6	to that?			
7	M	R. RON LEVY:	Okay. We'll,	
8	do that then.			
9	M	S. MIKI SCHNEIDER:	Ron, one	
10	question. Is that on all or	f the landfills or		
11	just -			
12	M	R. RON LEVY:	No, just the	
13	three borings that were o	off the installation		
14	that were associated with	h landfill three.		
15	M	S. MIKI SCHNEIDER:	Okay.	
16	Di	R. BARRY COX:	Okay. Is this	
17	the next one the list, pro	jected dates?		
18	M	R. RON LEVY:	Yeah.	
19	Everybody should have	in front of them a list of		
20	sites that are going to be	done under EE/CAs or		
21	going to an RI phase tha	t we know at this point.		
22	And the reason this list v	was put together was		
23	based on a RAB request	two weeks ago. And wh	nen	

1	is our projected submittal date? And why is
2	that important to the RAB? Well, it's important
3	to the RAB because what we would like to see is
4	some review of the material and then feedback
5	from the RAB. One of those EE/CAs is out, but
б	it was not possible for us to give it to
7	everybody. But we talked about a technical
8	review committee so, what we would like to know
9	is whether or not we can give that document to
10	the technical review committee which we voted
11	on, not last month, but two months ago, because
12	that's ready for review.
13	DR. BARRY COX: Any comments
14	on that?
15	MS. DONNA FATHKE: Can I ask
16	what a draft RI is?
17	MR. RON LEVY: What a draft RI
18	is? It's a remedial investigation. When you're
19	going into an SI what you're looking for is
20	whether or not there's contamination there. I'
21	trying to make this site investigation very
22	simple. If you go from an SI phase to an RI
23	phase you know there's contamination there.

1	You're sent to look at the extent of the
2	contamination or the characterization of that
3	contamination. And generally along with an RI
4	goes a feasibility study, which kind of defines
5	your alternatives for clean-up and then a record
6	of decision and then the meeting would actually
7	come after that.
8	So, when you see these RI sites,
9	it's sites that we believe we know we've got
10	contamination there. It's sites that were taken
11	to the next phase and we want to look at the
12	extent and fully characterize the site.
13	That's as simple as I can put it.
14	There's probably a better technical way of
15	putting it. I don't know if anyone wants to
16	chime in on it. And that's important to you,
17	because you're going to want to know what the
18	Army is doing on these sites, and we want
19	feedback from you on what in terms is important
20	to you on a clean-up standpoint.
21	EE/CAs, in this case for the ranges
22	of iron on Mountain Road, fill parcels, those
23	are really an SI level investigations.

1	But we'll also come out with
2	alternatives. We'll define alternatives in the
3	EE/CA. So, you'll get to see those
4	alternatives. You'll get to see why we define
5	those alternatives. What's important there.
6	Cost will also be in there, as
7	well, because EE/CA stands for Engineering
8	Evaluation Cost Analysis. And then our
9	contractor will recommend an alternative that
10	they see fit. Not only will the RAB get a
11	chance to review that feedback, but the
12	regulatory brethren will also review the
13	document, provide us feedback and guidance and
14	hopefully we'll get concurrence on their part as
15	well or we'll look to go in a different
16	direction. And that's why we want to put this
17	out to you, so you'll know what's coming and I
18	think this was Barry's initiave.
19	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Is there
20	a map that could be associated with this so that
21	people could understand where these places are?
22	MR. RON LEVY: We can
23	definitely pull site maps out if we want to see

1	those, too. At this point, yes, we can.
2	MS. DONNA FATHKE: And your
3	project is submitted to who?
4	MR. RON LEVY: They're
5	submitted to the Army as drafts.
6	MR. JAMES HALL: Will the area
7	be educated be aware of the differences.
8	MR. RON LEVY: Yes, in fact,
9	with the RI phase and the EE/CAs there is a
10	public piece. In fact, we actually go out and
11	we hold a public forum. Sometimes it could be
12	this, but what we've done is like on the M-2
13	parcel, we actually had a public meeting, it was
14	down at the Anniston Meeting Center. We brought
15	in all the experts, put the charts up, and were
16	there to answer questions.
17	MR. JAMES HALL: ADEM and EPA
18	to establish some level that might be dangerous
19	to the community if this is necessary?
20	MR. RON LEVY: Certainly all
21	the information relating to contaminants and
22	risk will be part of that, yes. That
23	information will be available to anybody in the

1	community that wants to evaluate and provide us
2	feedback.
3	MS. LISA KINGSBURY: Ron, more
4	than likely what we could do is have IT come an
5	do a presentation of these documents when they
6	become available, also.
7	MR. RON LEVY: That is what I
8	would like to do as part of the RAB is present
9	the information by a contractor and then take
10	questions there. But besides the fact what we
11	were expecting to see is the technical review
12	committee to do the actual look at the document,
13	the hard look at the document.
14	MR CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: Will it
15	get sent to us, Ron?
16	MR. RON LEVY: I don't know
17	what's the best way to do it, those are fairly
18	large documents. We may try to hand it out
19	during a RAB meeting.
20	MR CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: I was
21	just curious.
22	DR. BARRY COX: Do you think
23	this will be ready next meeting?

1		MS. LISA KINGSBURY:	The first
2	one is ready now, for those w	ho want it.	
3		MS. DONNA FATHKE:	Is there
4	any way that we can review th	nese documents	
5	before they're presented here	so that we can	
6	prepare for the meeting?		
7		MR. RON LEVY: Well, yeah,	
8	there is.		
9		MS. DONNA FATHKE:	I mean,
10	have them available in the lib	rary or something?	
11		MR. RON LEVY: Well, if we're	e
12	talking about sending them to	we talked about	
13	not sending everybody a copy	to save these	
14	mounds of documents, but to	get them to the	
15	technical review committee.	Certainly, I can	
16	mail them to the technical rev	iew committee.	
17	So, that those people have been	en designated, the	
18	have a chance to review them	prior to coming	
19	into the meeting for discussio	n. That's what we	
20	want. Is that the question you	're asking?	
21		MS. DONNA FATHKE:	Well, what
22	about the rest of us?		
23		MR. RON LEVY: Well, I thoug	tht

1	that we agreed to that instead of making -
2	MS. DONNA FATHKE: I wasn't
3	here for that meeting, so, I don't remember
4	exactly what happened.
5	MR. RON LEVY: Donna, if you
6	want a copy of that document, we'll get you a
7	copy.
8	MS. DONNA FATHKE: No, no, I
9	don't want a copy of that, that's the point, but
10	if it was made available in the library -
11	MR. RON LEVY: Oh, they are.
12	Well, I should say the draft documents aren't.
13	Until they become final, we don't put them in
14	the repository, but we'll have them here and if
15	somebody wants to see them, I'll be glad to make
16	them available for review.
17	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: Is
18	there typically like an executive summary or
19	anything like that? Maybe that would help
20	everybody.
21	MR. RON LEVY: We could put
22	that in the mailings if necessary.
23	MR CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: Or you

- 1 could fax that to everybody so they can look at
- 2 it.
- MR. RON LEVY: Or we could do
- 4 that, too. It's up to the RAB, they'll just
- 5 need to tell me what they want.
- DR. BARRY COX: What you're
- 7 asking to clarify, Donna, you want this prior to
- 8 the meeting?
- 9 MS. DONNA FATHKE: Yes, so
- 10 they don't run into a call.
- 11 MR. RON LEVY: What we'll do
- 12 for the ranges of iron Mountain EE/CA, we'll get
- 13 those out in the next mailings. So, if that's
- 14 acceptable, that's what I'll do. If we'll put
- 15 the executive summary out to all RAB members an
- 16 then we will get the documents to the technical
- 17 review committee.
- DR. BARRY COX: Any comments?
- 19 Do you want to go ahead with the new member
- 20 ballot? Joan?
- MS. JOAN MCKINNEY: You have
- 22 those ready if you want to go ahead and be
- 23 handing them out for us, please.

1	MR. RON MASSEY: What we've
2	decided to do this time is I've prepared a
3	ballot. So, what we're going to do is, we're
4	going to ask you to X in the box next to two
5	names, because we do have two people that need
б	to be elected, and then I will go back and count
7	them while you continue on.
8	MR. RON LEVY: We need to make
9	sure you understand that we're voting them into
10	the RAB.
11	DR. BARRY COX: Would anybody
12	like a fifteen seconds on each person, again for
13	review?
14	MS. DONNA FATHKE: Yeah.
15	DR. BARRY COX: Joan, you want
16	to do that for us then.
17	MS. JOAN MCKINNEY: If I might
18	suggest, Craig did not have an opportunity, I
19	kind of talked about your applicants, but if
20	you'd like to go ahead and offer up some
21	comments, since those are the ones you have
22	provided for us.
23	MR CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: Sure.

- 1 I'd be more than happy to. There's three people
- 2 on this list who -- you know, what I did when I
- 3 got the request for additional members, I
- 4 basically just e-mailed it to everybody in our
- 5 plant. Three people came back and requested for
- 6 a nomination form. I'll just go through them
- 7 real briefly. The first one is a gentleman by
- 8 the name of Lamar Freeman. He's local to the
- 9 area. He's lived in the Anniston area his
- 10 entire life. He's a human resources and
- 11 administration manager out at Solutia and like I
- 12 said, he's a very active and outgoing person an
- 13 is very interested in what's going on in the
- 14 community and is very active.
- 15 Larry Hatcher is an operation
- 16 superintendent at the plant. He's basically in
- 17 charge of everything out at the plant except for
- 18 community relations essentials. He would also
- 19 be a candidate, he's very sharp, has a very good
- 20 technical mind. He is to be somewhat honest,
- 21 going to be somewhat transient, it's only a
- 22 temporary assignment for him at the Solutia
- 23 plant. He will probably be there for several

- 1 more years, but he won't be around ten years
- 2 from now. But he is not local to the area, or I
- 3 should say he hasn't lived in this area his
- 4 entire live. He currently lives down in Oxford.
- 5 He has lived in the Southeast for the better
- 6 part of his career.
- 7 And then Jerry Hopper I think of
- 8 the three is probably the best candidate from
- 9 Solutia. He works with me in remediation
- 10 management. Has a very sound technical mind in
- 11 grasp of environmental-types of issues. He's
- 12 lived in the Anniston and Oxford area for his
- 13 entire life. And he is very interested in
- 14 what's going on here at Fort McClellan and could
- also be a valuable asset to the team.
- 16 MR. RON LEVY: Can I make a
- 17 suggestion? Although we've got two openings
- 18 right now, we may have more coming up. You
- 19 might want to vote for two and then put an A
- 20 next to two alternates and therefore we won't
- 21 have to go through another voting if you pick
- 22 two alternates. And then you can bring them
- 23 into the team, bring them into the RAB at a

1	later date. But it will keep you from having to
2	go through another vote.
3	MS. JOAN MCKINNEY: I think
4	that's an excellent suggestion.
5	MR. RON LEVY: Ox if one guy
6	decides he can't make it after waiting all this
7	time.
8	MR. PETE CONROY: Like an Al
9	or an A2?
10	MR. RON LEVY: Yeah. Put a
11	check mark in the one you want, and put an A in
12	the two that you want for an alternate. This is
13	just a suggestion.
14	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: Well, I
15	think it's a good suggestion, myself.
16	DR. BARRY COX: So, what the
17	official designation is, is one for the one you
18	want now, and A for the one you want next. So,
19	you have two is and two As, is that it? As long
20	as you all agree to the same format. What's the
21	thoughts on that ladies and gentlemen?
22	DR. MARY HARRINGTON: Now, I
23	missed that. If you're going to do it by

1	balloting, normally you take the two highest	
2	votes to go on next and the next two highest	
3	votes to be As.	
4	MS. DONNA FATHKE:	Yeah,
5	you're going to have mismatched is and As one	
6	person.	
7	DR. BARRY COX: You wou	ld have
8	to put logic in this. We could always rank the	
9	one, two, three, four, how about that?	
10	MS. DONNA FATHKE:	Just vote
11	for four people and the highest two people would	
12	be now.	
13	MS. JOAN MCKINNEY:	The only
14	other thing I wanted to remind you is what we	
15	went through last week. As you vote think of	
16	the future, you're looking at a technical review	
17	committee. You're looking at someone who will	
18	make an impact in the community, who will be the	
19	conduit that will take this information and move	
20	it out into the community like we need it done,	
21	like that's a mission of this board. So, I just	
22	kind of remind you when we've got to think of	
23	those things. How important they will be to the	

- 1 RAB and getting a message out into the
- 2 community.
- 3 Does anyone need us to review the
- 4 rest of them like we did last month?
- 5 Mr. Clendenin, Mr. Thrash, Mr. Polek and
- 6 Mr. Gilliland have been in our files for the
- 7 past three years. When we mailed you the
- 8 applications, pretty much that's all that we
- 9 know about them. However, they continue to
- 10 express an interest and we feel that that alone
- 11 merits them having consideration. Mr. Clendenin
- 12 was a nominee of an audience member who comes
- 13 and represents the National Guard and he
- 14 discussed him last week and said, you know -
- 15 explained the merit in having him here with us.
- 16 He's a local resident. He has a great interest
- in the history of Fort McClellan. So, he, of
- 18 course, would always be an asset for us. And I
- 19 believe that he's a minister out at the
- 20 Presbyterian Church. So, we know there's
- 21 communication right there.
- 22 Mr. Franklin is a nominee of Mayor
- 23 Kimbrough, but I believe he has an engineer

1	background and, of course, he also would be a
2	good communicator for us.
3	Colonel Mattison, is a retired
4	Colonel in Jacksonville. He's also a
5	communicator and we know that, we've had him as
6	a visitor here. So, we pretty much know Colonel
7	Orval.
8	Scott Beckett, maybe we could go
9	ahead and ask, if you wouldn't mind, let us know
10	a little bit about Scott, because he's a member
11	of your church.
12	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: He's at
13	JSU facility. And he did the study on the
14	long-leaf pine in the Talladega National Forest
15	so he's interested in the wildlife refuge and
16	the connection with Fort McClellan and the
17	Wildlife Refuge.
18	MS. JOAN MCKINNEY: I think
19	he's been a Math and Science teacher at high
20	school level, so I mean, there is kind of a
21	technical interest there as well as a good
22	communicator. Can I answer any other questions
23	about the nominees?

1	DR. BARRY COX: Anybody have a
2	question? Everybody ready to vote? Joan, does
3	everybody have a copy of the two draft letters
4	you prepared?
5	MS. JOAN MCKINNEY: No, sir.
6	I did those for you.
7	DR. BARRY COX: Okay.
8	Everybody finished with their ballot? Okay.
9	Any more old business? Okay. On the new
10	business what I would like to do is start out by
11	recognizing the fact that we've had a
12	difficulty obtaining a quorum for the last few
13	meetings. What I would like to do is go around
14	the room and start with Craig and you tell us -
15	well, Pete is back now. Pete, we've had
16	difficulty getting the quorum the last few
17	months. What I would like to do is go around
18	the room and start with you, what would you like
19	to see change? What should we do different?
20	What do you think the members would like to see
21	at the RAB meetings and what do you think we
22	could do to improve the attendance?
23	MR. PETE CONROY: Well, I

1	don't know what we did today, but it seems like			
2	it worked.			
3	DR. BARRY C	OX:	Well, we	
4	threatened everybody today. Any agenda change	:S		
5	that you could see?			
6	MR. PETE COM	NROY:	No, I feel	
7	as though we've been doing the job that we've			
8	been asked to do. I think getting early notice			
9	to us, and we do that.			
10	DR. BARRY C	OX:	I just thought	
11	it would be a good thing to ask, if there was			
12	something that you -			
13	MR. CRAIG BI	RANCHFIE	ELD:	Well,
14	I think it's a good question. I think one way			
15	you could help with the quorum issues is if			
16	there were issues that are going to have to be			
17	voted upon I mean, I don't know who's sending	g		
18	out the e-mails, but e-mails are sent out prior			
19	to each meeting. I don't know if the rules			
20	allows for this, but if somebody knows that the			
21	can't make it, you know here's the issues			
22	that will be voted upon and they can turn their			
23	vote over to someone else. As far as getting			

I	attendance at the meeting, I don't know, I guess
2	the thing that comes to my mind is the fact that
3	and it could be that this isn't a whole lot
4	going on out there maybe.
5	DR. BARRY COX: If we could
6	add some more excitement to the meeting?
7	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: I
8	don't know if I would use the term excitement,
9	and I'm sort of at a slight disadvantage,
10	perhaps, because I did join the RAB well after
11	its inception, so I wasn't in when everybody was
12	talking about what their role with the RAB was.
13	Even I'm kind of fuzzy on that. What our role
14	is, other than to improvise some feedback. I'll
15	tell you what, I get entirely confused about
16	what's going on. And the fact that we only meet
17	once a month makes it kind of hard to keep up
18	with the direction of everything, you know.
19	DR. BARRY COX: A couple of
20	things I thought of. What about having a
21	month-end review report say from which I
22	think we're getting now from the Army also
23	have ADEM and EPA start off the meeting from

1	each of those three perspectives, what was
2	accomplished, what happened at the Fort last
3	month?
4	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: I
5	think that's a good thing to do, Barry, and also
6	I think typically, since we're going to have
7	two new members coming in and a couple more
8	after that, perhaps at some point in time you
9	just give them an overview of what's going on at
10	Fort McClellan, what's the big picture here.
11	MS. DONNA FATHKE: I have to
12	agree with Craig. I've been coming a lot longer
13	than you have, but I'm still foggy. Maybe we
14	need some kind of orientation package, so we do
15	know what our roles are specifically and
16	something that has a map of the Fort and the
17	areas that are under investigation so, we can
18	understand what we're looking at.
19	DR. BARRY COX: Okay. So, we
20	really have two issues on the table then.
21	Number one, define the role what is a RAB
22	supposed to do? That's on the RAB website and I
23	think that would be easy for some of us to pull

1	together.			
2		MS. DONNA FATHKE:	There's a	
3	RAB website?			
4		DR. BARRY COX: Yeah.	And the	
5	other one would be a overview	of the		
6	environmental issues at Fort M	cClellan. Is that		
7	the other thing I'm hearing?			
8		MR. PHILLIP STROUD:	I could,	
9	you know, go along with what	he is saying.		
10	Sometimes I feel like gosh, I'd like everybody			
11	to know that we reviewed twenty-five reports.			
12	And it's amazing sometimes wh	And it's amazing sometimes what we do, that's		
13	not really shared here. A lot of	not really shared here. A lot of y'all know the		
14	sheer volume of material that's floating around			
15	and the appreciation for it. And let y'all			
16	know, kind of like on a broad scale, like you			
17	said, we'll sum up everything, now you'll			
18	understand what these reports mean a little bit			
19	better.			
20		DR. BARRY COX:	Would you like	
21	to do that for us in the next me	eting?		
22		MR. PHILLIP STROUD:	I keep a	
23	daily log of what I do every da	y.I could just		

1	download I'll see if I can get permission
2	from Larry to offer that. It would really
3	broaden the horizon here, especially from ADEM's
4	point of view and how things are moving. Now,
5	with EPA he would have to do I keep a log of
6	what he does, but it's -
7	DR. BARRY COX: Does he know
8	that?
9	MR. PHILLIP STROUD: Oh, yeah.
10	Well, every time we concur, we work on a report,
11	we also get someone this is I'm just
12	telling you, it's not the details of it, but it
13	will give you just a little broader -
14	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: Yeah,
15	I think like maybe a fifteen minute download to
16	kick-off each meeting, just a summary of what's
17	been going on.
18	MR. PHILLIP STROUD: That
19	would really work.
20	MR. PETE CONROY: And your
21	thinking ADEM, as well as, EPA at every meeting?
22	DR. BARRY COX: Right. And I
23	think we have a letter that is going out, do we

1	not, Joan, that's ready for signature, and we're
2	going to request that EPA and ADEM have somebody
3	at every meeting, and that person be prepared to
4	give us the month-end review? We did agree on
5	that last time.
6	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: And I
7	would encourage you to key your report to a map
8	if any way possible. I mean, we're out here all
9	the time and know where these places are, but
10	some of the RAB members have a good
11	understanding, but most people, when they look
12	at this and see former weapons repair shop,
13	building 335, parcel 667, where is that?
14	MS. LISA KINGSBURY: I have a
15	suggestion: I know when we first started the
16	RAB we handed out the environmental base-line
17	survey to every member on the RAB. And in that
18	EBS we have a large map that shows all of our
19	sites, all of our parcels, and there's a table
20	that lists every site that we're working on.
21	And you can go from the table to the map with
22	concordance of the table. Shows you exactly
23	where these sites are. I think that would be

1	helpful for those of you who don't have one.	
2	MR. PHILLIP STROUD:	I work
3	with the Army on that. They said by month end	
4	with me they're just seems like there's a	
5	hundred parcels sitting out there. And it would	
6	take time just to point to them.	
7	DR. MARY HARRINGTON:	I think
8	personally, the urgency has subsided. For those	
9	of us who are on from the initial inspection	
10	of building I guess we have everything	
11	that's been said is good I guess we have	
12	taken advantage of the new-comers, because when	
13	we first came on board we did have all of this	
14	stuff. It felt like when we left we were taking	
15	a truckload full every time. It's like you had	
16	to spend so much time you were looking at	
17	what was going on, so you could be in the same	
18	room to know what the conversation was about.	
19	And personally for me, my job has changed from	
20	the other and I'm just tickled pink at not	
21	having to do all the reading. But we did have	
22	something that told us all of the acronyms and	
23	everything. So I can see where they would	

- 1 differ. But I do think that need for urgency
- 2 has subsided. We all came on when the Fort was
- 3 still going on and everything was so -
- 4 MR. DONALD CUNNINGHAM: Well,
- 5 I know one way to increase the attendance. If
- 6 Ron would loosen his budget, pay a hundred
- 7 dollars for each attendance slot, that would be
- 8 a good way to get everybody here. Without
- 9 stopping the RAB, I think the suggestion -- and
- 10 I ask -- from time to time I ask Miki for
- 11 information on JPA status, because that's
- 12 certainly an interest to all of us. But the EP
- 13 and the ADEM response, along with Mr. Levy's
- 14 report, a little bit each time would kind of
- 15 fill in the gap for us.
- MR. BOBBY WESTON: My
- 17 recommendation is going to be basically the
- 18 same. Is that we've got like an overview from
- 19 JPA on the progress on some of the sites, who
- 20 has already contracted to do what and who's
- 21 going to purchase what piece of property or that
- 22 type of information. So we can have a good
- 23 knowledge of what's going on at the Fort,
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1	besides what's being cleaned-up and what's being	
2	recommended to be cleaned-up. And if any way	
3	possible, could we look at changing the date	
4	from maybe to a Thursday or a Tuesday for the	
5	meeting?	
6	DR. BARRY COX: That's	
7	possible, but it's already come up. The one	
8	thing that I would say with the JPA updates, if	
9	you look at the charge, I don't think that's	
10	part of it. What we're supposed to be doing, is	
11	looking at environmental issues. So, if the	
12	board wants to vote that we do something other	
13	than that, that's fine, but I mean, that's not	
14	the charge of the respiration advisory board.	
15	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD:	Ι
16	think only to the extent that we can understand	
17	why certain environmental investigations are	
18	being done. How do they fit into that certain	
19	picture.	
20	DR. BARRY COX: What I suggest	
21	is that we have the environmental issues that we	
22	have a report from the JPA what are their	
23	environmental issues; what are their	

1	environmental concerns? And so, then we will
2	have then we'll have so far we've got
3	four; one from the Army, one from ADEM, one fro
4	EPA, and one from the JPA, Environmental issues
5	for the month.
6	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: Are
7	EPA and ADEM going to have anything different?
8	DR. BARRY COX: We would hope
9	so, wouldn't we?
10	MR. PHILLIP STROUD: I don't
11	know. They'll be real close it I mean we're
12	close, we're tight. It's worth hearing theirs,
13	too.
14	MR. PETE CONROY: Of course,
15	what we want to hear, not so much what you agree
16	on, we especially want to hear what you disagree
17	on.
18	MR. PHILLIP STROUD:
19	Absolutely.
20	DR. BARRY COX: That's a good
21	point. I think the point is, where do you and
22	the Army differ. If all three of you agree on
23	something, then that probably gives us a fair

1	comfort factor. But if there's	an area in which	
2	y 'all differ, that's what the rea	l concern is	
3	and where the RAB would con	me in.	
4		MR. PHILLIP STROUD: When we	
5	do have differences, it's almos	t real common but	
6	we fix them, some we don't w	ant to be carrying	
7	around with us. But those diff	ference are real	
8	you know, arid we come to	this meeting.	
9		MR. RON LEVY: And we've had	
10	some major differences on thi	ngs, and y'all	
11	heard about those.		
12		MR. PHILLIP STROUD:	
13	Absolutely.		
14		MS. DONNA FATHKE: The only	
15	other thing I have, is something	g that I	
16	mentioned before and it didn't	go anywhere, and	
17	that's to move the meeting up	to 5:30. It might	
18	stop people from going home	and saying, I don't	
19	feel like going out again, if the	ey have to come	
20	here straight after work.		
21		MR. PHILLIP STROUD: We've	
22	been through that before.		
23		DR. MARY HARRINGTON:	Some of

1 us still leave work and come straight here.

2 MR. PETE CONROY: I like that

3 time.

4 MS. DONNA FATHKE: I like it,

5 too, but everybody else -

6 DR. MARY HARRINGTON: I could

7 never be here at 5:30.

8 MR. RON LEVY: I think we

9 voted on that.

10 MR. JEROME ELSER: I think

11 most what I had in mind has already been said;

12 to have EPA and ADEM here each meeting. It's

13 been interesting for me to have Miki here. I've

14 been glad that she's been here for the meetings.

15 Even though it may not be what we need to know,

16 but it's interesting to know these things, so

17 that we can intertwine it with the RAB.

DR. BARRY COX: Mr. Buford?

19 MR JAMES BUFORD: No comment.

20 Mostly everything has been said already. Any

21 possible changes there, it's almost an invisible

22 thing, you know. We come in at 6:30 in the

23 evening and it's rough for some of us to get

1	here at 6:30, you know, as far as the time is	
2	concerned. Changing the days wouldn't help any.	
3	I've seen refreshments here. We've had some	
4	pretty interesting people here to enlighten us	
5	on some things that are going on in the area.	
6	And maybe with ADEM and EPA coming back in and	
7	giving us some insight on some of the things	
8	that are going on, and possibly some video.	
9	DR. BARRY COX:	Just one
10	question that I would have. Is something that	
11	was mentioned one time, is the review of the BCT	
12	meeting. Do you think your report would	
13	adequately cover that? Or do you think we need	
14	a BCT report?	
15	MR. PHILLIP STROUD:	That
16	would be up to Ron, but what I'm going to be	
17	giving you is basically, what we do at the BCT	
18	is a laundry list of everything we've done and	
19	it will be in a nutshell. I won't drag this	
20	on any more than ten minutes.	
21	MR. RON LEVY: Let me suggest	
22	something, because Miki does this. The BCT	
23	minutes become a matter of public record. We	

1	put them in the repository. The minutes are
2	generally a month to a month and a half behind
3	the actual meeting, because we don't approve the
4	minutes until the next meeting. And then at
5	that time there are changes to be made. It's a
6	month and a half before we actually get them
7	finalized. But certainly I don't know why we
8	don't provide those to you all. It's just
9	another piece of paper that we'll be giving you.
10	If you want to, we could put them in the
11	mailings or but they'll be behind. Just so
12	that you will understand.
13	MS DONNA FATHKE: Or you could
14	e-mail us.
15	MR. RON LEVY: Yeah, we could
16	do that, too. But not everybody has e-mail. If
17	we could mail it to those who don't have e-mail
18	or whatever.
19	MS. JOAN MCKINNEY: I would
20	mention that they're anywhere from six to ten
21	pages long. They're put into the repository,
22	but it's about three months before they're put
23	in the repository. But we can do whatever.

1	MR. PHILLIP STROUD:	I'm not
2	speaking for Shannon here, but I want to	
3	introduce him to the people that don't know him.	
4	He's hired on with ADEM, he is recently from	
5	ALDOT. He's already starting to take a load off	
6	of me. This is Shannon Golden, welcome to the	
7	RAB meeting. He'll be working in the land	
8	division, hazardous waste.	
9	MS MIKI SCHNEIDER:	Speaking
10	for the JPA, we're glad you're here, Shannon.	
11	He needs help, it's a huge job.	
12	Congratulations, or sympathy, I'm not sure	
13	which.	
14	Many of you know we've had the	
15	discussion about JPA being a part of sitting	
16	in on the RAB meeting. And one of the pieces	
17	that keep coming back and the reason that the	
18	JPA doesn't need to be at the RAB meetings -	
19	BCT meetings is because we're at the RAB	
20	meetings. And that the information that's going	
21	from the BCT should be funneled through the RAB.	
22	So, it T bring that up because I	
23	think there should be some way for those people	
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1	who give their time and are the eyes and ears of
2	the community to understand what's going on in
3	the BCT meetings. And if it's the minutes, so
4	be it, if it's your ten minute report and Bart's
5	ten minute report and the Army's ten minute
6	report on what is happening at the BCT meetings,
7	great. But as long as you know, we're still not
8	there at the BCT meetings, this is the only way
9	that we've got to find out what's going on,
10	other than getting the minutes.
11	DR. BARRY COX: Anybody else
12	have anything to say?
13	MR. PETE CONROY: I'm
14	comfortable with this now, but under what exact
15	rule or regulation that prohibits someone like
16	you probably know this answer, because y'all
17	have been fussing about it. Why are the BCT
18	meetings actually closed to the public? I'm
19	sure there's a formal reason.
20	MR. RON LEVY: I can't give
21	you the formal reason, but I -
22	MR. JOE DOYLE: It's a

predecisional meeting. It's a working meeting

23

1	at a working level where as a result of those
2	meetings you get a decision which is then
3	reviewed for public comments. But prior to that
4	time, it's a roll up your sleeves, work it out,
5	thrash it out, the attempt is at those meetings
6	is for the regulators and the Army to work it
7	out and get on the same sheet of music, in the
8	hopes that when it is time to go up, for a final
9	decision or whatever, is that everybody is on
10	the same sheet of music.
11	Therefore, at that point, it's a
12	matter of hearing the public's comments on those
13	and producing that final document, as opposed to
14	being in a position with the Army and the
15	regulators are still fighting it out. We're
16	hopefully past that point and it's a we're
17	past the point where the Army and the regulators
18	are not in accord, in fact, I don't think
19	anything with BCT is a final decision or where
20	we're not in agreement.
21	MR. PETE CONROY: Have y'all
22	come to terms with that answer?
23	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: No, we

T	naven t. And our concern is that we're out
2	doing marketing, working on property and the
3	Army and EPA and ADEM over here doing
4	environmental investigations and coming up with
5	decisions, and sometimes we don't know what each
6	other is doing and we have conflicts on
7	properties. Just last week we had one of those
8	instances come up.
9	And we're not asking to be a voting
10	member, we're asking, simply, to be able to
11	attend the meetings, listen and understand what
12	they're working on, what areas of the Fort are
13	being impacted and if and that way we can
14	share with them, well, wait a minute, we've got
15	this piece of property and we've got somebody
16	seriously looking at it, you need let's work
17	together on this.
18	MR. RON LEVY: Let me
19	interject something here, Miki, because we may
20	be working towards a solution on this, right at
21	this very moment. And short of me telling you
22	exactly what this is going to look like we
23	have entertained a meeting with the BCT that

1	we re discussing now, internally with the Army.
2	It's not the BCT, but a meeting with the BCT,
3	either prior to the BCT meeting, you know, that
4	we can bring Miki up to date, we can take input,
5	provide her feedback and do that and then we can
6	go into our meetings, it's almost like on the
7	front end. And we've talked about that, and
8	that's being considered right now.
9	MR. PHILLIP STROUD: Yeah, I
10	matter of fact she had asked earlier, it's
11	not that I disagree or agree, I did consult a
12	lot of people. I do know that when we're in
13	these meetings, it's intense, we're talking
14	about equations, we're talking about things that
15	take several hours on the same word and we
16	always thought that may be a waste of time for
17	her, until we have, you know, at least some idea
18	of what's going on. After seven or eight hours,
19	bashing and beating up, and trying to get these
20	things worked out, working sentences out and
21	stuff like that, sometimes we've made decisions,
22	but we still have got to make a further
23	decisions and sometimes we thought maybe that

1	might get out to the public. So, all this
2	beating and bashing up, and then it goes to a
3	decision later on that I Can say, gosh, we have
4	every bit of information that she needs to know.
5	And I think she's getting appropriate answers
6	instead of - but I agree with him, we're not
7	throwing her out. And I'm all for that.
8	MS.MIKI SCHNEIDER: And this
9	is not a request that we've entered into
10	lightly. We've talked to other LRAs across the
11	country to understand what the benefit of being
12	in on a BCT is. Because, you know, I don't
13	necessarily want I mean, I like these guys,
14	but I don't want to necessarily spend two days
15	with them. But we are consistently having
16	problems that are happening, that we feel that
17	if we are in the meetings, we would know about
18	it ahead of time and we could stop things on our
19	end that would prevent us from ending up on the
20	front page of the Anniston Star, which none of
21	us enjoy finding our name in black ink. But we
22	are trying to work out a compromise. We feel
23	very strongly that that door needs to be

Τ	opened, and we continue to push for it.
2	Mr. Clark, Secretary Clark, has
3	indicated that he supports us being there. We
4	have had we've talked to a lot of people in
5	the Army. A lot of the problem rests with EPA
6	and their concern. And we have promised that we
7	would stay quiet. You know, we will not walk
8	out of the meeting and tell the Anniston Star
9	what we have heard. We are the future owners of
10	the property. The property has to pass through
11	us to be developed. And the decision is going
12	to remain around that table, impact our ability
13	to develop that property for the community, and
14	the benefit of the community. And that's why we
15	feel it's important to be there and to know
16	what's going on.
17	MR. PETE CONROY: Would
18	confidentiality waivers or something like that
19	be a tool to solve the problem?
20	MR. JOE DOYLE: I don't know
21	that's something that the department really has
22	to make the final decision. I was just trying
23	to give you a run down

- 1 MR. PETE CONROY: And I
- 2 understand that. It makes sense. Are there an
- 3 LRAs that meet with BCTs?
- 4 MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Yes, very
- 5 much so. And I can give you a list of LRAs that
- 6 meet with the BCTs.
- 7 MR PETE CONROY: That's
- 8 interesting. Maybe I'm just jealous, I'm trying
- 9 to figure out a way to keep the public out of
- 10 some of my meetings. Haven't been able to
- 11 achieve my goal.
- MR. PHILLIP STROUD: I do
- 13 picture her sometimes, trying to sit in this
- 14 meeting where we're spending two hours on trying
- 15 to figure out where we're going to put a well.
- DR. BARRY COX: Anything else,
- 17 Mr. Conroy?
- MR. PETE CONROY: I don't
- 19 know. It just seems -- I don't know if this is
- 20 an issue that the RAB should even be involved
- 21 in. It's kind of a fringed issue, but if
- 22 there's any other RAB members that have a
- 23 feeling one way or another, I'm interested.

1	MR. PHILLIP STROUD:	Just off
2	for a little bit more. When I first came here,	,
3	I think it was introduced to me very well with	า
4	what's going on with each member was doing and	į
5	what they represented. But I think sometimes	I
6	feel well, as much as I've been here, I sti	ill
7	feel a little bit wobbly. It would be kind of	Ē
8	nice to reintroduce, maybe every once or twice	e a
9	year, reintroduce what everybody's role is, th	ne
10	Army, JPA, ADEM, EPA, and even talk about the	
11	sub-contractors. Who are they out here? IT,	
12	EODT, ALDOT you know, who's out here.	
13	And then Fish and Wildlife has a	
14	serious job here. What's he doing here? What's	3
15	his goals and objectives?	
16	That way once we've reintroduced	
17	each other I think it's exciting to hear,	
18	this is serious stuff we're doing, extremely	
19	serious stuff. We're dealing with dangerous	
20	things out there. And my job is to make sure	
21	the State gets a high quality product and nobo	ody
22	gets a finger hurt or a cut finger. And that	' S
23	my ultimate goal. And if I get a cut finger of	on

1	this, I've lost I mean, I didn't do my job.	
2	But I also want everybody to be in the same boat	
3	of safety and everything.	
4	So, reintroducing everybody and	
5	what they do would be kind of exciting. Not all	
6	at once, but maybe once every other meeting, but	
7	it would keep the excitement up.	
8	DR. BARRY COX:	What about

2	of our reports have that right now, we could
3	pull out and it has a thousand acronyms in it,
4	and we could share that with everybody. And the

6	readings about what this is all about, that
7	gives the key name players and who's paying who
8	and what.
9	MR. RON LEVY: This is all
10	good stuff. The thing that we've tried to get
11	occasionally the mailings and the news letters,
12	see those in the mailings and in the fax sheets.
13	If you've got an idea about one that you think
14	would be helpful, we'll take that. What you're
15	talking about now, it may be good for another
16	fax sheet.
17	DR. BARRY COX: Who's who at
18	Fort McClellan? What is each of their roles?
19	MR. PHILLIP STROUD:
20	wouldn't stop there. Then I would look at these
21	people around on the corner and who are they?
22	Their face is here every time, and kind of put
23	their purpose he's from down South Anniston.

1	DR. BARRY COX: That reminds
2	me, that's one thing we did not do. We didn't
3	go around and introduce everybody. Why don't we
4	go ahead, so we'll know who everybody is.
5	MS. LISA KINGSBURY: I'm
6	Lisa Kingsbury. I work for Ron at the Fort
7	McClellan environmental office.
8	MR. BOB DAFFRON: I'm
9	Bob Daffron and I work in the environmental
10	office for Fort McClellan, Army, National
11	Guard Training Center.
12	MR. PAUL JAMES: I'm
13	Paul James, I work for Ron Levy in the
14	environmental office.
15	MR. BILL SHANKS: I'm
16	Bill Shanks, I work for Ron in the environmental
17	-
18	MR. RON LEVY: Let me just -
19	instead of saying that you work for Ron, Lisa's
20	got the IRT program and she's really a focal
21	point on the HGRW stuff that we've talked about.
22	Paul, is really the honcho for the UXO program.
23	He does a lot of the over-site on the UXO

1	program. Bill's expertise really is on his
2	institutional knowledge. He reviews almost all
3	the work from a technical standpoint, from an
4	engineering standpoint. And he's highly
5	involved in the UXO side of the house. So, I
6	just wanted to make sure you understood it
7	wasn't somebody screwing around not doing stuff.
8	They have program areas and they're focused on
9	those programs areas, I just wanted you to know
10	that.
11	MR. JAMES HALL: My name is
12	James Hall and I'm with Pollution in Anniston.
13	I'm particularly concerned about whether the
14	minority, poor, community is left out of the
15	activity that's going on at Fort McClellan.
16	1935 and Monsanto, Swan, whoever was the
17	manufacturing company decided to manufacture
18	PCB, they contributed to the world and the
19	history of it. The use of PCB is what -
20	contributed to the world and using how
21	Americans used it in WWII. Poor people on the
22	west side of Anniston suffered along while this
23	
	material was being manufactured. And when they

- discovered, recently, that these chemicals were
- 2 contaminated, kind of like the Russians -- and I
- 3 would like for you to consider in your meetings
- 4 -- we're all Christians -- we all got to pay for
- 5 whatever our debts are -- think about the poor
- 6 families on the west side of Anniston, their
- 7 children are suffering. PCB meetings -- about
- 8 several months ago, we discovered lead in West
- 9 Anniston. Think about the kids and claiming
- 10 that the children can't read, having hearing
- problems. And when you have time, go up to the
- 12 office on north street and read about this lead
- and what it's doing to our family and our
- 14 children. And if there's any way possible on
- any kind of input can come from this group, I
- think the people would appreciate it. And we're
- 17 not about closing-up Monsanto or Union Foundry.
- 18 It's about getting some treatment to these
- 19 families and how they are suffering.
- 20 MS. JOAN MCKINNEY: I'm
- 21 Joan McKinney, and I facilitate and kind of help
- the RAB, do the admin work and anything else
- 23 that needs to be done. And give you that

1	wonderful, strong coffee.		
2		MR. JOE DOYLE:	I'm Joe Doyle
3	and I work for Glen Ryan.

22		MR. RON LEVY:	Let me just
23	kind of go through that action su	ummary sheet	

1	that y'all got through the mail. Some real good
2	news. There are three FOSTS out for review for
3	regulatory community. They've also been
4	advertised in the newspaper. FOST, if you
5	remember, finding of suitability to transfer are
6	requirements on us to define property that's
7	clean and can be transferred.
8	The pieces that you see here have
9	come through some level of investigation.
10	M1.13501, says we need to refer to a map. And
11	this is critical, because the JPA has got an
12	industrial area up in this area that they want
13	for redevelopment. That piece that sits in the
14	middle, do you see that? That's 501. We've
15	completed the investigation. Both EPA and the
16	State agree with our findings at this point and
17	are now reviewing the FOST.
18	The E2 or the M2 piece most of
19	you know that is a piece that the Consolidated
20	Publishing Company or the Anniston Star is going
21	to get near the entrance to Summerall Gate.
22	That FOST is also out on review.
23	And E7. E7 is the old MP school,

- 1 which falls right around in here. It's being
- 2 held back because of the -- an ongoing
- 3 investigation from RAD side, which we're able to
- 4 clear the building. Had a RAD lab in it, which
- 5 we finished the survey and in fact, it is clean,
- 6 so the building is ready to be transferred.
- 7 DR. BARRY COX: What about the
- 8 spot in the yard, is that cleared?
- 9 MR. RON LEVY: Yes. Building
- 10 350 is also an E7 FOST. Building 350 is the -
- 11 used to be the consolidated maintenance
- 12 facility. So, really, a turnkey operation.
- 13 It's located right here. It used to be an old
- 14 fire training pit. That means the fire
- 15 department here would put fires out. They would
- 16 put fuel in a pit and come in there and put
- 17 fires out.
- 18 So, we were concerned that some of
- 19 that fuel may have -- would still be there. But
- 20 in fact, we did not find anything. And believe
- 21 me we did some extensive sampling up there, on
- 22 the ground water side. And the BCT came to an
- 23 agreement that there was no further action

- 1 there, and that's why we're finding a
- 2 suitability to transfer. Those are all good
- 3 news because those were hot items for JPA.
- 4 MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Now,
- 5 would be appropriate for me to tell them what
- 6 we're doing with them.
- 7 DR. BARRY COX: I think that
- 8 would be fair.
- 9 MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: The MP
- 10 school is JSU. They'll be moving their
- 11 educational program and their higher ed program
- 12 and a new 911 program to that facility.
- 13 Therefore, we're really excited about that piece
- 14 happening.
- 15 Also, there will be a relationship
- 16 there between Gadsden State and Ayers State, in
- some way, and I'm not sure exactly how that's
- 18 going to work. But that's going to bring -
- 19 being right there next to Auburn and the
- 20 conflicts that Auburn is getting, it's creating
- 21 a nice little educational compound for us in
- 22 that area. M2, like Ron said is going to the
- 23 Anniston Star. And Building 350, we've had to

1	turn two people away so far, because it wasn't
2	ready, but now it's ready and we have somebody
3	seriously looking at that building that would
4	use it for some manufacturing. They were here
5	last week and they're coming back next week.
6	And then the Reilley Field area, as
7	many of you may have read in the paper, there
8	were two potential businesses. There was a
9	Sam's wholesale distributor that was going to be
10	about a thousand jobs, we lost them. And then
11	there was a tire manufacturing headquarters,
12	that they were going to bring up to that area.
13	And we got down to the top three sites and it
14	went to a site in Georgia. One of the reasons
15	was because we could not guarantee them that we
16	could get a road in to access the property in
17	the most economically, viable place for them.
18	ADEM did everything they could to help us in
19	that situation. I'm afraid now with the
20	boundaries expanding the landfills, which Ron
21	will fill you in next week, that site may just
22	industrial at this point in time, may be out
23	the window for us for a little while, but we're

- 1 going to keep plugging along.
- 2 MR.RONLEVY: Well, we have
- 3 air permits on all of our boiler plants. Some
- 4 of those were grandfathered in. Those permits
- 5 which in some cases the JPA is going to want.
- 6 In some cases the boiler itself is being yanked
- 7 out. The permits will be turned back in. And
- 8 we're working on that right now. So, the action
- 9 summary sheet was to tell you that's what we're
- 10 working towards on those permits.
- 11 The other thing about those boiler
- 12 plants, we've got four boiler plants on the
- 13 installation. Three of those locations we had
- 14 underground storage tanks which were no longer
- 15 needed. Mostly, because those plants are on
- 16 natural gas.
- 17 So, to insure that those tanks did
- 18 not in impact future owners, we have pulled
- 19 those tanks, because most of you -- well, if you
- 20 don't know, underground storage tanks across the
- 21 US is a major problem. They tend to leak and
- 22 infect ground water. So, if you don't need
- 23 them, it's best not to have them.

1	in this case, we've puried them.
2	Some were steel and some were fiberglass. But
3	we where you could, we disposed of them,
4	where we could, we reused them.
5	The last item on your action
6	summary sheet was the meeting we had at ALDOT.
7	We had a meeting with ALDOT, some of it
8	concerned a centerline, some of it concerned
9	schedules. We are working on schedules right
LO	now. This has been a proposal to split the
L1	Eastern Bypass up, only the piece that goes
L2	through Fort McClellan at the three different
L3	phases, so that we can execute, so they can
L4	better execute the construction.
L5	The three phases are: The southern
L6	portion, that which everything below Yahoo Lake.
L7	We're working now to transfer that property, an
L8	that's the first phase. The second phase is an
L9	access road, which is the rerouting of Summerall
20	Gate Road. And we're working schedules on that.
21	And the third phase, which is the most difficult
22	phase, is the phase that goes through the UXO
23	area, which we're totally involved now, and

1	you've heard the briefings on that and the
2	removal actions.
3	So, we're talking about schedules,
4	we're talking about clean-ups, and we're trying
5	to coordinate all this with ALDOT, at this
6	point. We have another meeting scheduled,
7	interal meeting that we're working, coming the
8	26th, to go back and discuss schedules and how
9	we can sell our programs and get the road built.
10	I think what's important to know is that we're
11	really working hard to make sure that we get our
12	schedules coordinated, so they can get in and
13	construct the road.
14	DR. BARRY COX: Any comments,
15	Ladies and Gentlemen?
16	MR. JEROME ELSER: This
17	mentioned revised centerline, does this mean
18	they're wanting to reposition the road in a
19	different spot?
20	MR. RON LEVY: Well, they made
21	some changes to well, let me just put it to
22	you this way. Until the surveys are complete,
23	they cannot say for certain that the center

2	lines they define to us are in fact true.	I
2	mean, you can't stay in the center lines without	
3	the surveys, and they're doing the surveys, now.	
4	So, there's been some changes and we're trying	
5	to react to those changes. And that was part of	
6	what we were saying. We want to make sure that	
7	we cover what's necessary. It's a complicated	
8	issue, I mean, there's a lot of resources	
9	involved and coordination with our contractors	
10	and what it is we're going to clean. And then	
11	you've got to worry about areas in and around	
12	the bypass, too, from construction standpoint,	
13	because we'll have issues with those when it	
14	comes to clean-up. And all these things are	
15	being discussed with ALDOT.	
16	MR.PHILLIP STROUD: Jerome,	
17	what he's saying is something as simple as this:	
18	They're doing the survey and they have to dig	
19	down three more feet so that the width of it	
20	wouldn't be enormous, and then you're dealing	
21	with UXO, so it can be extremely complicated.	
22	DR. BARRY COX: Anybody else	
23	have any comments? Okay. We've got Joan, do	

1	you want to talk about the representative of the
2	DOD environmental?
3	MS. JOAN MCKINNEY: Yes, than
4	you. We put in your packet a copy of a letter,
5	but it's informing the RAB members of a
6	stakeholders meeting that's going to be held in
7	St. Louis, in November, I think 14th through the
8	16th; is that correct? Now, we just received
9	that late last week. We got it out to you as
10	fast as we got it in. The Department of Army
11	will select ten names out of the sixty-five RABs
12	to attend and they will be given invitation,
13	travel orders, and they will attend as the guest
14	of the Army. It is a public forum, so anyone
15	can go. But at this point it looks like we have
16	a very good chance of having a representative
17	from our RAB attend. Now, what we asked you to
18	do when we sent it out is if you are interested
19	in attending, let us know, and we would get back
20	with Ron. We did not receive any from any of
21	you, but we still feel strongly that and it's
22	up to the RAB, again, who you would like to have
23	representing us. I think there's many topics,

1	as you see on that letter, that we should be
2	part of. If nothing else, we should go to the
3	networking and we should have a representative
4	so we can talk to the other RAB members that
5	will be there.
6	DR. BARRY COX: Any thoughts
7	on that Ladies and Gentlemen?
8	MR. RON LEVY: I would like to
9	take at least two names and submit them. So, if
10	this RAB would like to give me at least two
11	names, I surely would like to send what
12	they're telling you is, they're going to pay for
13	your per diem. That means your hotel and your
14	meals and your travel. And what you're going to
15	lose is whatever work hours, because they won't
16	reimburse you for that. I know that's tough on
17	you, but if there's two people we could submit
18	names on, I sure would like to do that.
19	MR. PETE CONROY: It would
20	make great sense for Dr. Cox to have his name
21	submitted, if he could make it as our Chairman.
22	MR. RON LEVY: Can we get
23	another nomination, too?

1		MR. PHILLIP STROUD:	I'd say
2	Pete Conroy.		
3		DR. MARY HARRINGTON:	
4	Actually, I think you would be	a good candidate.	
5		MR. PETE CONROY:	I could not
6	be there for all three days. I co	ould be there	
7	for part of it.		
8		MR. RON LEVY: I need to	
9	submit those names by Wedne	sday. So, I really	
10	need the names tonight, please		
11		MR. PETE CONROY:	I have to
12	check my calendar. I'll have to	tell you	
13	tomorrow morning.		
14		DR. MARY HARRINGTON:	And if
15	he can't go, I would like to.		
16		MR. RON LEVY: Super,	okay.
17	So, right now that's what we're	planning on and	
18	you'll let me know in the morn	ing.	
19		MS. DONNA FATHKE:	Can we use
20	any of that RAB money for -		
21		MR. RON LEVY: No.	In fact,
22	the guidance from this said we	can't use the RAB	
23	money to send you for it. So, b	pelieve me, if I	

1	could, I would love to.
2	DR. BARRY COX: Okay. And the
3	last item on our agenda is the election of a new
4	Vice Co-Chair.
5	MS. DONNA FATHKE: What is the
6	responsibilities for Vice Co-Chair?
7	DR. BARRY COX: Takes care of
8	the Vice and involved in the meetings.
	MR. RON LEVY: Let me read
10	what it says. Vice Chairperson. A Vice
11	Chairperson of the RAB should be elected in
12	accordance of the terms thereof. I'm reading
13	directly out of the bylaws. The Vice
14	Chairperson shall further have each and every
15	other duty identified in these bylaws duties.
16	The Vice Chairperson shall preside in all
17	meetings in which he or she is in attendance an
18	the community co-chairperson is not or at least
19	designated Chairperson. The term of Vice
20	Chairperson should serve a term of at least one
21	year. And he essentially ascends after one year
22	to the community co-chair position.
23	DR. BARRY COX: I would like

1	to	nominate	Craig	Branchfield.
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2 MR. PETE CONROY: Do you

3 accept?

4 MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: If the

5 RAB would like me to serve in that position, I

6 would be more than happy to do it.

7 DR. BARRY COX: Do we have an

8 other nominations? Everybody in favor of

9 Craig Branchfield?

10 MR. PETE CONROY: I. Don't

11 get any easier than that.

12 MS. JOAN MCKINNEY: Wasn't

13 that easy. I wanted to remind you that next

14 month is the month that we normally schedule to

15 go out into the community. However, that again,

16 is up to the RABs call. We can defer that until

17 the beginning of the year, which would then be

18 February, which we have normally done.

19 Historically, even though that's the end of the

20 quarter, November, it's also the last meeting of

21 the year, so historically you all have deferred

22 and gone into the community in February.

DR. MARY HARRINGTON: Is there

1	a reason for that, why we deferred?
2	MS. JOAN MCKINNEY: Do you
3	have a location you would like to recommend that
4	we go? No, it's just been it has been
5	historically that they've done that, since -
6	DR. MARY HARRINGTON: And the
7	the third Monday in January, it's been a
8	holiday.
9	MS. JOAN MCKINNEY: My next
LO	question is: Do you have any recommendations on
11	where you want us to set it up?
12	DR. BARRY COX: Joan, did we
13	ever have a meeting where we had any significant
14	outside attendance?
15	MS. JOAN MCKINNEY: No. And
16	we've really tried hard to reach the community
L7	that we feel that's not doesn't have a voice.
18	And, you know, we do all that we can, other than
19	at one time, you all suggested, we buy a display
20	ad, but other than that, we've not had
21	significant attendance at other meetings.
22	DR. BARRY COX: Okay. So,
23	what's the do we want to stay here next month
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1	or -
2	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: I
3	think we're going to have a difficult time
4	getting, accomplishing the goal of getting more
5	public involved in these meetings, unless
6	there's some sort of notification. I don't know
7	to what extent that exists, but certainly the
8	one I went to that was held over at Golden
9	Springs I think it was two months ago lots
10	of people playing basketball, but not too many
11	people interested in coming into the room.
12	MR. PETE CONROY: But we
13	really can't expect a large audience when we
14	don't aggressively advertise and promote what
15	we're trying to do. And it's not the sexiest
16	thing in the world to begin with.
17	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD:
18	would suggest, rather than randomly pick dates,
19	I mean, we kind of look at the schedule and see
20	what's coming up and if we see a topic coming up
21	and I don't know if there's money available
22	put an ad in the paper.
23	DR. BARRY COX: You want to go

- 1 ahead and just stay here for next month then?
- 2 MR. DONALD CUNNINGHAM:
- 3 Recommend to stay here.
- DR. BARRY COX: Second?
- 5 DR. MARY HARRINGTON:

Second.

- DR. BARRY COX: All in favor?
- 7 MR. PHILLIP STROUD: I.
- 8 MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD:

I.

- 9 DR. BARRY COX: Scott Beckett
- 10 and Jerry Harper are the two new members. When
- 11 it's time to replace it will be Curtis Franklin
- 12 and then Marty Clendenin will be the number
- 13 four. Ladies and Gentlemen, we have one other
- 14 piece of business. I understand we're going to
- 15 have a change in the installation Co-Chair.
- 16 Glynn, do you want to talk about that or Ron do
- 17 you want.
- MR. GLYNN RYAN: I don't mind
- 19 talking about it. Ron and I have had a
- 20 discussion on the Co-Chair of the RAB, and we're
- 21 trying to make sure the community understands
- 22 our focus, which is clean-up, but the RAB is
- 23 also -- we hope to get out word out to the
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1	community of what we're doing. And not to say I
2	know anything about environmental, that's not m
3	job, that's Ron's job and he does a great job at
4	it and works for me, but I would have
5	volunteered to serve as the co-chair and let Ron
6	do a little more work with some of the technical
7	things he needs to talk about. I don't see that
8	as a change, but if you will, it is the
9	importance at which we see this. Ron's focus is
10	the clean-up of Fort McClellan and that's what
11	it should be. So, my focus is to have Dr. Cox
12	or the other co-chair to take care of the
13	business part of this meeting.
14	DR. BARRY COX: We certainly
15	appreciate that.
16	MR. RON LEVY: What we'll do
17	is we'll just change chairs. I'll sit at the
18	BCT, which should be over here. And as Glynn
19	and I have discussed it, I'll continue to work
20	the information piece. As we get to the
21	information, I'll do the talking and Glynn will
22	be here to do administrative and work with Barry
23	on to make sure that we're focused on the
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1	right thing and ask me to do w	hat's necessary.	
2		DR. BARRY COX:	Appreciate

5	appreciate the opportunity to s	erve, to make

12	corrected, in terms of saving time finding
13	better ways to do something. Actually,
14	providing us with alternatives that are better.
15	MR. GLYNN RYAN: Ron's comment
16	about funding, this is really a technical review
17	as he said, it's not a funding review. It
18	should not be looked at as a funding review.
19	It's technical folks who may in fact say that
20	the risk is so low, why would we go down this
21	road with something, or maybe it's so high we
22	need to change out total focus. And they in
23	fact have brought in experts with – bearing

Ι.	degrees of experience from all over to these
2	reviews. This is not something that's looked at
3	as a cost saving method. In fact, time saving
4	is the hoping in most areas, because that is
5	money to the Army. If we can turn over property
6	sooner to the community, that's our hopes.
7	DR. BARRY COX: Any other
8	comments? Do I hear a motion for adjournment?
9	MR. PETE CONROY: Motion.
10	MS. DONNA FATHKE: Second.
11	DR. BARRY COX: All in favor?
12	Thank you for coming.
13	(WHEREUPON, the meeting was concluded.)
