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1	DR. BARRY COX: Ladies and
2	gentlemen, if we could begin with the roll call.
3	Mr. Hood? Mr. Brown? Mr. Buford? Mr. Cunningham?
4	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: I think he's
5	coming.
6	DR. BARRY COX: Elser?
7	MR. JERRY ELSER: Here.
8	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: He called me and
9	wanted to know if we had a meeting.
10	DR. BARRY COX: Ms. Fathke?
11	MS. DONNA FATHKE: Here.
12	DR. BARRY COX: Dr. Harrington?
13	DR. MARY HARRINGTON: He's here.
14	DR. BARRY COX: I thought I saw him
15	come in awhile ago. Mayor William Kimbrough?
16	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: Here.
17	DR. BARRY COX: Margarette
18	Longstreth? Fern Thomassy? Mr. Turecek? Anybody I
19	missed? And Mr. Levy is here. Mr. Reedy is not with
20	us. Mr. Stroud is here.
21	MR. PHILLIP STROUD: Yes, sir.
22	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: There is
23	Mr. Cunningham coming in.

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1	DR. BARRY COX: There is
2	Mr. Buford.
3	MR. RON LEVY: If we get one more,
4	we've got a quorum.
5	MR. RON MASSEY: We've got seven.
6	DR. BARRY COX: Has everybody had a
7	chance to look over the minutes from the last meeting?
8	Any comments or corrections?
9	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: Make a motion we
10	approve as presented.
11	DR. BARRY COX: Do we have enough
12	for
13	MR. RON LEVY: We've got seven.
14	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: Don't have them?
15	DR. BARRY COX: Do we?
16	MR. RON LEVY: We don't have
17	enough.
18	DR. BARRY COX: We don't have
19	enough, so they'll table that for the time being.
20	Mr. Levy, you want to start any old
21	business, the M-2 parcel?

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MR. RON LEVY: What we would rather

start is if Miki, do you think you would give us an

1	update on what's going on with the JPA
2	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: I was just
3	sitting here writing out what I was going to say, but
4	I'll punt
5	DR. BARRY COX: Do you want me to
6	give you a few more minutes and we'll call that new
7	business?
8	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: That's okay.
9	You can ask me some questions and fill in.
10	The good news for the JPA is that
11	M-2, which we all know about the Anniston Star parcel
12	is to be completed this week. My understanding, the
13	clearance, right, Mr. Levy
14	MR. RON LEVY: Yes, I'm shaking my
15	head, can you see that? That's nodding affirmatively
16	yes.
17	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Good.
18	MR. RON LEVY: And to point out,
19	too, that a right of entry was issued to the JPA was
20	an assignability
21	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: To Anniston
22	Star, Consolidated Publishing so that they can have
23	access to the property to bring their engineers on

1	site and let them begin to do some work, testing,
2	borings, and that kind of thing. Which we are excited
3	about and appreciate the Army's cooperation with that.
4	Our lawyers have it and they're "lawyer'ing" it now.
5	I don't know if you can write "lawyer'ing".
6	The MOA, the memorandum of
7	agreement, with the Army and the JPA is I should
8	have received a call at 5:00 o'clock this afternoon,
9	telling me that it was completed, but I didn't get
10	that call, so, I'm going to hope I will have that call
11	first thing in the morning. And we hope to sign the
12	MOA this week.
13	Basically don't laugh, Paul
14	this document outlines how the JPA will take the
15	property from the Army; addresses the environmental
16	issues with the property; utilities, like the boiler
17	plants; phasing of the property. And anything else,
18	Mr. Ryan, that's in there that I didn't mention?
19	MR. GLYNN RYAN: (Nods head.)
20	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: But this
21	document is our long-term agreement with the Army and
22	it's really important. Once we have that, we will be
23	able to sign the deed on the first phase of transfer,

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1	which is hopefully somewhere between around
2	thirteen hundred, fourteen hundred aches.
3	Our survey is complete. We have
4	had all of that land surveyed. We had a couple of
5	issues that we had to work out with the Army on some
6	boundaries disputes. We did those last week and those
7	have been sent to the Army Corps of Mobile and they
8	are writing the deed. This is a big deal, getting a
9	deed, we're excited about this.
10	We continue to work with ADEM, to
11	try and address the issue of a road on the northern
12	parcel up by the landfills, trying to get that
13	through. The city and the county the city and the
14	JPA and ADEM are looking at that issue, and hopefully
15	that will come to fruition soon. I think that's about
16	it, unless anyone has any questions.
17	MR. RON LEVY: Do you have a
18	question?
19	DR. BARRY COX: No.
20	MR. RON LEVY: I would add to it
21	that we're working hard on trying to get a parcel
22	released. It's the 501, it's north part of the
23	installation, right below the airfield, which is in an

- 1 area that the JPA identified --
- 2 MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: I may be able
- 3 to reach it. Oh, he got it, okay.
- 4 MR. RON LEVY: Identified as a
- 5 site, a fairly large piece of property, site for
- 6 development that they're trying to recruit folks in
- on. And so the good news there is that the BCT
- 8 agreed, after review, that it was -- there wasn't
- 9 anything that would affect the transfer. And in fact,
- it will go out with no land use controls.
- 11 And we got the FOST out for review,
- 12 draft review on what day, Lisa?
- MS. LISA KINGSBURY: Yesterday --
- 14 MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: I got my copy
- 15 today.
- MS. LISA KINGSBURY: Or today.
- 17 Yesterday was Sunday.
- 18 MR. RON LEVY: So, that's happening
- 19 concurrently with completion of the reports on that
- 20 piece of property.
- 21 MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: And I think
- 22 it's important to point out that the Army, once we
- 23 realized that we had made the top five for this

1	particular company that's looking at coming to this
2	piece of property, the Army was very cooperative and
3	jumped on board to help us try and get this site
4	looked at and addressed as quickly as possible, and we
5	appreciate that. We should know this week if we make
6	the two number two. They're picking two sites out
7	of the top five, and we should know this week if we've
8	made that. Any other questions?
9	MR. RON LEVY: Just let me further

MR. RON LEVY: Just let me further go into this right of entry for the M-2 piece of property. Since the property still belongs to the government and the Army, in order for them to actually do some work up there, we produced essentially a document that allows Consolidated Publishing or JPA to come in and do work on the property.

That keeps them from -- that allows them to start the initial work, particularly like the survey work that's necessary to construction so that they're not waiting for us to actually transfer the property to them so they can do work up front. So, we're trying to accommodate, knowing that we're still working the field work and the investigation, we're trying to accommodate them to get them out there so

1	that they can do what's necessary so when they do go
2	to construction, it will be immediately right after
3	transfer, all the up-front work will be done.
4	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: And this
5	particular building, because of what's going in the
6	building, has some pretty complicated design issues.
7	The equipment is very heavy, and it's going to take
8	the engineers some time to deal with the designing of
9	this building.
10	MR. RON LEVY: Something I want to
11	point out, for some of you who haven't been here in
12	the past, my new boss, Glynn Ryan, who is sitting to
13	my right, is also the site manager for Fort McClellan.
14	So, he took over for Colonel Treuting. He is the
15	senior person out here now and just wanted to
16	introduce Glynn to the RAB, or at least the members
17	who have not met him in the past.
18	DR. BARRY COX: Ron, why don't we
19	go around, since I think everybody is probably here,
20	and start for the record and have everybody introduce
21	themselves, starting with Brother James over there.
22	MR. PAUL JAMES: I'm Paul James.
23	I'm in the environmental office here at

- 1 Fort McClellan.
- 2 MR. BOB DAFFRON: I'm Bob Daffron.
- 3 I work in the environmental office for the Alabama
- 4 National Guard Training Center.
- 5 MS. LISA KINGSBURY: Lisa
- 6 Kingsbury, Fort McClellan environmental office.
- 7 MR. GLYNN RYAN: Glynn Ryan, site
- 8 manager.
- 9 MR. FRANK COBB: Frank Cobb,
- 10 Alabama Guard Training Center.
- 11 MR. DAN THOMAS: Dan Thomas, HGS
- 12 Engineering.
- 13 MR. DON CUNNINGHAM: Don
- 14 Cunningham, Jacksonville.
- DR. MARY HARRINGTON: Mary
- 16 Harrington.
- 17 MAYOR KIMBROUGH: Ed Kimbrough.
- MR. RON LEVY: Ron Levy.
- 19 DR. BARRY COX: Of course, I meant
- the non-RAB members. But Barry Cox.
- 21 MR. PHILLIP STROUD: Phillip
- 22 Stroud, ADEM.
- 23 MR. JERRY ELSER: Jerome Elser.

that? Any other old business? 21 22 MR. RON LEVY: One of the things I 23 had promised the RAB that I still owe is a list of

1	sites
2	MR. RON MASSEY: EE/CAs and
3	documents for review.
4	MR. RON LEVY: yeah, for this
5	committee that we talked about. I still am on the
6	hook for that and I will intend to follow through on
7	that. We just haven't got that list nailed down, yet.
8	Hopefully, I expect to give it to you during the next
9	RAB meeting. It will be something that we agreed upon
10	would go before this technical review committee which
11	we voted on.
12	DR. BARRY COX: Did you have a list
13	of what happened last month?
14	MR. RON LEVY: We didn't really
15	have, in terms of the sheet we call
16	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Action summary
17	sheet
18	MR. RON MASSEY: Action summary.
19	MR. RON LEVY: Yeah, we didn't
20	really have anything significant to put down on the
21	action summary, at least not environmental.
22	DR. BARRY COX: Everybody on
23	vacation or

1	MR. RON LEVY: Yeah, it was just
2	there was a lot going on, but wasn't anything that was
3	significant to the group to put out, so we didn't
4	really put one out. Ron tried real hard to find
5	things, but we didn't, didn't find anything.
6	MR. RON MASSEY: We did want to try
7	to keep this meeting clear for the elections, as well.
8	MR. PHILLIP STROUD: Just old and
9	new business, I just want to verify this with Lisa.
10	But it's exciting from ADEM's side, because these
11	sites, it seems like you're going to have a flood of
12	sites coming down the turnpike for JPA. I don't know,
13	I'm seeing it happen quick now.
14	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Good.
15	MR. PHILLIP STROUD: It's really a
16	floodgate of them. And just glad to say that a lot of
17	them are unrestricted use, it seems like, a lot of
18	them. I don't want to speak too high, but it's
19	looking real good at this point.
20	MR. RON LEVY: There is just a
21	number of sites that are starting to drop out
22	MR. PHILLIP STROUD: Yes.
23	MR. RON LEVY: because we

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- 2 MR. PHILLIP STROUD: They're coming
- 3 fast.
- 4 MR. RON LEVY: Which is the good
- 5 news. There is still lots of sites out there that are
- 6 problematic that will go into various other levels of
- 7 investigation and potentially removal.
- 8 MR. DON CUNNINGHAM: What's the
- 9 deal in Buckner Circle? I should have asked Miki.
- 10 MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Sure. Buckner
- 11 Circle, we are in contract negotiations with a group
- 12 of local developers who are buying the two story
- houses around the circle, Remington Hall, Silver
- 14 Chapel, Building 65 and 66, I'm not sure what those
- uses of those buildings were. One was an old day
- 16 care, the rock building, and Drennan Drive. And they
- will sell all the homes. And they're buying 161, 162,
- 18 and 163. They were the old movie theater, gymnasium,
- 19 and chapel.
- 20 MR. RON LEVY: The intent there is
- 21 what, to put --
- MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: It will be a
- 23 commercial endeavor there. The theater will remain a

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1	theater, the gymnasium will be turned into offices,
2	and the old chapel building will be a deli-type
3	restaurant.

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4 And we hope to finish that contract 5 probably in the next couple of weeks with them. church will always remain a church. And Remington 7 Hall will be turned into a small conference center, 8 restaurant, open to the public.

> They're also getting the DDQ behind Remington Hall. They're going to reface that building and build two additional buildings in similar scale to it on the other side where the land comes to a point, and those will be rental, hotel-type units that you can come, if you're having something at Remington, you can stay there, or if you want to play golf for the weekend, you can stay in those.

We're real excited about that project. It's moving along quickly.

> MR. RON LEVY: We provided --Julian Jenkins is the architect behind that. All of the historical background information, include the nomination sheets because his intent was actually to get them put on the register. So, like to see that.

1	We know that there is some significance to those
2	buildings.
3	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Yes. The

buildings were determined eligible by the Alabama
Historical Commission, so Julian is finalizing the
actual nomination. And the nomination will be
submitted to the Alabama Historical Commission to
create that district up there. And then the buildings
will all be renovated under the Secretary of Interior
Standards for Historic Preservation. And on the
buildings that will be used commercially, he will be
able to take advantage of a 20 percent investment tax
credit.

MR. DON CUNNINGHAM: As a side

light, totally unrelated to that, the Henry Farm Barn

had its grand opening today.

17 MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Right.

18 MR. DON CUNNINGHAM: And it is on

19 the National Historic Register.

20 MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: And they took

advantage of the investment tax credit for that

22 project, as well.

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MR. RON LEVY: That's good news.

1	And point out that Miki has got a great interest in
2	that. I think that's what her background is in.
3	Do you want to go into new
4	business?
5	DR. BARRY COX: We only have seven
6	members, can we do
7	MR. RON LEVY: What I would
8	propose, though, is at least let Joan talk about the
9	nominees. You know, maybe we can have some discussion
10	about those. However you want to do this, but at
11	least Joan has some background to give.
12	DR. BARRY COX: We can't vote, so
13	we really
14	MR. RON LEVY: We can do this
15	again. But maybe folks can take the information back
16	with them and
17	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: The first issue
18	that I would like to ask the RAB to consider, is
19	determining what we should do with these nominations
20	that we keep on file. How long?
21	We have four, you know, that have
22	been on file for at least three years that I'm aware

of. And each time we go around, we call them and we

3 put them in the pile.

There is nothing in our bylaws that says one way or the other. And all I'm asking the RAB to do is determine an amount of time that we should even keep the nominations in file before we look for a new slate, and, of course, grandfather these in. For instance, let's just keep them in for two years.

I mean, it's up to you for discussion but, you know, these are even old nominations. We've gotten to the point that I can't speak too much about these nominees. I know who they are, because I've talked to them about their

15 qualifications in the past and can continue to do

that.

But I think I would like to just see nominations sit in a file for two years. And since it's not in the bylaws, we can do that and I can put a memo in the nomination file and say, the RAB on such and such a day, determined that this position would be two years in file and then, you know, inactive. Does that sound kind of --

1	DR. BARRY COX: Comments?
2	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Yes.
3	DR. BARRY COX: Mayor Kimrough?
4	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Or forever? I
5	mean, whatever y'all think.
6	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: I hate, if
7	they're still interested, but I don't think I think
8	we might put a requirement that if they're still
9	interested after a certain time, that they submit a
10	new application and update it.
11	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: I think that's
12	
13	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: And then if they
14	don't want to submit the application, then they would
15	be removed.
16	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: I think that's
17	very good.
18	MR. PHILLIP STROUD: That's a good
19	idea.
20	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: That's
21	excellent. And I think we could do that under this
2.2	forum right now I don't think that's anything that

-- unless you do, Barry. Let's go ahead and Ron and I

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1	make	а	memo	to	that	effect	for	the	next	meeting.
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Well then, if you want, I can go ahead and discuss the nominations a little bit. You have a ballot. How we propose to do this is make it simpler than we've ever done it in the past; we're going to just ask you to simply, when it comes time to vote, to vote for two people and put one and two, and then we'll just take them out and tally them up. But we do have ten.

Now, let me go over these one by one that we know. Mr. Clendenin is one that has been on file for the three to four years. Mr. Clendenin, I believe, is a friend of -- I had him before -- he did this, though, one other time. And I'm going to ask, as I know it, the people who might know to speak of Mr. Clendenin. I was going to ask you to.

MR. FRANK COBB: I would be glad to. Monty is the pastor of Covenant Presbyterian Church, right up here in the Lenlock area. He's a resident of Jacksonville. He's very interested in historical issues with the installation. He has a Cherokee background, some lineage that traces back to Oklahoma. He's big into artifacts, he's big into the

1	historical-type sites of the Indian culture. And
2	being a member of the community, a pastor of the
3	church in the community, I think he would be a great
4	fit. I'll entertain any questions anyone has on
5	Monty.
6	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: And he's
7	expressed the interest and has said that. And, of
8	course, you've already the general information,
9	much of that, I mean, he talks about his heritage and
10	the historical interest, and so he's we have
11	excellent, we have excellent applications here, so
12	it's not going to be easy, I think, for you all.
13	But again, what we talked about,
14	when you think of making your choices, is these next
15	several years are going to be so crucial, it's really
16	important that they represent not only their
17	neighborhood and their groups, but they in turn carry
18	the word out.
19	And I will tell you a little
20	information that I am discovering. As part of my
21	contract here, I am required to update the
22	community-relations plan. And I put together and just
23	finished a community survey. And one of the questions

1	says, what do you know about the RAB. I probably have
2	four hundred surveys that say they don't know anything
3	about the RAB. I probably have about four hundred
4	surveys that say they don't know anything about
5	anything. And listen, this was not these were
6	people that I looked at. I went across the board with
7	this. So, I think I'm only mentioning this because I
8	want you to understand, that whoever we select, we've
9	got to make sure that they're charged with telling the
10	community.
11	And I mean, Mr. Hall, we even
12	you know, you administered a portion of the survey for
13	us. So, we went across the board and we went face to
14	face with folks. So, it wasn't just kind of a mailout
15	and that sort of thing.
16	And it was an interesting thing to
17	me. I was surprised the people who said they didn't
18	know.
19	So, when you're selecting, do think
20	that that's what we've got to charge them with.
21	Mr. Thrash. I believe Mr. Thrash
22	is an elderly gentleman. We do call him. A couple of

times we've had to run him down, because he changed

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1	locations and phone numbers, but he still expresses an
2	interest. And other than his application, that's
3	about all that I do know about Mr. Thrash.
4	Mr. Polek. Mr. Polek's a retired
5	ward officer who was here at the Fort. I believe he
6	was a personnel, I think, in Mil-Par (phonetic). So,
7	he has the military background here at the Fort. But
8	he does work in Talladega and he does live out in
9	Ohatchee.
10	And that's kind of so, I think
11	his interest there is probably because he was assigned
12	here, and kind of like a lot of us who worked here for
13	many years, kind of had that close tie.
14	Let me just go down. Mr. Freeman,
15	is I have never met Mr. Freeman, but
16	Craig Branchfield had obtained this nomination from
17	Mr. Freeman. And so, he is, of course, you know, out
18	there at Solutia; he has some of the technical
19	information.
20	Again, what I would suggest to you

all is as you're looking at some of these, you're

talking about this technical committee you're putting

together, we had four names that are going to be on

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1	the technical committee, but we're going to have a
2	problem with attendance. You know, Craig wanted to be
3	here tonight. But even if you had documents tonight
4	for people to look at, two of your technical folks
5	aren't here. So, I think you ought to consider
6	technical people while you're looking at the
7	nominations.
8	Mr. Curtis Franklin. Mr. Curtis
9	Franklin comes to us courtesy of Mayor Kimbrough.
10	You're on, Mayor.
11	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: Mr. Franklin is
12	an engineering graduate of Georgia Tech. He's been
13	basically in industry, different industry for the
14	environmental aspect of it. As he says, he's kind of
15	a contractor now, working with several, but his main
16	is Defense Research, Incorporated.
17	But he is very active in our
18	community. And, you know, I support him because I'm
19	the only one from our community, and we're adjacent to
20	Fort McClellan and we have discussed several times the
21	dangers that could take place and affect our

community. And I think this man would be a definite

asset. He would be to me because he knows the

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1	technology and the terms and all, which I've said, I
2	don't understand all of the majority and (inaudible)
3	and everything.
4	And I would appreciate
5	consideration. I know we have pretty good
6	representation from Anniston and Jacksonville, and I'm
7	the only member from Weaver, so I would like to ask
8	everybody to look and add one more, since we are the
9	surrounding areas that would be affected by anything
10	out here.
11	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Larry Hatcher,
12	again, was another engineer that Craig talked into
13	applying. And I have never met Mr. Hatcher, either,
14	so you know as much as I do about him with the
15	information sheet. But I think that, you know, again,
16	when you're looking at the technical committee, there
17	is another candidate.
18	Colonel Matteson, we all know
19	Colonel Matteson. Colonel Matteson has an interest in
20	everything that goes on in the community.
21	Colonel Matteson is an oral communicator. I believe
22	he attended here once, if I'm not mistaken. And we
23	know that what he learns from here, he'll call the

1	radio the next day. So, I mean, you know, there's
2	I'm trying to give you the pluses and minuses. So, we
3	know, Colonel Matteson.
4	Scott Beckett Scott was going to

Scott Beckett. Scott was going to
be here tonight. And he was here last month and he
talked about his interest and was available for
questions. Pete has worked with him in the past, as
you'll remember from last month's interview. I'm sure
that -- he did indicate to me he was coming tonight,
so, something must have occurred that he wasn't here.

But Scott has some of -- oh, yes, that's right. I'm

But Scott has some of -- oh, yes, that's right. I'm
sorry --

MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: He did call me

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MS. JOAN McKINNEY: -- it was

through you that I got the conflict.

17 MR. MIKI SCHNEIDER: -- because
18 there was a conflict, yes, that came up at work.

I think what Scott would bring to the table for us is an expertise in the long leaf pine. So, he did his master's thesis from Auburn on the long leaf pine in the Talladega National Forest, and his Ph.D. work, again, was in forestry. And as we

1	begin to get into the issues regarding the wildlife
2	refuge, he will bring that expertise to the table.
3	And I would encourage you to consider him.
4	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Well, I also
5	think that he's out in the community, he lives in
6	Alexandria
7	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: He lives in
8	Alexandria, that's correct.
9	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: And he also
10	teaches where does he teach?
11	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: JSU, math and
12	science.
13	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: And he was a
14	high school teacher. So, I mean, I think his sphere
15	of influence in that area is broad and good.
16	And Jerry Hopper, this is another
17	one from Solutia. Now, Craig asked us to pass on that
18	of the three that he brought to the table, he would
19	recommend Jerry of those three to you. I, myself,
20	have I know Jerry rather well, and worked with him
21	at other places. He's articulate and he does he
22	does discuss groups, he makes a lot of presentations

on behalf of not only Solutia, but his interest in the

1	community. He does a lot of volunteer work. And I
2	just think that Craig also wanted to remind the group
3	that he is out in the community and he does make a
4	point of communicating.
5	MR. DAN THOMAS: Jerry also is the
6	hands-on remediation
7	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Right.
8	MR. DAN THOMAS: person out
9	there.
10	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Right, yes. I
11	mean, Craig is the remediation manager, but Jerry is
12	the leg man.
13	MR. DAN THOMAS: Jerry works right
14	under him
15	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: You're right.
16	MR. DAN THOMAS: and does a lot
17	of the legwork.
18	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: And he's the
19	one that's been out in the streams and soils and
20	everything.
21	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Fun.
22	MS. DONNA FATHKE: Is it

23 contagious?

1	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: I had not
2	noticed.
3	And Mr. Gilliland, other than us
4	talking to Mr. Gilliland and you see his fine
5	background that's about what we know about
6	Mr. Gilliland.
7	Now, the only other thing that I
8	would mention to you all is: Although we have all of
9	these folks, we have never, to the best of my
10	knowledge and Ron maybe you can back me up on this
11	had phone calls from any of them asking about RAB,
12	about whatever.
13	I think they have the interest, and
14	I certainly think they would be very good candidates
15	for us, but I think you also needed to know that other
16	than the occasional attendance here, none of them have
17	done very much in saying, what's going on out there or
18	expressing the interest off-line.
19	So, you know, it's just one of
20	those things like all of us that belong to
21	organizations, once we get on, we're probably going to
22	be real good members, but we just haven't done much
23	prior to that.

1	Can I answer any other questions
2	about the candidates?
3	DR. BARRY COX: Not about the
4	candidates. There is a couple of things I would like
5	to bring up. One of the things that comes to mind is
6	when we're talking about replacing the two, you start
7	looking down the roll, it looks like we're coming very
8	closely up on a point to replace maybe already the
9	would replace more than two.
10	And one other question I would like
11	to ask for the group is: When we say attend 50
12	percent of the meetings, do we mean physically attend
13	50 percent of the meetings?
14	In other words, if you call in and
15	say that you're not going to be here, does that carry
16	any weight? Or do we want people here that can make
17	50 percent of the meetings?
18	MS. DONNA FATHKE: I think we want
19	people here for 50 percent of the time. If they're
20	not here that much, then they're having too many
21	conflicts.
22	MR. JERRY ELSER: If they're here
23	less than 50 percent, then

1	DR. BARRY COX: So, the
2	interpretation is, is, as it states here, the
3	attendance, regular members may be removed if they
4	fail to attend 50 percent of the regular RAB meetings
5	in a calendar year? And so we interpret that that
6	calling in, you can't we don't have excused
7	absences then.
8	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: It says "may,"
9	though, it doesn't say shall.
10	DR. BARRY COX: That's correct.
11	And so I guess then that's the question, that's the
12	question before the group: Do we want to remove
13	people that have not attended 50 percent of the
14	meetings?
15	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: I think the
16	people we removed hadn't attended any, had they not?
17	DR. BARRY COX: True. But I think
18	correct me if I'm wrong but I believe we now
19	have some more that have not made 50 percent of this
20	calendar year.
21	MS. DONNA FATHKE: Well, problem
22	is, is, we're having a very difficult time making
23	quorum, and that's because people don't show up,

- 1 regularly.
- DR. BARRY COX: That's correct.
- And so we can't conduct business tonight, technically,
- 4 because they're not here.
- 5 MS. DONNA FATHKE: It is affecting
- 6 our operations here, so I think we need to consider
- 7 this, seriously.
- 8 MR. RON LEVY: Do you want a
- 9 run-down of the people who are right now? Ron?
- DR. BARRY COX: Is it this right
- 11 here?
- 12 MR. RON MASSEY: Yeah, you've got
- the same thing.
- DR. BARRY COX: You can check and
- see if I'm right, though. Your math is probably --
- 16 since you're the --
- 17 MR. RON MASSEY: Well, this is the
- 18 ninth month.
- MR. JERRY ELSER: Right.
- MR. RON MASSEY: So, we've got
- 21 Mr. Turecek who has made two out of nine.
- DR. BARRY COX: So, he's got seven
- 23 misses. Margarette Longstreth is at six; is that

1	correct?
2	MR. RON MASSEY: Uh-huh.
3	DR. BARRY COX: And then what about
4	this one right there?
5	MR. RON MASSEY: He's at the sixth.
6	We've got Mr. Brown at six absences. Ms. Longstreth
7	at six. Mr. Turecek at seven. And although Mr. Hood
8	was fairly regular, he hasn't lately. But we've got
9	at least three then that are qualified, you know, who
10	qualify, unless they have, you know, perfect
11	attendance for the rest of the year.
12	DR. BARRY COX: Actually, Pete has
13	missed six, hasn't he?
14	MR. RON MASSEY: Uh-huh.
15	DR. BARRY COX: So, we've got
16	another one
17	MR. RON MASSEY: Well, one, two
18	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: How about Pete,
19	he's close to six.
20	MR. RON MASSEY: Yeah, he's six.
21	DR. BARRY COX: So, we have to wait
22	until next time when we have a quorum to vote on this,

I guess. But we have now four people that have missed

1	a minimum of six meetings out of nine.
2	MS. DONNA FATHKE: Do we need to
3	offer them the same courtesy that we offered the other
4	people; that is
5	MR. RON MASSEY: The two letters.
6	MS. DONNA FATHKE: write them a
7	letter first and see what their interests are?
8	DR. BARRY COX: But as you pointed
9	out, if we don't do something, we're hampered in doing
10	business.
11	MR. JAMES HALL: Can you do that
12	without having that in your bylaws?
13	DR. BARRY COX: It's in the bylaws.
14	MR. JAMES HALL: So, they're
15	familiar with that?
16	DR. BARRY COX: That's what I was
17	reading was the bylaws. It is, may remove. As the
18	Mayor said, we may remove anybody that does not attend
19	50 percent of the calendar year.
20	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: And, you know,
21	Mr. Hood may have to, because he warned us a couple of

months back, indicating he was going to be on

different times and he just couldn't make the meetings

22

1	most nights, so that his work hours had changed.
2	MR. RON LEVY: Certainly, we're
3	prepared to put any letters together for you, you
4	know. You got to remember that I am not a voting
5	member of the RAB. Although, I'm a co-chair, I'm not
6	a voting member, and neither is anybody on the BCT.
7	So, this is a decision amongst the community members.
8	If that's what you want, we'll put the letters
9	together, going out, expressing our concern, and
10	asking if they want to continue to attend.
11	MS. DONNA FATHKE: I would suggest
12	we do that and ask them to respond before our next
13	meeting so that we can make some decisions at the next
14	meeting, not let this go on too much longer.
15	MR. RON LEVY: Can we do that
16	without a quorum? That's always been our problem.
17	DR. BARRY COX: We can. Let me
18	make two suggestions: Number one, let's send a letter
19	out to the ones that have missed six or more. And you
20	can put that up into level of seriousness, that
21	they're ready to be removed. And then maybe send one
22	out to the ones that have missed four or more and ask
23	them to reaffirm their interest in the RAB.

1	MR. RON LEVY: Do you want to sign
2	that letter going out?
3	DR. BARRY COX: If you want me to
4	sign it, I'll be glad to.
5	MR. RON LEVY: Yeah, we can do
6	that. In fact, we can prepare something.
7	DR. BARRY COX: How does that sound
8	to the
9	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Well, we've got
10	a template. We've done this before, so we can just
11	get that out and dust it off.
12	MR. RON LEVY: I know there are
13	probably members out there who are definitely in
14	absence but would still like to attend and go on. I'm
15	sure Pete's probably one of them. But you're right,
16	it is hampering and it's very difficult to get any
17	decisions and move on without enough folks here at the
18	meetings, unless we change the bylaws again, which
19	we've done once
20	DR. BARRY COX: We had 70 at one
21	time.
22	MR. RON LEVY: Define what a quorum
23	really is.

1	DR. BARRY COX: Any other comments
2	on that
3	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: I think if I
4	could suggest something when we send those letters
5	out, why don't we also ask them if they are unable to
6	attend, could they nominate a replacement. Would they
7	have someone, a colleague, would they might have as
8	replacing them. Even though we've been asking them to
9	come up with a nomination, it might be
10	DR. MARY HARRINGTON: I really
11	don't think I mean, it's fine to do that, but I
12	really think we ought to select the people from the
13	names that we have, unless somebody else you know,
14	I may send in somebody's name and they may tell me,
15	yeah, I'm interested in attending, and they may not
16	be, you know, it may conflict. That's okay for people
17	we take our applications ongoing, anyway.
18	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: And that's what
19	it would be, just an application. Because you see the
20	pool, we've got ten, good group right now, but
21	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: I'm on several
22	that are that way, that will get somebody on their
23	staff, you know, if they can't be there, then they'll

1	they have to be named, that they
2	DR. BARRY COX: What we were just
3	talking about off-line here was, Joan, you know the
4	situation we have at the Anniston Army Depot RAB, that
5	we have people that represent a specific group, just
6	like Mayor Kimbrough, of course, represents the City
7	of Weaver. And for example in that one, we would say
8	that if Mayor Kimbrough can't come, then he can have
9	an alternate member
10	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Right.
11	DR. BARRY COX: from his staff
12	to be here, to be present.
13	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Right.
14	DR. BARRY COX: But I think that's
15	really not necessarily the case in this RAB. Most of
16	us don't necessarily represent a particular
17	organization.
18	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: No, and that's
19	a larger RAB, also.
20	DR. BARRY COX: Yes.
21	MR. JOAN McKINNEY: But that is
22	something and we've tried to aim for this. We've

talked about this many times, that we really needed to

1	target the people and go out and ask certain sectors
2	to send a representative. And even that's been very
3	tough.
4	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: People that are
5	really interested and really have true conflicts, you
6	know, that would be a way that, you know, a
7	possibility, if somebody was there, then they would
8	keep updated and there would be communications between
9	the two of them. I would just I would hate to see
10	somebody that really could contribute and then, you
11	know, we they feel like that they've been shut out.
12	But still we've got to be able to do business, also.
13	DR. BARRY COX: Correct, correct.
14	MR. RON LEVY: Any further
15	discussion?
16	MR. PHILLIP STROUD: Well, next RAE
17	meeting, I'm happy to say, we have another ADEM
18	employee coming out. His name is Shannon Golden. And
19	he'll be here next RAB meeting. And he's coming from
20	the DOT over to ADEM. And he'll take a huge load off
21	of me, in the review, and also getting out in the
22	field and things like that. We'll have many more eyes
23	up here, roaming, especially when we're getting to

MR. PHILLIP STROUD: Ganett

Fleming. I don't know how that would work. I will

22

1	see how he feels about it, though.
2	MR. RON LEVY: I would certainly
3	think you want to go on record as saying that you
4	expect the BCT members to be here during regularly
5	scheduled RAB meetings, and we could make that as a
6	point. You know, unless there is some compelling
7	reason why we, the BCT, are not capable of meeting, we
8	ought to be here. I mean, I totally agree with that.
9	DR. BARRY COX: So, why don't we
10	pen a letter to that effect then?
11	MR. RON LEVY: Yes, that one
12	definitely needs to come from you.
13	DR. BARRY COX: No problem. Is
14	that the consensus of the members present, that we
15	would like to have a representative from both ADEM and
16	EPA at each of our meetings?
17	MR. RON LEVY: And I'll be glad to
18	draft a letter to that effect for you.
19	MR. PHILLIP STROUD: For example,
20	for ADEM, it will be either my boss, Larry Bryant, he

always says, if I can't make it, he'll be here. Or it

MR. RON LEVY: And I would make a

would be one of my cohorts.

- 1 suggestion, Glynn, that if I'm not available, Glynn,
- who is the site manager, sits in for me.
- MR. GLYNN RYAN: Thank you, Ron.
- 4 Just what I really need.
- 5 MR. RON LEVY: You'll have the
- 6 environmental folks, staff. In fact, it's in their
- 7 contract.
- 8 DR. BARRY COX: We have the colonel
- 9 from the Depot is the co-chair, so we may just vote
- 10 Ron out and have you sit.
- 11 (WHEREUPON, there was discussion off the record.)
- DR. BARRY COX: Any other comments
- on this ladies and gentlemen? I assume we have to
- stay here because we can't adjourn because we don't
- 15 have a quorum.
- 16 MR. JAMES HALL: Do you have a list
- of the directory of the members of the board?
- 18 MR. RON MASSEY: What kind of
- 19 directory?
- MR. RON LEVY: I'm sorry? Please,
- 21 Mr. Hall is trying to --
- 22 MR. JAMES HALL: A list of the
- 23 board available?

1	MR. RON LEVY: Yes, we can give you
2	a list of the names of the individuals on the board.
3	We're a little reluctant to give out phone numbers,
4	obviously, because that's a privacy issue, but we
5	certainly can give you a list of the folks who are on
6	the board.
7	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: Isn't it on our
8	web site?
9	DR. BARRY COX: Didn't we put ours
10	on the web site? Joan, did we put
11	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: It should be.
12	They're still under construction.
13	MR. RON LEVY: Yes, in fact, that's
14	right, it is, it is on our web site. Yes, it is.
15	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: And we have
16	Privacy Act statement releases from everyone. And
17	those that we didn't, their names simply aren't on
18	there.
19	DR. BARRY COX: Why don't you just
20	give him whatever's up there then
21	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Yes.
22	DR. BARRY COX: since we've
23	already released that?

1	MR. RON LEVY: If you want a hard
2	copy, I think we can give that to you before we leave.
3	DR. BARRY COX: Okay. Of course,
4	this is the time for the audience comments. Does
5	anybody else in the audience have any comments?
6	MR. PHILLIP STROUD: Do you want to
7	talk about the MOA LUCAP? We've talked quite a bit
8	about it. And the last signature on that is the Fish
9	& Wildlife, and so it's going to be close.
10	MR. RON LEVY: Yeah, in fact we're
11	still waiting for Fish & Wildlife to make a decision
12	as to whether they're going to be a full signatory or
13	an interested party. And I understand that decision
14	is still being considered. So, signing of the full
15	LUCAP land use control assurance plan is still
16	to be determined. We originally had scheduled the
17	15th. That's the same date we were going to do the
18	MOA, as well. And that's been pushed off until the
19	15th of October. So, I suspect we're still looking 15
20	October, Glynn, for
21	MR. GLYNN RYAN: I think so.
22	MR. RON LEVY: And I know that
23	probably doesn't mean a whole lot to you, but those

1	are significant documents. I mean, those are
2	agreements that are really hard, in terms of coming
3	to. I mean, there is a lot of detail in those. And
4	Miki is smiling, because she knows how difficult it's
5	been. But there are some real significance to those.
6	And we think that they're good documents and they
7	provide a lot, both to the Army and back to EPA and
8	the state, as well as the JPA. Paul James has got a
9	comment.
10	MR. PAUL JAMES: Also like to point
11	out that this document will probably be a precedence
12	setter for all of Department of Defense. In other
13	words, it will probably be the example of that if
14	there are any future BRAC closures or any types of
15	things that this document will in fact be a precedent
16	setter.
17	MR. RON LEVY: He's talking about
18	the land use control assurance plan.
19	MR. PHILLIP STROUD: When I've been
20	to some of the seminars and our conferences and UXO or
21	land use controls, I noticed this is one of the
22	hottest issues, a landmark case in the United States.

And I know there is going to be a big press release.

MR. PHILLIP STROUD: That's a good idea. The way I look at it is that you can clean up things so far, monetarily or whatever, and then there is residual risk, little things that you just almost

1	can't get rid of. And this manages the residual risk,
2	forever.
3	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Forever,
4	right. And that's the key to it. And that's the
5	important piece to it is what we do, who actually has
6	the enforcement, when Ron is gone and we're all gone
7	from here, how is that land use control dealt with
8	long term?
9	MR. PAUL JAMES: Or until we get a
10	new
11	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Right
12	MR. PAUL JAMES: technology that
13	permits us to come back in
14	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Right
15	MR. PAUL JAMES: and clean that
16	up, at which time that institutional control
17	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Goes away.
18	MR. PAUL JAMES: or land use
19	controls would then in fact be terminated.
20	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: And that was
21	in our goal in that document, too, was to make sure

that as many land use controls as possible went away

and that we were able to clean the issue up.

22

1	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: Some of this land
2	can be used with restrictions on it?
3	MR. PHILLIP STROUD: Yes.
4	MS. DONNA FATHKE: Is this document
5	formulated by the environmental mental office?
6	MR. RON LEVY: This document is an
7	agreement between three governmental agencies and it
8	was written together. Actually, four, when you
9	consider the JPA. And it was written together. It
10	was sat down and hammered out amongst all the
11	agencies, so it wasn't any one agency. We took the
12	lead in it, obviously, but it was all worked out. And
13	we sat down at a table and there was several, several
14	meetings over it and lots of discussion and a whole
15	bunch of attorneys involved. And it really is, it's a
16	unique document. I could
17	MR. PAUL JAMES: This process
18	started in April of last year and there is eighteen
19	months go off the record.
20	(WHEREUPON, there was discussion off the record.)
21	MR. DON CUNNINGHAM: So, what's the
22	bottom line then? My question is: Then that becomes
23	the document that ultimately is the basis for which an

1	industry	or	business	accepts	that	piece	οf	property,

- with those provisions. Is that it?
- 3 MR. RON LEVY: Let me see if I
- 4 can't explain.

- 5 MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: That is an
- 6 administrative document.

7 MR. RON LEVY: The land use control

8 assurance plan says that we will develop land use

9 control implementation plans. So, for each piece of

10 property where we know that we can't get to

11 unrestricted use or full cleanup, we are going to

develop a plan that tells us how we are going to

13 handle that piece of property and what restrictions

that we all agree will go on it. As for an example,

if we had a piece of property where we know we had

16 ground water contamination, okay, we know that it may

17 be thirty to forty years before that, either through

18 natural attenuation or some sort of treatment, that

19 that ground water contamination is going to be there,

20 then we're going to want to put a restriction on that

21 property. And the restriction might be: No drilling,

22 no digging, you know, certainly no sinking of wells so

that people can be exposed. So, that's kind of a

1	restriction. That restriction will then equate to
2	what goes into a deed, as well as other long-term
3	requirements, either placed on the Army or a third
4	party, potentially, a third party, as well, who
5	accepts that property, to continue those restrictions
6	in place. That's what we've got to come to.
7	Once we get through LUCAP, the land
8	use control assurance plan, we've still got to come to
9	an agreement on what controls are in place. And
10	obviously, from the JPA's standpoint, they want to
11	market the property so the least amount of controls is
12	the best for them.
13	For us, or for the regulators, the
14	most amount of controls, if we think that there is
15	going to be an exposure to personnel. So, there is
16	going to be some negotiation going on there. The
17	expectation is that whatever is finally negotiated, it
18	is restrictive enough or it is protective enough so
19	that whoever gets that property cannot do something
20	that would expose people to whatever hazards.
21	Because, as we've talked all along,
22	we all know there is property out there that we cannot
23	completely clean up. There is just either not enough

1	money or the technology is not available to do that.
2	But what we don't want to do is something stupid like
3	we did in years, years ago, where we, you know,
4	covered something up and then transferred the property
5	you know, Love Canal would be the example and
6	then they start building houses on top of it. And the
7	next thing you know, people are being exposed.
8	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: I think it's
9	important to point out that the JPA certainly wants to
10	protect the health, safety, and welfare of the future
11	owners of this property out here. However, we have
12	sent a clear message through the memorandum of
13	agreement with the Army that we want them to do
14	everything in their power to clean this property up.
15	Financial reasons are just not acceptable. Clean it
16	up. We want to see it cleaned up to the highest and
17	best use of the property. And that's been coming from
18	my board consistently.
19	MR. RON LEVY: Certainly, that's
20	the case, you know, you do everything you can to clean
21	the property up. And then at that point you start
22	looking at whatever controls that you can put in

place.

1	And as we've talked about before,
2	there is deed restrictions, which can be institutional
3	controls and then there is physical controls, such as
4	barriers, fences, and, you know, what have you. So,
5	it could be a number of things.
6	MS. DONNA FATHKE: So, when it
7	comes to a specific piece of property and somebody has
8	to decide which restrictions are being put on that
9	property, who makes those decisions?
10	MR. RON LEVY: Well, that's
11	something we're going to
12	DR. MARY HARRINGTON: That's where
13	the BCT gets involved.
14	MR. RON LEVY: That's where the BCT
15	gets involved and the JPA, because part of LUCAP says
16	who is going to review these.
17	You know, we, the Army, are going
18	to define what we think are necessary done. There is
19	a review on the part from the regulators and there is
20	also a review on the part of the JPA. And Fish &
21	Wildlife are involved, they're a signatory, they would
22	be involved in it, too, mostly because a good piece of
23	the property is going to them.

1	Before anything is agreed to, there
2	is provisions within the LUCAP that says, you know,
3	these folks have to review. Although, we don't
4	necessarily have to have their concurrence, we can
5	move forward without it, but and just so you all
6	understand that
7	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: We understand
8	it.
9	MR. RON LEVY: If you've not had a
10	copy of the LUCAP, we'll certainly give you the draft
11	one. It's
12	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: It's very
13	interesting reading.
14	MR. RON LEVY: Yeah. It was
15	written by a lawyer. How many pages? I want to say
16	it's about fifteen pages or so.
17	DR. BARRY COX: Just Email us one
18	out then.
19	MR. RON LEVY: Yeah, we can do
20	that, too. Just remember, it's not signed, still in a
21	draft. So, anything we send to you Joan, we want
22	to Email it to the folks who have Email. It had some
23	maps with it. too. so and they're JEPG files. if

1	you	can	open	those.
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- 2 MR. PHILLIP STROUD: One last thing
- 3 about it. The reason the delay was for the Fish &
- 4 Wildlife was is, you know, they're going to be
- 5 inheriting several thousand acres, so they have a
- 6 direct link to this. And it was kind of odd at first,
- 7 when I first came in, why aren't they wanting to sign
- 8 this thing, if they're going to be getting it all?
- 9 But they finally agreed on it. And that was the delay
- 10 there. And now it's moving ahead.
- 11 MR. RON LEVY: Well, I don't think
- they've agreed, yet.
- 13 MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: They haven't
- 14 agreed.
- MR. PHILLIP STROUD: They still
- 16 haven't?
- MR. RON LEVY: No. They're still
- 18 --
- 19 MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: No. The last
- 20 Email traffic I saw, they were --
- MR. RON LEVY: No, they haven't
- 22 agreed. I haven't gotten anything on that.
- 23 MR. PHILLIP STROUD: Oh, wow. When

1	
2	MR. RON LEVY: They're still
3	looking at it.
4	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Last week.
5	MR. PHILLIP STROUD: I think I got
6	that same one, may be.
7	MR. RON LEVY: Although, I think
8	they're at least interested in being an interested
9	party.
10	MR. PHILLIP STROUD: Interested
11	party, yes.
12	MR. RON LEVY: Before we finish up,
13	I guess we're going to just so you know, that my
14	office is still at your disposal, if you're looking
15	for information. You've got our number, call back,
16	we'll be absolutely glad to provide you with anything
17	that you need, relating to the clean up at
18	Fort McClellan.
19	Anything about reuse, talk to Miki.
20	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Thanks.
21	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: Barry, last
22	meeting, some of you asked me to get and I've got
23	one. I gave it to the staff. But the timeline on the

1	bypass and the date of construction that they have
2	this is the latest one, now. I understand they met
3	last week. But in this one, the date of construction
4	on the last section of the bypass, which will be
5	through the Fort, is set the contract for
6	construction on this is set to be let on November the
7	2nd, 2001. And that's for forty-three million, almost
8	forty-four million dollars. And, of course, that's in
9	three phases, as far as from the interstate to
10	Greenbrier and then Greenbrier out to Choccolocco Road
11	and then from Choccolocco Road to the rest of it.
12	But this is what we get at the MPO.
13	And so, I have given them a copy, if they want to get
14	it.
15	But you've got really four phases,
16	you've got pre-engineering, you've got the purchase of
17	utilities, and moving of them, and the right-of-way
18	acquisition, and then, of course, construction.
19	MR. RON LEVY: I want to go on
20	record to say that changes to the right-of-way have
21	affected our clean up, that we did not know about.
22	So, we're looking at that right now. In fact, there
23	is additional acreage that was not originally

1	considered in the initial right-of-way that we were
2	given. And we told ALDOT that. So, we have to go
3	back now and relook at what they most recently gave
4	us. And in fact, what we're told is: Until the
5	survey is complete and the survey is not complete
6	there could be some additional changes, as well.
