |
| 21 | now, I believe. |
| 22 | MR. LEVY: Certainly anybody |

| 2 | MR. HERBERT: Okay, the |
| 3 | finding of suitability to transfer contain |
| 4 | a notice of covenant, three separate part |
| 5 | here, notice of covenant and an access |
| 6 | clause. And basically what it does is it |
| 7 | notifies the potential purchaser of the |
| 8 | property of any hazardous materials that |
| 9 | were stored or released on the property an |
| 10 | whether it was cleaned up. |
| 11 | MR. LEVY: Let me give you a |
| 12 | example. If we had a piece of property |
| 13 | that the community wanted to use, we had a |
| 14 | remedy in place, let's say we had ground |
| 15 | water contamination, and we had some sort |
| 16 | of stripping system in there, means they |
| 17 | pump the water up to the top of the well, |
| 18 | we heat the water, and clean it up and the |
| 19 | pump it back down. A clause will be put |
| 20 | in, assuming they still wanted to receive |
| 21 | the property, that would allow us access t |
| 22 | continue doing that part. So it's a |
| 23 | covenant or access clause within the deed. |

- 1 MR. HERBERT: Another part o
- 2 the access clause is if in the future
- 3 somebody determines that there's
- 4 contamination on that parcel or adjacent
- 5 parcel and the government needs access in
- 6 order to remediate it, that's part of that
- 7 access clause. If you expect them to
- 8 clean it up, they've got to have a right t
- 9 get back on the property to do that.
- 10 MR. TURNER: Is this present
- 11 both deeds and leases?
- 12 MR. HERBERT: I'm talking
- 13 specifically now about a finding of
- 14 suitability to transfer. In that
- 15 particular case there wouldn't be any
- 16 contamination on the property now, right?
- 17 Because that would put the parcel in
- 18 category five or six. Five is ongoing
- 19 remediation, and that can't be transferred.
- 20 We'll talk about finding of suitability to
- 21 lease in just a second. It's going to be
- 22 very, very similar to what we're looking a
- 23 here, okay?

- 1 The FOST process, six steps
- 2 some of them are painfully obvious. The
- 3 first thing you've got to do, I guess it
- 4 would be Fort McClellan would do, who is it
- 5 that runs the FOST process here, is it For
- 6 McClellan, DoD?
- 7 MR. LEVY: The MAYCOM has
- 8 authority to sign off.
- 9 MR. HERBERT: The way the
- 10 FOST process would be initiated is,
- 11 somebody comes to DoD and says, "I want to
- 12 purchase this piece of property." That's
- 13 what kicks the whole thing off. So that
- 14 DoD knows what particular parcel to write
- 15 FOST for. So if somebody comes to DoD and
- 16 says "I want to purchase this property."
- 17 They notify the state and federal
- 18 regulatory agencies of their intent to
- 19 write a finding of suitability to transfer.
- 20 Second step is they go back and evaluate
- 21 the property, and that, if at no other
- 22 point, that's where you go back and look a
- 23 has there been anything else come to light.

- 1 Okay? You use that information to
- 2 determine the suitability to transfer or
- 3 lease, if it was a white parcel to begin
- 4 with and nothing else has happened, it's
- 5 okay to transfer. The fourth step is to
- 6 notify the regulatory agency and the public
- 7 of the intent to transfer, complete and
- 8 sign the legal document, and then to notify
- 9 the public that it's been done.
- 10 MR. CONROY: We're just
- 11 talking about two regulatory agencies,
- 12 state and federal, EPA and ADEM?
- 13 MR. HERBERT: DoD is
- 14 obviously in there. They are the ones that
- 15 have the primary responsibility.
- 16 MR. LEVY: Really the heavier
- 17 role in this is the State, I think more so
- 18 than the EPA. The State has more oversight
- 19 over us than the EPA actually does. But
- 20 they have to be, we have to advise and talk
- 21 with the EPA.
- MR. HERBERT: Both the State
- 23 and the EPA are on the BRAC cleanup team

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| 1 | which are an integral part of putting |
|----|---|
| 2 | together the EBS. |
| 3 | MR. REEDY: Yeah, I think we |
| 4 | have here, Ron just briefly touched it, the |
| 5 | base that I came from was national priority |
| 6 | list base, a super fund site. On super |
| 7 | fund sites, Federal EPA, me, we have the |
| 8 | lead on the environmental cleanup. At For |
| 9 | McClellan, State of Alabama has the lead. |
| 10 | Now, when it comes, and I think this kind |
| 11 | of goes to your question Pete, and you |
| 12 | touched on it as well, when it comes time |
| 13 | to transfer a parcel of property, Congress |
| 14 | in one of its rare moments of wisdom, |
| 15 | noticed there was a difference between For |
| 16 | McClellan and a really nasty base, an NPL |
| 17 | base. An NPL base, DoD, and in my case the |
| 18 | Navy had to get our actual letter of |
| 19 | approval from us saying we completely |
| 20 | concur with this, they went through about |
| 21 | two steps before they could continue on |
| 22 | with the FOST or FOSL, they had to get our |
| 23 | concurrence. This is a different |

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- 1 situation, and Congress says that the way
- 2 it's written now, if federal EPA has any
- 3 kind of a squawk about a parcel of land out
- 4 here that somebody wants to buy or lease,
- 5 DoD has got to attach all of our comments
- on that parcel to the deed. So that if say
- you wanted to buy a parcel of property Mr.
- 8 Cox, you are going to know everything that
- 9 we know and that ADEM knows about that
- 10 parcel. And while we don't sign off, we
- 11 make you aware of it anyways. Does that
- 12 add any?
- 13 MR. LEVY: Thank you.
- 14 MR. MOORE: You make the
- 15 purchaser aware?
- 16 MR. REEDY: Yes, yes, it goes
- 17 right on the deed.
- 18 MR. HERBERT: I'd have to

- MR. LEVY: DoD has its own

- 14 a matter of fact, in CERCLA it specifically
- 15 states that Department of Defense will fun
- it's own cleanup efforts. They do it
- through a program called the Environmental
- 18 Restoration Design Account. So, yes, we d
- get our own funds for cleanup purposes.

| 4 | MR. REEDY: The Navy base I |
| 5 | was working at was a full-blown air base, |
| 6 | and there was considerable interest in |
| 7 | utilizing the air strip and the hangers an |
| 8 | all of that. It was very dirty, it was an |
| 9 | industrial complex for want of a better |
| 10 | term. We weren't going to be able to get |
| 11 | it cleaned up, the ground water was dirty, |
| 12 | we weren't going to be able to get it |
| 13 | cleaned up for years. The Navy is on the |
| 14 | hook for that property. Congress saw that |
| 15 | that was a problem, that you can't clean |

- 14 FOST, you say the Army prefer there be no
- 15 restrictions. Is that an unwritten rule
- 16 that there be no restrictions?
- MR. LEVY: No, no, they will
- 18 attempt to provide FOST and FOSLs that have
- 19 no restrictions. Obviously that won't
- 20 happen in all cases.
- 21 MR. HERBERT: There may be
- 22 exceptions to that.
- MR. CONWAY: I was trying to

- 1 read between the lines and there was
- 2 nothing to read.
- 3 MR. HERBERT: FOST and FOSL
- 4 policy coordinate with regulatory agencies,
- 5 notify the State as required by CERCLA,
- 6 notify the public of what's going on, there
- 7 are lease conditions and model lease
- 8 provisions that will be included. Again,
- 9 notice, covenants, that sort of thing.
- 10 NEPA analysis and documentation will figure
- in here.
- 12 MR. LEVY: Y'all can be away
- that we have not been able to transfer or
- 14 lease property until completion of the
- 15 environmental impact statement. That's
- been a real difficult thing for us to get
- 17 through. We've really been trying to work
- 18 with the community on transferring
- 19 property, but because of the requirements
- 20 under NEPA we're not able to transfer
- 21 property until that process is complete.
- 22 MR. REEDY: I don't think
- we've told them what NEPA is.

| 1 | MR. LEVY: NEPA is the |
|----|---|
| 2 | National Environmental Policy Act. A lot |
| 3 | of you know it as the environmental impact |
| 4 | statement. It says that any major federal |
| 5 | action should be evaluated for its impact, |
| 6 | environmental impacts. |
| 7 | MR. ANDERSON: Since this is |
| 8 | next to the last slide, I want to hone |
| 9 | right in on notification to the public, |
| 10 | because that's obviously what we are all |
| 11 | about. There is some questions that I nee |
| 12 | to walk through to make sure I understand |
| 13 | what you just briefed us on throughout the |
| 14 | last 45 minutes. The FOST or FOSL is not |
| 15 | done as a product in and off itself, but |
| 16 | rather it's only done in response to an LRA |

| 13 | complex, but y'all haven't seen complex |
| 14 | until you see the bylaws I wrote for the |
| 15 | LRA. It looks like the IRS code. And |
| 16 | that's kind of along the lines which we |
| 17 | moved. |
| 18 | MR. KIMBROUGH: There was |
| 19 | nobody appointed as far as categories? |
| 20 | MR. TURNER: No, sir. |
| 21 | MR. KIMBROUGH: For instance, |
| 22 | my concern would be say if I had to get of |
| 23 | being a public official, I am the only |

- 1 public official or elected official that I
- 2 know of, and I think it would be very
- 3 important to have a public official no
- 4 matter where they are from, Jacksonville,
- 5 Anniston. So the way it's written now, it
- 6 would be left up to the reconvenure of the
- 7 selection committee and to be voted on?
- 8 MR. TURNER: That's the way
- 9 we talked about it was that all new
- 10 appointments would come from the selection
- 11 committee. And perhaps we shouldn't be
- 12 able to control what they do. Perhaps it
- 13 should be a blind process. For instance,
- 14 I'll be candid, it looks like we've got
- 15 whole lot of white men sitting around this
- 16 table with all respect to Mrs. Longstreth.
- 17 At perhaps at some point there being a nee
- 18 to add some racial and ethnic diversity to
- 19 this group, then the selection committee
- 20 could be charged with going out and adding
- 21 some racial diversity to us by increasing
- 22 our number. Or if we felt like that was
- 23 needed in replacing a member, we could do

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| 1 | that. So the ability for this group to |

| 3 | appeal. |
| 4 | DR. COX: There might be some |
| 5 | environmental justice issue, is that what |
| 6 | you are thinking? |

| 10 | group is supposed to represent the |

| 4 | MR. DOYLE: I'm Ron's legal |
| 5 | adviser here. Number one, I don't think |

| 9 | the Installation. I don't think by virtue |
| 10 | of being on this committee, other than |
| 11 | exhibiting an interest in this process, |

| 14 | The second thing, it's up to you folks, h |
| 15 | I don't think this group, I'd rather call |
| 16 | it a group of interested citizens in the |
| 17 | community, was ever supposed to be this |
| 18 | formalistic in its approach. If I wasn't |
| 19 | legal counsel up here, I would expect that |
| 20 | if I came in next month, that I'm |
| 21 | interested in participating in the |
| 22 | committee, then there isn't a vote on it |
| 23 | per se. I mean, I would think I would be |
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| 1 | invited and welcomed and everything else. |

| 2 | I'm getting the impression here that all o |
| 3 | a sudden you are looking at becoming a |
| 4 | closed group. |
| 5 | MR. TURNER: I thought we |
| 6 | were a closed group. Weren't we selected |
| 7 | by a selection committee and our number |
| 8 | established as limited? |
| 9 | MR. LEVY: In a sense yes. |
| 10 | The DoD policy, and this again, there is n |
| 11 | law driving us, this is DoD policy to set |
| 12 | up restoration advisory boards. Joe is |
| 13 | right about one thing, We are strictly an |
| 14 | advisory committee, so anybody who wants t |
| 15 | come in and put forth their concerns can d |
| 16 | that. However, that's what we've done her |
| 17 | is set up, under DoD's own policy, and of |
| 18 | course with DoD's own policy, we have set |
| 19 | up a selection committee, which was |
| 20 | selected by the community to do this. We |
| 21 | are following along the way DoD had decide |
