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1	MR. PETE CONROY: Shall we get
2	started? Thank you everyone for attending. This is
3	the November meeting of the Fort McClellan RAB. And
4	instead of doing the roll call, how about if we go
5	around the room and introduce ourselves since this is
6	our public meeting. And although I don't see too much
7	public, why don't we go ahead and introduce ourselves
8	and tell folks where you're from.
9	MR. CUNNINGHAM: I'm
10	Don Cunningham, and I have been at Fort McClellan for
11	many years, and currently work for a local contractor
12	and been on the RAB board since its inception.
13	MR. JERRY ELSER: Jerry Elser. I
14	live in Saks. And I have retired from Sears last
15	year, Sears Repair Services.
16	DR. BARRY COX: Barry Cox,
17	Jacksonville State University, live in Jacksonville,
18	Alabama.
19	MR. CHARLES TURNER: I'm Charles
20	Turner. I'm from Anniston.
21	MR. IKE BROWN: I'm Ike Brown, I'm
22	also from Anniston.
23	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: Ed Kimbrough,

- 1 represent The City of Weaver.
- 2 MR. LEVY: I'm Ron Levy, Fort
- 3 McClellan BRAC Environmental Coordinator.
- 4 MR. CONROY: Pete Conroy, and I
- 5 work at Jacksonville State University. And I'm acting
- 6 as co-chair right now.
- 7 MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: Chris Johnson.
- 8 I work for ADEM in Montgomery and help Ron clean the
- 9 Fort up.
- 10 MR. HOOD: I'm Ron Hood, and I live
- in Alexandria.
- 12 KEN WHITLEY: I'm Ken Whitley. I'm
- the Executive Director of JPA, and I live in
- 14 Jacksonville.
- MR. THOMASSY: And I'm
- 16 Fern Thomassy, and I live in Jacksonville.
- 17 MR. JAMES MILLER: Hi, I'm
- James Miller, and I live here in Anniston.
- 19 DR. MARY HARRINGTON: I'm Mary
- 20 Harrington, and I live here in Anniston.
- 21 MR. PETE CONROY: Does everybody
- have an agenda before them? One thing I wanted to do,
- which is not terribly positive news, but we're going

23 MR. RON LEVY: Keeping Jimmy -- and

1	I don't know if that's the right term but as a de
2	facto member, even though he probably won't be able to
3	attend meetings and be here.
4	MR. CHARLES TURNER: Well, a de
5	facto member would be a member in fact. So, would it
6	be an ex officio member?
7	MR. CONROY: I think that would
8	maybe be a better term.
9	MR. THOMASSY: Sure, I'm sure
10	that's the term he was looking for, yeah.
11	MR. CHARLES TURNER: Or a member -
12	MR. JAMES MILLER: I saw him
13	Thursday and he was looking a lot better than I
14	expected. You know, he's a little thin in the face,
15	but he's up and around.
16	MR. PETE CONROY: So, I guess the
17	motion is that Jimmy would be maintained as a ex
18	officio member. Second?
19	MR. JERRY ELSER: Second.
20	MR. PETE CONROY: All in favor?
21	(All in favor.)
22	MR. PETE CONROY: Approval of the
23	minutes. Does everybody have the minutes? Has

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1	everyone had a chance to look at them? Are we looking
2	at them, now? We'll take a minute. When everybody is
3	ready with a motion to adopt these minutes
4	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: So moved.
5	MR. PETE CONROY: Mayor Kimbrough.
6	Is there a second?
7	MS. HARRINGTON: Second.
8	MR. PETE CONROY: Minutes are
9	approved. At this stage, even though there is some
10	folks getting coffee, and it looks like a good idea,
11	how about we introduce ourselves.
12	MR. JOE DOYLE: Hi, I'm Joe Doyle.
13	I'm from the legal office at Fort McClellan.
14	MR. BRIAN GARLAND: I'm Brian
15	Garland. I'm his son.
16	MR. BILL GARLAND: I'm
17	Bill Garland, and I represent the U. S. Fish &
18	Wildlife Service.
19	MR. BILL SHANKS: Bill Shanks from
20	the Fort McClellan Environmental Office.
21	MS. KAREN PINSON: Karen Pinson
22	from the Fort McClellan Environmental Office.

MR. BOB (INAUDIBLE): I'm Bob

1	(inaudible) from the Alabama National Guard
2	Environmental Office at Fort McClellan.
3	MR. BERNIE CASE: I'm
4	Major Bernie Case. I work Army National Guard
5	Environmental Office.
6	MR. ELLIS POPE: I'm Ellis Pope
7	with the Corps of Engineers.
8	MR. PAUL JAMES: Paul James from
9	the Fort Environmental Office.
10	MS. LISA KINGSBURY: Lisa
11	Kingsbury, Fort McClellan Environmental Office.
12	MS. MICHELE MALONE: Michele
13	Malone, community relations environmental.
14	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: I'm Joan
15	McKinney with the RAB.
16	MS. DONNA FATHKE: Donna Fathke,
17	East Alabama Planning and Development Office.
18	MR. PETE CONROY: It's great to
19	have everybody here. And it's also good to see
20	Mr. Buford join us. Thank you.

the JPA, you had asked for that.

MR. RON LEVY: Pete, updates from

MR. PETE CONROY: I'm sorry?

1	MR. RON LEVY: An update from the
2	JPA, you had asked for that.
3	MR. PETE CONROY: Yes. We're real
4	glad to have Kenny here with us. And as a regular
5	function of these RAB meetings, I've asked that we
6	have an update from the JPA and no one is more
7	qualified to do that than Ken Whitley.
8	MR. KEN WHITLEY: I don't know what
9	you're interested in, but I can tell you that I think
10	we're comfortably on track in every way that I think
11	it's important to be. We're on our way to the master
12	lease in December, assuming the FOSL gets shaken out
13	comfortably. And I don't imagine any problem there
14	that can't be overcome.
15	If we get that master lease, when
16	we get that master lease, I've got a considerable cube
17	of people interested in leasing and then later perhaps
18	buying on the installation. One of the problems that
19	I'm faced with is: Often they will ask you to keep it
20	confidential. They don't want it in the paper. I was
21	Pets America was kind enough to let us do that,

just so we could kind of let the public know that

we're actually doing some marketing, but the poor guys

1	have been inundated with phone calls with people
2	looking to go to work for them and by other
3	communities that are interested in getting him to
4	locate there. So, I'm very reluctant to air firms'
5	names.
6	But if I talk in the most general
7	terms, I can tell you that Pets America, we finished
8	reviewing their business plan. It is a viable plan.
9	Any E-Commerce activity has both a more rapid growth
10	rate and a greater risk than traditional businesses by
11	and large. So, you kind of buy into the gamble, if
12	you will, when you go in there. But we'll enter into
13	negotiations with them if they're still interested and
14	we finished their you know, this business plan,
15	it's a big, thick thing. Took a while to get through
16	that.
17	I have a potential buyer for the
18	former WAC Museum that will produce a not
19	unsubstantial number of new jobs.
20	We have this non-profit
21	organization that the paper talked about recently that
22	we're entertaining.
23	We're down to the lawyer-to-lawyer

1	talks over an entity interested in buying the former
2	dental clinic. Would turn one side of it into a
3	medical clinic, the other side of it into a dental
4	clinic, and the back third of it into a dental lab.
5	And we're well along on that.
6	I've got a guy that wants to rent
7	the upstairs of building 61. If I get through that,
8	I'll get my first customer up there and help me pay my
9	rent.
10	We have a very large developer, a
11	coalition of corporations, who is interested in
12	developing the Fort. I have talked there are two
13	other LRAs who have partnered with major developers.
14	And we're getting copies of the documents. They are
15	substantial. One of the contracts from another place
16	is three volumes. You know, they're big, because it
17	gets down to the aesthetics of construction. And, of
18	course, they still have to adhere to all of the BRAC
19	requirements.
20	But there will be other major
21	developers that will show up on the horizon very

shortly. We have to shake those out and look at

revenue and a lot of things are involved in that.

22

1	The education consortium, we're
2	working closely with them to figure out the best
3	property for them to locate on the installation. You
4	know, we did reach a tentative contract with Auburn
5	for their activities out there. That was to tell
6	you the truth, came in handy.
7	We have submitted a site out there
8	for the states microelectronics industrial initiative.
9	It's about a two hundred acre site. That feedback
10	says we're about the best in Alabama, but there are a
11	number of states competing for that kind of business.
12	But one of the things that I could say, in sitting and
13	talking with these guys is, hey, Auburn is going to be
14	right down there, you know, and just because the
15	research level institution. We also talked about the
16	educational consortium and how they can pre-screen and
17	train up their employees.
18	The up side of that, were we to get
19	it, is just huge. I think it starts out at about
20	eighteen hundred employees and goes to nearly three
21	thousand. Because of that, of course, the politics of
22	it far outweigh the attractiveness of the property, by
23	the time it's all done.

1	But we haven't even marketed the
2	place. This is just what's showing up on the
3	doorstep.
4	This Wednesday we are having a tour
5	at the Fort for site selectors and developers that
6	were brought in and want to show around. And that
7	really kind of is the kickoff of our marketing
8	efforts. So, we'll go forward from there on.
9	We hope to have a deed to the
10	property that is that will be in the master lease
11	probably next summer, because it's category one. But
12	that's I'd be way too far out on a limb to predict
13	a time. We would shoot for May 15th and then, you
14	know, we'll have to work it and see how it shakes out.
15	Once we have that, then we can get down to sales.
16	Then, as other property out there
17	migrates from category seven to category one, it will
18	be integrated into the master lease or into the
19	deeding process, with the appropriate land use
20	constraint paragraphs, presumably.
21	The cleanup, you all may
22	probably know more about that than I do on the length
23	of time it's going to take. But there is property out

there that will not be developable for some years to
come. There are ways to clean up large tracts of land
quickly, a thing called a FOSFET, finding of
suitability for early transfer, wherein the federal
government provides the funding for that directly to
the JPA and we would contract directly with the
cleanup authority. At the end of the cleanup, the
government buys the environmental insurance for the
JPA. And it takes a lot of players out, layers of
bureaucracy, and you get it cleaned up quicker. So,
that's a prospect that we're looking at.

But right now, I feel very positive that we're going to generate a significant number of jobs. Those that are on the table here, would come to about seven hundred, over a period of four years. So, you know, we're not going to beam in three thousand jobs to replace those that went away instantly, but we're at the right place geographically, we're at the right point in time in the economic cycle for the United States, and we sit right between Atlanta that's kind of running out of water, and Birmingham that's kind of running out of air and employees. So, now is the time.

1	MR. PETE CONROY: Any questions?				
2	MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: Have you guys				
3	gotten moved?				
4	MR. KEN WHITLEY: We haven't signed				
5	the lease, yet, so no. Although, we've been over				
6	there and moved some furniture into the building,				
7	dusted off the place. But we're not physically there.				
8	MR. PETE CONROY: Into where are				
9	you moving?				
10	MR. KEN WHITLEY: Okay, Building				
11	61, and it's the former post headquarters right under				
12	the flag pole.				
13	MR. PETE CONROY: Right.				
14	MR. KEN WHITLEY: I want to tell				
15	you that ADEM and EPA were both extremely helpful to				
16	us in allowing us to pull that building out of the				
17	master lease to a separate FOSL and get it through the				
18	process and get us out there so we can be on the point				
19	end of the sword.				
20	MR. PETE CONROY: Terrific. What				
21	are the primary environmental concerns, more				
22	specifically, that you have right now?				
23	MR. KEN WHITLEY: The first is to				

1	understand the environmental issues that are out				
2	there. There is still lots of testing going on. I'd				
3	like to see the outcome of those and go from there.				
4	So, it's just it's those known, unknowns that still				
5	have to be defined.				
6	And then I think resolving the				
7	issue of land-use constraints, making sure that				
8	they're appropriate and reasonable, and then the idea				
9	that how do you know how does somebody twenty years				
10	from now know they're not supposed to dig there, you				
11	know, and what kind of controls how do you manage				
12	that downstream, many years down? And that's the				
13	major discussion, as I understand it, to put it in the				
14	crudest terms, but that's what it is.				
15	MR. PETE CONROY: Thank you.				
16	MR. KEN WHITLEY: Okay. My				
17	pleasure.				
18	MR. PETE CONROY: Ron, do you want				
19	to get started with old business?				
20	MR. RON LEVY: Yes. If you all				
21	remember, last month we passed out a copy of the FOSL,				
22	finding of suitability of reuse for the master lease				
23	to the Joint Powers Authority. And it was at that				

1	time that I asked you to take a look at it and come				
2	back with your comments, concerns, issues for this				
3	meeting. And I'll point out again, as I mentioned to				
4	you before, the property in there of course, we				
5	also know that there is some issues in here already.				
6	But the property in there was category one. Although				
7	there is a piece in here that ADEM pointed out to us				
8	wasn't category one. Well, it's a category one, but				
9	it was qualified that we're looking at and going to				
10	remove. But what I asked is for you to go back				
11	through it and tell me what your concerns were. So,				
12	I'll open up the meeting to discussion about the FOSL				
13	and about those facilities. We do have comments on				
14	this FOSL from ADEM. We don't see any reason why we				
15	can't satisfy the State's comments and addressing them				
16	all. So, we think that's good.				
17	Still waiting on comments from EPA.				
18	So, that's where we stand in terms of regulatory				
19	involvement.				
20	MR. PETE CONROY: Chris, do you				
21	want to summarize your comments?				
22	MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: The main issues				
23	were, we got into some areas on the maps that based				

1	on the way the maps are done, you can't really tell,
2	but it just it really seems that there was land
3	getting into range issues, like UXO, small arms
4	ranges, artillery fire ranges. And we just need to
5	make sure those properties aren't within this lease.
6	That was probably the biggest concern we had.
7	MR. PETE CONROY: Sure.
8	MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: Everything else
9	was, you know, fairly minor. You know, the maps
10	the maps need to be probably done a little bit better,
11	just, you know gridded off and coordinated where, you
12	know, these guys know what they're getting, as well as
13	anybody else that's coming out there.
14	Another concern we have, too, is
15	along with the land-use controls, not necessarily just
16	with the FOSL, but making sure these guys and the
17	folks they bring on the base are well aware of the
18	problems of where they are and where and the areas
19	to stay out of and why. So, it's some education that
20	needs to go on
21	MR. PETE CONROY: Sure.
22	MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: you know, as

they bring these tenants on the base and start showing

- 1 them around.
- 2 MR. RON LEVY: Let me point out for
- 3 you, this is the map in this area -- (pointing) -- I'm
- 4 sorry to do this -- but this area up here in the blue,
- 5 part of that is cat -- it's listed as category seven,
- 6 but it's qualified. And the state and both EPA also
- 7 mentioned that the issues associated with that in
- 8 their concurrence letter -- or conditional concurrence
- 9 letter were still to be worked out. So, we're going
- 10 to -- we're looking -- and we talked this with Miki,
- 11 we're going to look at removing that property, because
- 12 it is range areas that we're going out after from a
- 13 cleanup standpoint.
- MR. KEN WHITLEY: Right. But it
- shouldn't be a problem.
- MR. RON LEVY: Yeah.
- 17 MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: But overall,
- 18 it's a large master lease. It's a lot of land. What,
- 19 eight hundred and --
- 20 MR. KEN WHITLEY: Yeah, eight
- 21 hundred and fifty buildings.
- MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: So, there is a
- lot of property.

1	MR. RON LEVY: Why don't we just
2	pass the map around in case you want to take a quick
3	look at it. We're looking at approximately thirty-one
4	hundred acres and eight hundred and fifty-three
5	buildings that are part of the master lease.
6	MR. PETE CONROY: How many
7	buildings?
8	MR. RON LEVY: Eight hundred and
9	fifty-three buildings. Is there actually a change to
10	that number, Lisa?
11	MS. LISA KINGSBURY: A few of them
12	will drop out, based on comments, accidental category
13	sevens have gotten slipped in there.
14	MR. RON LEVY: It's split up into
15	areas. It was done like that on purpose to for
16	management purposes. Usually easier to manage in term
17	of defining areas.
18	MR. FERN THOMASSY: Ron, one
19	question: What's the time line now on this draft FOSL
20	that do you think that it's going to be the
21	comments will be back and it will be approved in some
22	few months?
23	MR. RON LEVY: We were hoping to

1	see the comments all in this month. In fact, thirty
2	days, given the time lines that we actually got it
3	out, I think it was received Chris, you got it
4	what, the 2nd of November?
5	MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: The 3rd. I
6	think November 3 is when we got it.
7	MR. RON LEVY: Excuse me, yeah.
8	I'm sorry, October.
9	MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: October 3rd. I
10	think the comments were due November 3rd or 5th, maybe
11	November 5th I think we may
12	MR. RON LEVY: So, you know, the
13	thirty day our requirement is to give the
14	regulatory agencies thirty days to review and then try
15	to address their comments. And we're still waiting or
16	comments from EPA, so I don't see and having talked
17	with Bart, I don't see that there is going to be
18	substantial or significant comments from the EPA,
19	either. Although I can't tell you, because I haven't
20	seen for certain, because I haven't seen their
21	comments, yet. But I would be very surprised if there
2.2	was anything really substantial that we couldn't get

through, because we all understand that this is cat

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1	one property where there is not supposed to be				
2	anything significant in terms of environmental				
3	constraints.				
4	MR. FERN THOMASSY: So, once you				
5	get them, unless there is something unexpected,				
6	hidden, that would come out of EPA, do you expect you				
7	would be able to resolve them and then incorporate				
8	them into a final by the first of the year?				
9	MR. RON LEVY: What I expect to be				
10	able to resolve I expect they'll get the comments				
11	and resolve them before the end of this month.				
12	MR. KEN WHITLEY: We shot for 15				
13	December as the signing date.				
14	MR. RON LEVY: Well, what the JPA				
15					
16	MR. KEN WHITLEY: That's a				
17	Wednesday. We might slip it to a Friday.				
18	MR. RON LEVY: Once it leaves Fort				
19	McClellan because, you know, we'll address it here				
20	at Fort McClellan. Once it leaves Fort McClellan, it				
21	goes up to our headquarters, TRADOC. And I know				
22	they're concurrently working with the BTT. And from				

there it goes through some legal reviews, and finally

environmental provisions that are in here.

MR. FERN THOMASSY: Yeah, the

MR. RON LEVY: Oh, you're talking

1	about the EPPs.				
2	MR. FERN THOMASSY: These appear to				
3	be something along the line of institutional controls				
4	Or am I incorrect?				
5	MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: They're just				
6	really one component of it.				
7	MR. THOMASSY: Okay.				
8	MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: The difficult				
9	part of the institutional controls is kind of what				
10	Kenny was talking to, as far as the actual				
11	restrictions or covenants that go in the deed, more so				
12	than to the monitoring and enforcement in the out				
13	years. Who is going to do it? How is it going to				
14	happen? How do we insure the people are staying out				
15	of these areas?				
16	And really, for this property, and				
17	this being a lease, it's not we're not into those				
18	issues on this property. We will be on other				
19	property. And that's				
20	MR. FERN THOMASSY: You focused				

21 them in on this one, on the few issues, asbestos --

MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: Yeah. A lot of

23 that's --

1	MR. FERN THOMASSY: lead-based
2	paint and things like that?
3	MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: Yeah, right.
4	MR. THOMASSY: You don't expect to
5	then have to have a complete approved set of
6	institutional controls going with the FOSL?
7	MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: For this FOSL?
8	MR. THOMASSY: For this FOSL?
9	MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: (Shakes head.)
10	Not for what we're what we're asking for, in
11	working with the Army, is the land-use control plan
12	that you've been hearing about. And that's not going
13	to have to we're not going to have to reach an
14	agreement on that to get this lease done.
15	MR. RON LEVY: The key here really
16	is that is a lease, as opposed to an actual transfer,
17	although that's still something that EPA and the State
18	are concerned about, even on leases. But when it
19	comes to transfer, it's and the property's actually
20	leaving the Army's hands, it becomes even more of a
21	critical issue for them.
22	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: Where are we on
23	the transfer of the properties to the governmental

1	agencies or I don't know if you've leased. But for
2	instance, Reilly Lake, Yahoo Lake, the water treatment
3	plant, where are we on those things? They were held
4	up. Are they still being held up or
5	MR. RON LEVY: Well, Reilly Lake
6	and Yahoo Lake were in the parks and recreation lease.
7	And they were both pulled out of the lease because
8	there is additional investigative work going on. And
9	we're not anywhere near transfer. We haven't even
10	gotten to the lease piece on that.
11	So, other things like the waste
12	water treatment plant, we're still waiting on, I
13	think, the water board. They're looking at funding
14	issues on a grant that and I haven't heard anything
15	new on that. Maybe Donna could address that.
16	MS. DONNA FATHKE: They've just
17	been awarded the first phase. There is actually two
18	grants that we've put in for them. And one was to do
19	the initial testing to see what work how extensive
20	they needed to work on the system. And the second was
21	for actual construction. They've been awarded the
22	first one, so we'll be starting on that very soon.

The second one we're still waiting to hear from them.

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1	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: What about
2	utilities, transfer of the metering and all that?
3	MR. RON LEVY: Well, I can tell you
4	that on the utilities, the easements, which really
5	were easements, both Alabama Power easement is in
6	place and has been executed. The easement to
7	BellSouth is in place, and they've executed the
8	easement. The easement for Alabama Gas is going to be
9	executed, I think, tomorrow.
10	MR. POPE: 1 December, Ron,
11	Alagasco asked for additional time to make sure all
12	the plans were in place to be
13	MR. RON LEVY: I stand corrected, 1
14	December. So, that's real close.
15	And the only other one was the
16	water and sewer, and that was what we were just
17	talking about, in terms of utilities.
18	Did I miss any of the utilities?
19	So, we've actually and if you come out to the Fort
20	and you take a look around, especially on the power,
21	you can see Alabama Power out there clearing around
22	the lines, which we have been negligent in doing over
23	the years. They're pulling you know, they're

1	cutting the trees back from the lines, which should
2	have been done a long time ago.
3	And BellSouth, you know, we in the
4	garrison are already under BellSouth's calling plan.
5	You know, we're paying for their services, as opposed
6	to what we had when we had our own switch. And
7	Alabama National Guard is working off of their own
8	switch, which is out of Montgomery, I believe. So,
9	that phone system has already been changed over.
10	What else can I tell you? Any
11	other comments about the FOSL? We understand it's
12	critical. We really do want to get this finalized so
13	that JPA can start bringing customers in. I know
14	Chris is taking it very seriously, so, we're doing
15	everything we can to make sure the property is
16	available for lease as soon as possible. And I hope
17	we can meet your dates.
18	MR. KEN WHITLEY: Right. I just
19	worry if it slips out, some of these fish I've got on
20	the hook will get off the hook, you know, and I don't
21	want to see that happen.
22	Under a lease, you know, they can't
23	do capital construction. They can do modifications

1	inside and that sort of stuff, so, we need to get on
2	to the FOST as soon as we can so someone can build
3	parking lots or things that they need to do for
4	businesses.

MR. RON LEVY: Right. And as I understand, what you're intending to do immediately after the master lease is in place is start to go after the FOST, but you've got to work your business plan on that.

10 MR. KEN WHITLEY: Yeah.

MR. RON LEVY: And that's the difficult -- and the economic development conveyances, which is the real difficult part. And that takes time to put together.

MR. KEN WHITLEY: We have some huge decisions to make in that time frame about exactly how do we want to develop the housing, do we want to hand it over to a single developer, multiple developers, do we want to develop some of it ourselves, do we want to tear some of it down because the land is more valuable than the housing. There is a lot of that that's not yet fully thought through. And that drives the business plan.

1	MR. PETE CONROY: Anything else?
2	MR. RON LEVY: Any other questions?
3	I've got a whole host of experts over there from my
4	office that will just love to tell you what's going
5	on. I like putting Lisa on the spot.
6	MR. PETE CONROY: Why don't we talk
7	about our membership applications.
8	MR. RON LEVY: Yeah. And if I
9	could ask Joan to bring Joan in and let her talk
10	about that.
11	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Thank you. Do
12	any of you have any we had passed some out last
13	week do any of you have any applications or do you
14	need any extras to nominate someone to fill this one
15	vacancy that we have? Because I have some extras
16	here.
17	MR. PETE CONROY: The forms.
18	MR. CHARLES TURNER: Which vacancy
19	is this?
20	MR. RON LEVY: Jimmy's.
21	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Jimmy Parks'.
22	And it looks like what we'll do is, you, last month,
23	went ahead and decided that you would just let us use

1	the existing applicants that we have. We have three
2	in the file. We have called them. We've left
3	messages. We have so far one yes and two others that
4	we'll get back to you. But we have
5	MS. MICHELE MALONE: We have two
6	yeses.
7	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: We have two
8	yeses, now. Okay, great. So then with those, plus
9	some of the application nominations that you have
10	given me and others that may come in, then I recommend
11	that after the first of the year, at our next meeting,
12	we just lay these out and vote on them like we did the
13	last time. So again, we'll have them here at the
14	table when you go out, if you have a nominee you would
15	like to place before the committee. Thank you.
16	MR. RON LEVY: So, we'll put it on
17	the January RAB meeting for election of a member, and
18	we'll do that actual election.
19	If y'all remember, we don't have a
20	
	meeting in December because of the holidays and people
21	not being around. So, our next meeting won't be until
22	January 10th. In fact, Joan took the liberty and I

think this is good. Right in front of you is our

1	meeting dates for the upcoming meetings. She's also
2	rescheduled, based on third Mondays the month of
3	January and February being holidays, of putting down
4	dates. If anybody has got an objection to those
5	dates, let me know. I've given the time lines. We
6	thought we'd just put those dates out.
7	MR. PETE CONROY: And I guess it's
8	been noted, but there is no December meeting.
9	MR. RON LEVY: Correct, right.
10	MR. CHARLES TURNER: I'd move that
11	we approve this meeting calendar.
12	MR. PETE CONROY: Second anyone?
13	MR. IKE BROWN: Second.
14	MR. PETE CONROY: So moved.
15	MS. MICHELE MALONE: I did want to
16	say notice that February's meeting is on Valentine's
17	Day.
18	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: You may all
19	want to reschedule that one.
20	MR. PETE CONROY: With one possible
21	exception. All in favor?
22	MR. CHARLES TURNER: We might need
23	to amend that motion. Valentine's Day is important.

1	MR. PETE CONROY: I said with that
2	one exception.
3	MR. CHARLES TURNER: Well, should
4	we then make it the 28th?
5	MR. PETE CONROY: Sure.
6	MR. RON LEVY: Could get you in
7	trouble with your sweetheart if you're not
8	celebrating.
9	MR. CHARLES TURNER: I would amend
10	my original motion to change that to February the
11	28th, 2000.
12	MR. RON LEVY: February the 28th is
13	the last Monday in the month.
14	MR. CHARLES TURNER: Yeah, since
15	yeah.
16	MR. RON LEVY: The last day in the
17	month, the last day is Tuesday.
18	MR. CHARLES TURNER: Okay, I called
19	the question.
20	MR. PETE CONROY: Do you accept
21	that friendly amendment?
22	MR. IKE BROWN: I do.
23	MR. PETE CONROY: All in favor? So

1	moved.
2	MR. RON LEVY: Somebody help me out
3	here. When is our next quarterly? Will that be in
4	the month of March?
5	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: It would be in
6	February.
7	MR. IKE BROWN: February.
8	MR. RON LEVY: So, even though
9	we're not having one in okay. So we're looking at
10	old holding that off Fort McClellan, as well. And I
11	guess we can get you out of some of the (inaudible)
12	sites, unless somebody just happens to have an idea as
13	to where we might want to go.
14	MR. CHARLES TURNER: Have we ever
15	met in West Anniston or Hobson City?
16	DR. MARY HARRINGTON: Met in West
17	Anniston at 17th Street.
18	MR. CHARLES TURNER: I'd say
19	MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: How about
20	Golden Springs?
21	MR. CHARLES TURNER: I'm sorry,
22	what?

MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: How about

1	Golden Springs?
2	MR. CHARLES TURNER: Yeah.
3	MR. THOMASSY: Taking votes, how
4	about Las Vegas?
5	MR. RON LEVY: With the Army
6	funding it, right?
7	DR. BARRY COX: Volunteer the JSU
8	Library, if you want to come to Jacksonville.
9	MR. CHARLES TURNER: We met there
10	before.
11	MR. RON LEVY: Joan, if we were
12	rotating around like we've done, where would be the
13	next place that we would go?
14	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: You know, I
15	think down in the Oxford, Golden Springs area might be
16	the next best place.
17	MR. CHARLES TURNER: Friendship
18	Community Center or Golden Springs Community Center.
19	MS. DONNA FATHKE: Or the Oxford
20	Civic Center.
21	MR. CHARLES TURNER: Haven't we met
22	there? We haven't gotten the residential folks out.
23	DR. MARY HARRINGTON: We went to

1	the Oxford Mall. Now, we haven't been to Hobson City.
2	MR. PETE CONROY: Didn't we one
3	time?
4	DR. MARY HARRINGTON: We haven't
5	been to Hobson City.
6	MR. PETE CONROY: Must have been
7	something else.
8	MR. RON LEVY: What about Piedmont?
9	DR. MARY HARRINGTON: Haven't we
10	been to Piedmont?
11	MR. RON LEVY: No, haven't been
12	there. I don't believe we have.
13	MR. PETE CONROY: We have not.
14	MR. CHARLES TURNER: I'd say
15	Friendship Community Center, if they'll let us in.
16	MR. PETE CONROY: That would be
17	great. Let's come to some sort of consensus here.
18	MR. CHARLES TURNER: Move that we
19	have Michele wants to make a point.
20	MS. MICHELE MALONE: Well, I kind
21	of recommend Golden Spring Community Center, not

because I live out there, but the eastern bypass is

going right in front of the community center and

- 3 MR. CHARLES TURNER: If you want to
- 4 really get in the frying pan, let's meet up at Donoho
- 5 Lower School where it's coming within a couple of
- 6 hundred feet.
- 7 MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: And let's
- 8 invite ADOT to the meeting.
- 9 MR. CHARLES TURNER: And all of the
- 10 residents up there at Lake Louise.
- 11 MR. PETE CONROY: We might have
- 12 some people show up.
- 13 MR. CHARLES TURNER: That's right.
- MR. PETE CONROY: Anyone want to
- make a motion to that effect?
- 16 MR. CHARLES TURNER: I would say
- that we meet at either Golden Springs or Friendship
- 18 Community Center.
- 19 MR. PETE CONROY: Oh, come on,
- 20 narrow it down a little more, would you?
- 21 MR. CHARLES TURNER: Well, just
- give Michele and Joan some latitude.
- MR. PETE CONROY: Okay.

1	MR. CHARLES TURNER: If they have
2	problems with one
3	MR. PETE CONROY: Teriffic.
4	MR. CHARLES TURNER: they can go
5	to the other.
6	MR. PETE CONROY: Second for that?
7	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Thank you.
8	MR. IKE BROWN: Second.
9	MR. PETE CONROY: All in favor? So
10	moved. Thanks, Charles.
11	New business?
12	MR. RON LEVY: Should be in front
13	of you, a copy of the environmental assessment for
14	decommissioning the Fort McClellan, Pelham Range
15	burial mounds. Let me see if I can't synopsize what's
16	going on out there. Pelham Range, which is now under
17	license to the Alabama National Guard, has a history
18	of training done by the chemical school, radiation
19	training done by the chemical school. In this
20	particular case what they were trying to do at this
21	particular site was simulate a fallout field. They
22	used cobalt 60, it was a source. The sources were on
23	were out in this pattern in an area called Ride-Out

1	Field. And they raised and lowered these sources.
2	And if you had a radi-ac (phonetic) instrument you
3	could determine, you know, through surveys, you know,
4	that you had a fallout pattern.
5	All the source material was
6	removed. It was removed back in when they
7	originally left, back in the '50s '70s. Excuse me.
8	When they originally left. However, there was a site
9	out there, a burial mound, a site where they actually
10	did some of the disposal actions, and what they
11	actually went through and did a removal at the
12	disposal site. But they did it based on release
13	limits back in the '70s.
14	We went back and did another
15	survey. And guess what? Some of the source material
16	was above release limits because the law changed.
17	So, we have a burial mound out
18	there that has cobalt 60. It's also got cesium. But
19	we believe the cesium is associated with the fallout,
20	actual nuclear fallout. But they're going to go back
21	in and remove those. And it really means we're going
22	to go in and we're going to remove that whole mound

and cart it off to a licensed disposal facility.

1	MR. CHARLES TURNER: So, how many
2	Hiroshimas is it equal to out there?
3	MR. RON LEVY: The risk is
4	extremely low. In fact, you would have to live on top
5	of it, grow crop, have the crop uptake, and then feed
6	off of the crop before you actually had a real health
7	risk. But because it's still above NRC release
8	limits, and NRC wants us to go back and do the
9	removal, we're going back in to do the removal. And
10	part of that removal process calls for us to do
11	National Environmental Policy Act, which is NEPA. In
12	this case it's an environmental assessment that we're
13	doing. And you've got a copy of that EA in front of
14	you.
15	What we're doing is telling the
16	public we're going out there to remove the source.
17	And if the public has got any comments to that effect,
18	we're taking comments. And it went out in the
19	newspaper the
20	MS. LISA KINGSBURY: November 9th.
21	MR. RON LEVY: So, there is a
22	thirty day public comment period as it relates to the
23	EN and what walre doing out on Dalham Pange So

1	we're taking comments associated with the removal
2	action that we're doing on Pelham for this source.
3	And because this is a public forum, we're addressing
4	it here also in the RAB as a cleanup issue. And any
5	comments that you've got concerning that and I've
6	got to tell you, there is a lot of money associated
7	with this cleanup for this source. Almost
8	MR. CHARLES TURNER: And all you do
9	is you take the dirt and you put it in a special
10	container and then take it to an approved landfill?
11	MR. RON LEVY: It's not an approved
12	landfill. It an NRC help me out here, Lisa a
13	licensed site.
14	MS. LISA KINGSBURY: Licensed
15	facility.
16	MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: Licensed to
17	handle radioactive material.
18	MR. RON LEVY: Yeah, which is a
19	little different from what you would consider a
20	landfill. But, yeah, in a nutshell, Charles, that's
21	what we're doing.
22	MR. PETE CONROY: In your best
23	estimation, where is it going?

1	MR. FERN THOMASSY: Utah.
2	MR. JAMES MILLER: How will we get
3	it there?
4	MR. CHARLES TURNER: Any way we can
5	get it sent to Fort Leonard Wood?
6	MR. FERN THOMASSY: If it isn't
7	it all considered low level?
8	MR. RON LEVY: It is.
9	MR. FERN THOMASSY: Very low level?
10	MR. RON LEVY: It's very low level,
11	extremely low level. And what's driving us here,
12	folks, is not the risk, it is the NRC release limits
13	that we just need to get out from under. And we want
14	to have absolutely unrestricted use of the property.
15	So, in order to do that, we need to go in and complete
16	this removal action.
17	MR. CHARLES TURNER: How much dirt
18	are you having to take up?
19	MR. RON LEVY: It's a good
20	question. I can't tell you off the top of my head.
21	MR. CHARLES TURNER: A bunch.
22	MR. RON LEVY: Lisa, do you
23	remember how many cubic areas of soil that was?

1	MS. LISA KINGSBURY: Twenty-five
2	meters by fifteen meters. And it's, oh, I don't know
3	how many feet tall. And then they're going about
4	eight feet deep. So, it's a lot of dirt.
5	MR. RON LEVY: It would I think
6	it was mentioned
7	MR. CHARLES TURNER: It's the mound
8	where they've piled off the contaminated dirt before?
9	MR. RON LEVY: It's a mound where
10	yes, it's the mound where the source sources
11	actually may have been in there. And what it did was
12	it gave off enough source material into the dirt
13	they removed the source material, but now the dirt,
14	itself, has become contaminated. So, yes, that's what
15	we're talking about.
16	Some of you may have seen it. It
17	was in the Anniston Star on the front page of the
18	paper, there was an article. It was also in the
19	Birmingham News, because we did have a public release.
20	And they came out there and folks took pictures and
21	asked questions.
22	The U. S. Army Chemical School
22	still holds the ligense for this. They are now at

	SAMANTHA E. NOBLE NOBLE & ASSOCIATES 44
1	Fort Leonard Wood, but they're on the hook. And their
2	health physicist by the name of John May is the person
3	working this with my office to do the removal. And he
4	comes back.
5	There's a contract been let to ATG.
6	I can tell you that the contract is eight hundred
7	thousand, plus, in terms of the removal action out
8	there. So, it's an expensive removal. But as most of
9	you know, everything we do in the environmental arena
10	is expensive, just in terms of insuring that we're
11	getting it all.
12	But I can take any questions that
13	you've got. If you want to take it back home with
14	you, take a look at it, come back at the next meeting,
15	we can open this up also for some discussion.
16	MR. CHARLES TURNER: Is that what
17	give us a hint about what the issues would be. I
18	mean, is it related to the disposal method or
19	MR. RON LEVY: No. Actually, we're
20	following the process. We're doing what NEPA requires

us to do. In terms of the issues, we're going to do a

complete removal out there, get below (inaudible)

limits. So, I don't know that there is an issue,

21

22

1	myself, personally. We are going to do the complete
2	removal.
3	MR. CHARLES TURNER: I mean, there
4	aren't any local issues, as far as there is a safer
5	way of doing it or there is a risk of a spill on a
6	local highway that I mean, none of that, right?
7	MR. FERN THOMASSY: Not yet.
8	MR. RON LEVY: I can't imagine
9	MR. CHARLES TURNER: I mean, but
10	even if you spill the dirt on the highway, all you
11	would have to do is clean it up, right?
12	MR. RON LEVY: It is a very low
13	level. And again we're talking about meeting this NRC
14	issues instead of risk to the public health.
15	MR. JOE DOYLE: Ron, if I might
16	correct you, the comment period is going to be long
17	gone by the time of the next RAB meeting. So,
18	everybody that's got comments needs to follow the
19	(inaudible) in terms of making comments back to your
20	office with regard to that.
21	MR. RON LEVY: Yeah, the thirty day
22	comment period will end since we are
23	MR. PETE CONROY: Good point.

1	MR. RON LEVY: Yeah, will end
2	before we get back together since January we're not
3	getting back.
4	If you do have comments, you can
5	send it to my office you can call me up, everybody
6	has got my phone number and let us know.
7	MR. FERN THOMASSY: Charles, I
8	think probably the significant part of this on the
9	back page where it says the Army has already made it a
10	finding that they believe it's a FOST I mean,
11	finding of no significant impact.
12	MR. CHARLES TURNER: Yeah, it
13	sounds the same to me.
14	MR. FERN THOMASSY: Right. It's
15	simple as can be from their standpoint.
16	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Ron, could I
17	just add one thing? And you did briefly mention there
18	was a very extensive media tour where all the
19	television folks and all the journalists were there.
20	They were free to ask any questions, you know, the
21	full disclosure policy, along with we reminded them
22	that the documentation is on file at the repositories,
23	both at JSU and at Anniston, and you can go look at

1 those	documents,	also.
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2 MR. RON LEVY: There is always a 3 possibility that somebody is smarter than us or knows 4 something that went on out there that we're not aware 5 of. That's what we're looking at, full disclosure, 6 wanting the community to understand what we're doing. 7 And if you know something that we're not aware of that 8 you can tell us up front, we want to hear about it. We can always change what it is we're doing to address 9 maybe even additional cleanup, if necessary. And 10 11 we've seen that happen. We've had folks, as we went through the EBS process, tell us about areas that we 12 were able to capture later on that we weren't aware 13 of. 14 15 MR. CHARLES TURNER: But with this, I mean, it's just a matter of putting a Geiger counter 16 to the ground, and if it clicks you know that it's --17 18 MR. RON LEVY: Has a certain reading, yes. We see it that way, too. But again, 19 20 you know, we want to make sure the public understands 21 what we're doing and doesn't have any questions 22 outside of what our knowledge is in that area. 23 DR. BARRY COX: Ron, just as

1	procedural question, since we're supposed to be
2	disseminating information to the public, you know, if
3	at all possible, I would like for us to find out in
4	the RAB meetings as opposed to reading it in the
5	newspaper. Is there any way we could have this
6	brought to the RAB before it goes public?
7	MR. RON LEVY: Yes, there is.
8	MR. CHARLES TURNER: Or before or
9	within the comment period?
10	MR. RON LEVY: Well, there is a bit
11	of timing, because we're trying like on FOSLs and
12	whatnot or FOSTs, we do publish those as well as
13	the requirement. Now, if we're trying to meet time
14	lines that are set up, getting them into the newspaper
15	- now, we may be able to include it in mailings
16	earlier, as opposed to actually sending them to you
17	sitting it down at a meeting. That I can do to you,
18	but I can't promise that I can always get you the
19	information, you know, at that meeting, if we're
20	running into a time line issue. So, it's somewhere
21	between I will do my best to get the information
22	out to you by mail, if we know that there is something
23	coming up and the meeting is not going to the

1	meeting is not going to coincide with that.
2	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: How long has this
3	been going on, as far as knowing about this?
4	MR. RON LEVY: It's been we've
5	known about it for a long time. And I think if you
6	read it, it's identified in the environmental baseline
7	survey, too, so it's been it was addressed in
8	there, I mean, as a site.
9	MR. FERN THOMASSY: I think that
10	article in the paper said that this mound was created
11	in 1973, after the chemical school left here and they
12	cleaned that area out.
13	MR. RON LEVY: Yeah, the training
14	had been going on way before that. But when we left
15	when the chem school left to go to Aberdeen, that's
16	when they closed the site out and didn't
17	MR. FERN THOMASSY: Right.
18	MR. RON LEVY: get all the
19	removals. And at that time, I can tell you that they
20	actually got a release from NRC for the site out
21	there. But again, as we went back through and we
22	started doing this additional investigations out on

Pelham Range and main post, we did another survey, and

23

1	sure enough, the levels out there exceeded NRC. And
2	we notified NRC of that. So, we went back into
3	another phase of cleanup. They reinstated the
4	license. And we're back up under a license until we
5	meet the cleanup goals.
6	And this is not something we're
7	doing strictly with NRC. Both ADEM and the state
8	health folks are involved, plus, EPA is involved, as
9	well.
10	MR. PETE CONROY: Chris, you have
11	ADEM or EPA, to the best of your knowledge, have
12	any issues regarding this that haven't been addressed?
13	MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: Really for RAD
14	stuff, ADEM relies on Department of Public Health
15	radiation control. And Rick Butley (phonetic) with
16	EPA works with Bart on it. So, it's really you
17	know, ADEM is in the loop just to make sure we
18	understand that the RAD stuff is cleaned up before we
19	sign off on a FOST or FOSL or that. But really,
20	they're the technical review experts on RAD.
21	I would like to say that the I
22	don't know if Ron was stating that it wasn't a health
22	gongorn I don't know if that's a fair statement

1	The levels of cleanup are health and risk-based
2	cleanup standards. And there is, you know, there is
3	even EPA, to my understanding, even has a little
4	bit more stringent standard than NRC does. But they
5	certainly are health based and risk-based levels that
6	have to be met. And the license is only a mechanism
7	that the NRC uses to insure those cleanup levels are
8	met before the Army can, you know, terminate the
9	license.
10	MR. PETE CONROY: Well, without a
11	doubt, it's important that this is handled correctly
12	and as easily as it should be. From, I know your
13	point of view in particular, this is something that
14	probably could find its way in other newspapers of
15	MR. RON LEVY: And this particular
16	piece of property is staying in Army hands. And from
17	the Guard's standpoint, they want unrestricted use,
18	since it's been licensed to them. So, they, as a
19	concerned entity, want to see it cleaned up, as well.
20	MR. PETE CONROY: Perceptions can
21	get out of hand so easy.
22	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: I guess, getting
23	back to what Barry said is some of the folks on my

7 that's --

DR. COX: Yes, that's what -
MAYOR KIMBROUGH: -- what Barry was
saying. Because it -- you know, they ask me, say,
aren't you on the cleanup committee and what is this
going on? And I say, I don't know. I saw it in the
paper just like you did.

MR. RON LEVY: Yeah, I absolutely agree with you. And I think from our standpoint I did not look out to see whether or not -- because I do understand the RAB gets questions from the community, and I did not look out and see that this was something that, you know, -- something like you might get questions about, because we could have presented this information to you earlier. But honestly, that was an oversight as opposed to, you know, purposely doing that. And I think in the future, we need to be

1	cognizant of it and try to get the information to you
2	earlier so that you can answer questions that people
3	are going to ask you about it.
4	DR. COX: Let me propose something
5	that may help in that regard. What about at each RAB
6	meeting, maybe no more than one page, but just
7	something that says, here is what went on last month,
8	boom, boom, boom, and here is what's coming up in the
9	future? It doesn't have to go into great detail. It
10	just simply and maybe that will jog your mind a
11	little bit, we need to be reminded
12	MR. CHARLES TURNER: It will also
13	make Pete (inaudible) easier.
14	MR. PETE CONROY: Action summary.
15	DR. BARRY COX: Just an action
16	summary at each RAB meeting, here is an action summary
17	of what went on the last month, here's our success
18	stories, here is what we accomplished, here is things
19	that we're working on that's coming up in the future.
20	And it would help us out a lot, I'm sure, fairly
21	brief, fairly concise.
22	MR. RON LEVY: Yeah, I don't see
23	why we couldn't do that. In fact we may be able to

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1	get it out in the mailing part to the RAB meetings.
2	DR. BARRY COX: Great.
3	MR. RON LEVY: We kind of do
4	something like that internal
5	DR. COX: Okay.
6	MR. RON LEVY: But, yeah, let me
7	think about this and see how we can format it so that
8	it's easily understandable by the RAB members.
9	DR. BARRY COX: Okay.
10	MR. PETE CONROY: Any other
11	thoughts?
12	MR. FERN THOMASSY: Just a piece of
13	curiosity information is why I'm going to ask this
14	question. You mentioned the cesium 137 being a
15	contaminant from actual fallout. Can you elaborate on
16	that? That
17	MR. RON LEVY: Well, we never used
18	it out there, so and we did and we did in fact
19	discover it, but and this was talking from the
20	health physicist, because as he understands this I
21	mean, this is actually not atypical when you go out

and look at a site you'll see cesium just because

historically cesium -- I mean, it's still falling out

22

1	from the nuclear tests that occurred in the past. In
2	fact, you see it in milk, cows' milk and uptake from
3	cows eating off of the land. So, it's actually
4	naturally I won't say naturally out there. It's
5	out there and it's occurred and this is the
6	explanation I get from where the cesium most likely
7	came from, because we never used it.
8	MR. FERN THOMASSY: So, it's
9	accumulated above the NRC minimum level just through
10	routine fallout?
11	MR. RON LEVY: Well, I think and
12	I think NRC understands that.
13	MR. FERN THOMASSY: That's what
14	they think?
15	MR. RON LEVY: In fact, I don't
16	know that they ever raised a question about the
17	cesium. I can get you a better explanation.
18	MR. FERN THOMASSY: It just happens
19	to be in that spot, but it's all over the rest of
20	Pelham Range, as well, if that's the case, that's what
21	
22	MR. RON LEVY: I think I'm the
23	wrong person to be asking this greation, because I

1	can't tell you. But honestly, this is the explanation
2	I've been given: There is fallout material out there
3	that's associated with past practices of our
4	government and other governments that are associated
5	with nuclear tests. It's very low level. And I can't
6	tell you and apparently the risks are the risks
7	are really not there. But it's out there.
8	MR. FERN THOMASSY: But it appears
9	to be logic would say that any other piece of soil we
10	take here, on Pelham Range, in my backyard, should
11	have the same level of cesium contamination unless we
12	concentrated something here in some other unnatural
13	fashion.
14	MR. RON LEVY: I would agree with
15	you. And I
16	MR. FERN THOMASSY: I wonder why
17	cesium then is even an issue.
18	MR. RON LEVY: Because it was
19	discovered there.
20	MR. FERN THOMASSY: Probably
21	because it was discovered. And if we took the sample
22	did anybody take a sample somewhere else away from
23	this to determine the background level that was

1	natural because of an unnatural act?
2	MR. RON LEVY: Well, I know that
3	there are background levels for cesium that they've
4	already done across the country. So, it's listed in
5	there because it came out in the sampling.
6	MR. PETE CONROY: Another question?
7	MR. FERN THOMASSY: He's throwing
8	anthropogenic at me and it hurt.
9	MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: We did this
10	it's the same principle for metals. See, we did
11	background studies for metals at Fort McClellan
12	because metals naturally occurring, either manmade
13	anthropogenic, which means manmade, but it's naturally
14	occurring, or it's truly naturally occurring as it
15	would reside in soils and rocks from God. But
16	nonetheless, you do not, you know, typically clean up
17	anything that's more stringent than a background level
18	or you would be cleaning up the county.
19	So, that's a good question. I'm
20	kind of curious, too, as to the cesium and where are
21	they even going to know when to draw a quick
22	(inaudible). You know what I mean? I mean, if that
23	truly is background, it's going to be hard to know

1	where to draw your line when you're out there with
2	your shovel.
3	MR. JAMES MILLER: A cesium cloud
4	that flew over the area and rained down in that one
5	particular spot?
6	MR. PETE CONROY: Sounds like an X
7	file.
8	MR. CHRIS JOHNSON: Again,
9	radiation control is reviewing this. Maybe Lisa could
10	follow that up.
11	MR. PETE CONROY: Anything else on
12	that?
13	MS. LISA KINGSBURY: Cesium?
14	MR. RON LEVY: I need to back up
15	here for just a second, because it wasn't cesium I'm
16	thinking about, it was another
17	MS. LISA KINGSBURY: It's cobalt
18	and cesium.
19	MR. RON LEVY: No, but it wasn't
20	cesium that I was thinking about here.

7	So, that's where you're at.
8	MR. PETE CONROY: Nominations?
9	MR. CHARLES TURNER: So, for
10	vice-chair?
11	MR. PETE CONROY: Right.
12	MR. CHARLES TURNER: I nominate
13	Don Cunningham.
14	MR. PETE CONROY: You accept the
15	nomination?
16	MR. DON CUNNINGHAM: I am not sure
17	that I can. My situation doesn't really allow me to
18	do that. I would like to, but I would like to
19	respectfully decline. But I would like to make a
20	nomination. I would like to nominate Dr. Barry Cox.
21	MR. JERRY ELSER: I'll second.
22	MR. CHARLES TURNER: Move the
23	nominations be closed.

1	MR. PETE CONROY: Can you accept
2	the nomination?
3	DR. BARRY COX: (Nods head.)
4	MR. PETE CONROY: Second for
5	closure?
6	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: Second.
7	MR. PETE CONROY: All in favor of
8	electing Dr. Barry Cox as the vice-chair indicate by a
9	sign of I. Unanimous.
10	Well, as I close out my term
11	MR. CHARLES TURNER: Your
12	administration
13	MR. PETE CONROY: in my efforts
14	to keep these meetings to one hour, any comments from
15	the audience? Thank you. I'm kidding.
16	MR. CHARLES TURNER: Move that we
17	adjourn.
18	MR. PETE CONROY: So moved. We're
19	out of here.
20	(WHEREUPON, the meeting was concluded.)
