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## 1 MR. BOB DAFFRON: Got excited over 2 there. 3 MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: Real 4 briefly, for the members of the audience, the format 5 of the meeting is we have an agenda we'll be going through here. And we ask the audience to hold all 7 your questions or comments until the end of the 8 meeting. We do have a section where we invite the 9 audience to share any thoughts or concerns they might 10 have. 11 But we are glad you could make it. 12 I think, in the two years I've been here, this is probably the most number of participants we've had 13 14 that aren't immediate members of the RAB or part of 15 the Army or one of their contractors or something, so, 16 this is good, this is a good change for us. 17 Moving on down the agenda. 18 Approval of the minutes for September. Has everybody 19 had an opportunity to review the minutes? I know 20 everybody reads them as soon as they get them in the 21 mail. Right? 22 MS. JOAN McKINNEY: All four pages.

MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: Were there

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any questions or comments on the minutes for
September? If not, do I hear a motion to what's
the right term enter the minutes or approve the
minutes for September?
MAYOR WILLIAM KIMBROUGH: So moved.
MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: Second?

8	has been no definite agreement, yet.
9	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: Anything

11	Onto the new business. And we
12	start off with the agency reports. We'll start off
13	with Philip.
14	MR. PHILLIP STROUD: All right.
15	MR. RON LEVY: Hang on a second.
16	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: Do I have
17	the wrong agenda here?
18	MR. RON LEVY: No, the new business
19	is there is some new business. And then agency
20	reports is actually a separate topic, altogether.
21	Although, I do know Miki has to leave here at 7:20 and

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1 so far. MR. RON LEVY: Go ahead, Miki. 3 Let's go ahead with Miki. MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: All right, 5 start with you. MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: 6 The JPA has 7 been -- for those of you who don't know, I'm Miki 8 Schneider, I'm with the Joint Powers Authority, and 9 we're the agency that disposes of the property that's 10 transferred from the Army to us. We closed on the Buckner Circle 11 property last week, sold all that property. It's now 12 13 under renovation. You'll start seeing people living 14 up there soon, which we're real excited about. We are, this week, to close on the 15 16 houses out on Highway 21, the Capehart houses. 17 of those have been demolished and new homes are going 18 to be built there along the golf course. 19 Colyer-Lloyd and Harbert 20 Construction out of Birmingham have purchased all

those properties, the Capehart houses and the land

- 22 along the golf course and they'll be building new
- homes there.

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1	We have proceeded with the
2	privatization piece that we've talked about at this
3	meeting. We now have a map that we've sent up to
4	Army and they're looking at and working with us on
5	fine tuning that map and understanding what all would
6	be involved in that area.
7	And hopefully, at the next RAB
8	no, I won't be here in November in December RAB
9	meeting, hopefully, I can come and bring a copy of
10	that and let you look at it and explain to you what
11	we're doing, at that point.
12	MR. RON LEVY: Generally, want to
13	point out that we don't have a RAB meeting in December
14	because all the holidays and conflicts with people's
15	schedules.
16	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Then January.
17	MS. DONNA FATHKE: You may want to
18	explain to the audience what privatization is.
19	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: We're looking
20	at taking an area of McClellan that's currently still
21	in the Army's hands and bringing it into the JPA's

22 hands. And the cleanup would be done outside the Army

23 umbrella, it would be done by private industry. And

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1	hopefully, that will speed up the process a little
2	quicker.
3	This is an area that we've
4	designated for industrial development and we want to
5	get the area clean so we can get jobs in here quicker.
6	Hunjan, which is the company from
7	Canada that bought building 350, the industrial
8	building H-U-N-J-A-N they are coming here this
9	week to close on that property. They'll be
10	thirty-five to forty jobs right up front, the first
11	year, and upwards of two hundred by the end of the
12	second year.
13	It's a company that's a tier-two
14	Honda supplier. They're a plastics company. We're
15	real excited about their coming to this community.
16	I think that's about it. Any
17	questions?
18	MR. GLYNN RYAN: Could you explain
19	the early transfer privatization in a little bit more
20	detail, Miki. I mean, you kind of went over the

21	privatization as cleanup, but I mean, there's an early
22	transfer piece of that, too, that's
23	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Well, I
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1	thought we'd been over that before. But basically,
2	it's that the early the property will transfer from
3	the Army's hands to the JPA. And then the JPA will
4	clean the property with the funds that are provided by
5	the Army.
6	They'll be insurance that will be
7	put in place. We already have insurance on a lot of
8	our property out here that we've been working with.
9	MR. GLYNN RYAN: Thank you.
10	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Uh-huh.
11	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: Any
12	questions for Miki before she has to leave us?
13	MAYOR WILLIAM KIMBROUGH: Are there
14	any plans to include this body?
15	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Absolutely.
16	MR. BRANCHFIELD: Okay, good.
17	Thank you.
18	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Thank you.
19	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: Ron?

20 MR. RON LEVY: Yeah. In terms of 21 just -- I guess we could finish up with the agency reports. But EPA, because of travel restrictions and 22 23 essentially due to funding, wasn't able to attend this P.O. BOX 544 OHATCHEE, AL 36271 256-892-0591 FAX 256-892-3001 NOBLE & ASSOCIATES 13 1 meeting. We hope to have them back on track next 2 month, but, you know, dollars are scarce for them 3 right now. But I don't know, I think Philip may want to do his spiel, then we can go into two things that 5 need to be discussed. MR. PHILIP STROUD: I'm heavily into 7 the review process. It's real thick right now, so it's hard to break me away from reports at this time. 8 So, if y'all need me, I'll be -- my head's in a book 9 somewhere and going after it. 10 11 This is a list -- I'm going to pass 12 them around here -- of what I've been reviewing. 13 You'll see some of the completed review dates. the ones that are pending does not necessarily mean 14 15 they have not been reviewed. They're under a review 16 process from others at ADEM. We're in -- there are a lot of 17

drafts here -- of course, there are a lot of finals,

too, but a lot of drafts that are taking quite a bit

18

of time. We're going over the landfill EE/CAs, a lot
to do with unexploded ordnance. But we're making
tremendous progress right now, given the amount of
reports still here.

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1	Now, like to say a couple of things
2	again. Where it says pending, said there are quite a
3	few. I'd say at least a dozen of these have been
4	reviewed and are waiting to be sent to Ron Levy, the
5	Army. And this is still not a complete list of
6	everything that we have. There's still boxes that
7	are unopened that are just waiting their turn to be
8	opened. So, you can probably add about a dozen more
9	to this, this list, that we're still logging in.
10	But this just kind of shows you the
11	sheer number of reports from April. And some of
12	these things are very extensive. That's about all
13	I've got to offer right now.
14	MS. DONNA FATHKE: Philip, what does
15	LC stand for?
16	MR. PHILIP STROUD: I'm sorry.
17	And that didn't type at the bottom here, I noticed
18	that. That's let's see

19 MR. RON LEVY: Letter complete? 20 MR. PHILIP STROUD: No, that's 21 going to be a letter of concurrence that we've worked 22 out. And where it says comments, that means comments have been sent and some of these will -- are pending 23 P.O. BOX 544 OHATCHEE, AL 36271 256-892-0591 FAX 256-892-3001 NOBLE & ASSOCIATES 15 1 comments until I've agreed to them and ADEM -- or 2. ADEM's agreed to the -- that they've been 3 incorporated. If you see a letter of concurrence, 5 that means that some of these -- some of the comments 6 have been incorporated and we've agreed to them and 7 they are now concurred upon. And I think that's the latest. 8 9 spoke to Doyle, briefly, Doyle Brittain, EPA, and he 10 said the same thing Ron said. And matter of fact, he 11 is sending in some comments, too, that had his Ph.D. 12 level -- I guess this will be in risk assessment, in 13 EE/CA risk. 14 And I feel very comfortable the way they're doing things there. As a matter of fact, 15 16 their comments were very close to mine. They sent 17 their comments in about a week earlier than mine. And

I'm going to use their comments. But I'm real glad

19	to see our comments are very parallel. This is a
20	good cross-check.
21	So, letting you know that things are
22	we're having some good reviews on these real tough
23	reports that are going through, especially in
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1	ecological risk assessments that are dealing with the
2	ranges out here. So, we've got a broad scope,
3	landfills, ranges, other hazardous waste components
4	and everything, so it's all going on at one time.
5	But if you have any questions,
6	always feel free to call me. I'll be glad to fill in
7	any citizens. And I'm doing it all the time. So, I
8	always love hearing from y'all. And we'll try to get
9	answers to even Miki.
10	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Yeah, I would
11	Philip has been great
12	MR. PHILIP STROUD: She's asked
13	some tough questions lately and we're working on some
14	tough things for her right now. So, they're good
15	questions.
16	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: One of the
17	things that they're looking at for us is helping us

18	with the issues of underground storage tanks and
19	asbestos and lead based paint. And we've asked ADEM
20	to help us understand what by us accepting these on
21	behalf of the community, what the impact is there.
22	And they're being real helpful.
23	MR. PHILIP STROUD: I think that's
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1	it. I wish we could do it much faster. I want to
2	put the fire on the stove on this one, I really do.
3	So, any other questions?
4	MR. RON LEVY: I do want to mention
5	to the RAB members that the BRAC cleanup team, which
6	has a voting of three agencies, the Army, EPA, and the
7	State, also has a support team, which includes the
8	Corps, the contractors which provide information to
9	allow decisions to be made, the National Guard.
10	And now we've got Miki Schneider
11	from the JPA who participates with the team, in terms
12	of providing information back and forth. So, she
13	actually attends the meetings and hears what's going
14	on and provides feedback to us, as well. That's
15	something new. That's not happened before.
16	MAYOR WILLIAM KIMBROUGH: Philip,
17	when you talk about ground scar, is that a possible of

18	a trench being there?
19	MR. PHILIP STROUD: It could be a
20	trench. Something a long time Chris, and I guess
21	people agreed upon here and I've been out to see
22	some of these ground scars is it could be something
23	that's been bulldozed up. And they just took the

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1	initiative to look at them, to see if they could
2	potential burial or what are they. So, actually went
3	out and sampled them. They're real proactive.
4	MR. RON LEVY: I can give you a
5	little bit more background to it. It's when we
6	initially started looking at characterizing or trying
7	to define the installation from what needed to be
8	characterized in the environmental baseline, the
9	baseline study that was done, we looked at aerial
10	photography. And in that aerial photography, you
11	look at things and you'll see what appears to be a
12	ground scar from the air, that, you know, something's
13	been moved around.
14	So, that leads us to believe, well,
15	there might have been some activity there that we
16	should investigate. And in fact, that's what we did

17	on a lot of the ground scars.
18	When we got on the ground and
19	started looking at it, you can see, in a lot of cases,
20	all it was was a dozer had pushed up some soil from
21	either building a road or from building a fire break
22	or something along that line.
23	In other cases, we didn't know, and
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1	therefore, we sampled them. If we couldn't
2	absolutely establish what it was, we went in and we
3	sampled.
4	I guess it's back to me, now. The
5	first thing I want to do is I want to talk to you
6	briefly about M-101. And I'm going to let Suzanne
7	Murdock, from Huntsville, talk about that. But as a
8	matter of introduction, Suzanne Murdock, who is behind
9	me here to my left, is the technical engineer at
10	Huntsville.
11	Huntsville is doing the cleanup for
12	UXO on Fort McClellan, through its contractor, Foster
13	Wheeler. And there's as we've briefed before in
14	the past, there is several areas that we're looking

at. And Suzanne is going to go into depth about

16	M-101.
17	But if I can point out that map
18	directly behind Donna that shows the areas that are
19	being investigated and characterized. Charlie is the
20	green, Alpha is the red, Bravo is the blue, and I
21	think it's a
22	MS. SUZANNE MURDOCK: The magenta

16	MS. SUZANNE MURDOCK: Some of you at
17	the table, and maybe others, have got a map in front
18	of you. And it's magenta here. On your map, there's
19	a dark yellow color, which is what we're calling the
20	M-101. And there is a small portion of M-3 included
21	in that.
22	And last spring, we decided to try
23	and fast track the cleanup of this property. The

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1	decision to do that was not really based on the
2	desirability of the property for transfer, but in
3	order for us to clear up to clean the areas around
4	the eastern bypass so that when we eventually decided
5	to use that property, that we wouldn't impact the
6	construction of the bypass from our exclusion zones.
7	That was one of the reasons we decided to fast track.
8	The other reason was we have a lot
9	of existing data from the M-2 parcel that's been
10	cleaned up and from some construction support effort
11	that we've done on the bypass. So, we felt like we
12	had enough data for us to make a decision on what
13	cleanup alternative we would propose for the M-101 and

14	that small portion of the M-3 parcel. So, those were
15	the two reasons that led us to do a fast track of this
16	piece of property.
17	Tonight, I'm just kind of catching
18	you up on where we are in that process. We're just
19	about we have one last set of comments that we're
20	incorporating into the draft EE/CA, which is an
21	engineering evaluation cost analysis, which is what we
22	do to determine what type of contamination was on the
23	property and what is the best action we can take, what

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1	is the alternative we want to do to clean up that
2	property.
3	So, at this point in time, we're
4	almost finished with the draft version of the EE/CA,
5	which has been through several reviews, including
6	reviews by both the EPA and ADEM and the Fort. And
7	we're about ready for that to be published.
8	The proposed dates are on the right
9	hand side of your map here. And these are tentative
10	dates. We still like I said, we're still working
11	on incorporating the last set of comments.
12	But what we plan to do is have a

public comment period starting on about the first of

14	November. And that will be open for public comment
15	for thirty days. And it will be available for review
16	at the repository. And which is I forgot where
17	that is, Ron. Where is the
18	MR. RON LEVY: I'm sorry?
19	MS. SUZANNE MURDOCK: Where is the
20	repository?
21	DR. MARY HARRINGTON: Anniston
22	Library and JSU.
23	MS. SUZANNE MURDOCK: The JSU and

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23

1 the Anniston Library. Those will be on file there and 2 available for public comment for a period of thirty days. And then we'd like to brief the RAB at the next RAB meeting, which is on the 19th. And we'll go into detail about what we found and what alternatives we considered and what we're going to recommend as the 7 appropriate response. And then we'd like to have the 9 public meeting on or about the 5th of December. So, 10 that's where we are. I didn't really want to -- I 11 don't want to go into discussing the EE/CA, itself. We just wanted to let you know where we were in the 12

13 process. 14 MR. RON LEVY: There's some things I need to just give you an idea -- a better 15 16 understanding about. This is one of those documents where the Army's going to make a decision. And part 17 18 of that decision process involves a public component. 19 And the RAB being part of that public component, plus, 20 a public meeting whereby you get to look at the 21 alternatives that we're suggesting or the alternatives 22 that we're suggesting and the one that we are 23 proposing that we take and provide comments and

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1	feedback to us on that.
2	So, what Suzanne is trying to tell
3	you is what's coming up is that period where you
4	actually get a say-so, so to speak, in a decision
5	that's about to be made on the cleanup. So, the RAB
6	briefing, come the 19th of November, the document will
7	be available in November, you know, starting the first
8	of November, based on the fact that we've got a public
9	comment period.
10	But the RAB briefing at the 19
11	November is when we will do a full presentation to

you. But if you wish to see the document at any time

13	during that public comment period, we will provide it
14	to you. And one of the things that we might need to
15	discuss is how that's going to happen.
16	MR. GLYNN RYAN: There was a
17	motion, I believe, before the board some time ago
18	Joan, maybe you can help me out about a technical
19	review council, Craig and
20	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: That was months
21	
22	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: That was
23	myself, Pete, and I believe Dr. Cox was part of that,
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1	also.
2	MR. GLYNN RYAN: What we'd like to
3	do is provide you the technical review folks and
4	maybe that's something we need to look at the
5	document early, so you can as soon as it's available, so you can start that I mean, that's
7	probably better than trying to provide documents to
8	everyone.

MR. RON LEVY: One of the things

that y'all need to remember is that -- we'll do this,

but producing one of these documents, you know,

12	particularly one that's three foot thick, is an
13	expensive proposition. And if everybody's going to
14	read it, we'll provide it.
15	But what we understood from the RAB,
16	from previous meetings and some of you weren't in
17	the RAB during that time, you may have been voted on
18	was that you'd rather see it in terms of a
19	technical review committee, those folks who probably
20	have a little bit more background, maybe science
21	background, such as Pete and Craig and Barry, and let
22	them take a hard look at it as a committee, and then
23	report back to the RAB.

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Now, if that's still the case, that's what we would like to propose, too.

3 MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: Was there
4 anyone that's not comfortable with that concept? It
5 was probably about a -- it was probably close to a
6 year ago.

7 MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Yeah, it was.

8 MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: It was at the

9 community center in Golden Springs.

MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: So, it's

11	been awhile.
12	MR. RON LEVY: We would do this,
13	too, during the meeting on the 19th, when we do do the
14	brief, we will take comments, verbalized comments,
15	from the RAB members, at that time, and we'll also
16	take additional comments after that, if there is
17	somebody that wants to jump in and take a hard look at
18	the document. That's still, it's pretty much of
19	an open-ended process to allow input.
20	MS. DONNA FATHKE: Question:
21	Because the public meeting is after the public comment
22	period, what happens at the public meeting?
23	MS. SUZANNE MURDOCK: It's basically
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1	to brief the public and to answer their questions.
2	MS. DONNA FATHKE: But is it too
3	late for them to put comments in?
4	MR. GLYNN RYAN: I think we're
5	not sure this date's correct. And this is preliminary
6	information.
7	MS. SUZANNE MURDOCK: It is.
8	MR. GLYNN RYAN: That's part of the
9	problem with this
10	MR. RON LEVY: These dates were

11	proposed, and I
12	MS. SUZANNE MURDOCK: And typically,
13	the public meeting is right toward the end of the
14	comment period. We set that date because we've got a
15	BCT, and the and EPA ADEM will be here that night.
16	That's kind of how we picked that night.
17	It's typically you know, we can
18	move it up probably and make it during the public
19	it's typically at the end of the public comment
20	period, while it's still open, but toward the end to
21	give people a chance to read it and come and ask
22	questions.
23	MR. RON LEVY: And at that time, we
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1	will take any additional comments at the public
2	meeting, as well. We're bound to do that, as well.
3	But we've got an open dates of thirty days in November
4	for a public comment period.
5	MS. DONNA FATHKE: It just seems to
6	me, if we were to have a public meeting earlier in the
7	comment period, it would give the public a chance to

discuss it and air some things. I mean, you have it

afterwards and people have got to think very quickly

10	on their feet at the meeting to come up with any								
11	comments or the door is shut on them.								
12	MR. RON LEVY: I think what Suzanne								
13	was trying to explain was the document's there, it's								
14	available for the public, there is a notification that								
15	goes out. They go to see the document or they ask								
16	for the document and they ask for the information up								
17	front, and then they come to the meeting, at that								
18	point, with additional questions.								
19	We can change the meeting dates,								
20	certainly. They're only proposed dates.								
21	MS. DONNA FATHKE: Just seems to me								
22	that there could be room for discussion that would be								
23	clipped off with that meeting being outside the public								
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1	comment date or period.								
2	MR. RON LEVY: We'll relook the								
3	date, Donna.								

MR. RON LEVY: We'll relook the

date, Donna.

MS. DONNA FATHKE: Okay.

MR. RON LEVY: And again, the

purpose here was to let you know this was coming, the

public comment period. And from the RAB's

standpoint, this essentially is a public meeting, too,

9	in itself, and it's advertised. But we're going to
10	hold a separate public meeting, as well.
11	MAYOR WILLIAM KIMBROUGH: This is
12	just on the section that will be the connections to
13	Highway 21, it's not the rest of tract three. Tract
14	one has been turned over, right?
15	MR. RON LEVY: Right.
16	MAYOR WILLIAM KIMBROUGH: So, tract
17	three. But we're just getting the entrance? Is that
18	what we're looking at now? Which is the yellow and
19	the green, as far as coming
20	MR. RON LEVY: This is tract three.
21	This is tract two.
22	MAYOR WILLIAM KIMBROUGH: Right.
23	MR. RON LEVY: There has already

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1	been an EE/CA done and there was a public comment
2	period on this piece, both of these pieces here.
3	That's already been done. That's why we're into the
4	clearance phase on that. That's happened some time
5	ago.
6	So, what we're looking at and you
7	can see here, red, is the property surrounding that.
8	It's a separate and different investigation and

9	clearance. But because it's a separate and different
10	investigation and clearance, it's opened up another
11	process
12	MAYOR WILLIAM KIMBROUGH: That's
13	your dark yellow on this map, then?
14	MR. RON LEVY: Yeah, it's yellow.
15	Now, you ought to know, as well, that this area, when
16	the EE/CA comes up, will also involve a public piece
17	and a separate process, same thing with the Bravo and
18	the same thing with the Charlie, all three of those
19	become open to the public for review and comment on.
20	And they're still to be done.
21	MS. SUZANNE MURDOCK: I think where
22	he was going maybe is the reason we just took that one
23	little piece is because we had so much data. That

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1	big blue area which surrounds most of tract three, we
2	don't have we hadn't done any sampling. We didn't
3	have a lot of data. We didn't know what was there,
4	so, we didn't try to fast track and hurry up and do
5	that, that area in the blue that surrounds the rest of
6	the bypass. We just picked that one piece because we
7	had all of the information we needed to be able to do

8	that and do it quickly.
9	MR. JERRY HOPPER: Ron, what is
10	your projected land usage for this M-101 and this
11	particular area we're talking about, since it's
12	adjacent to the bypass right-of-way, is it going to be
13	commercial industrial or residential or a combination
14	of both or
15	MR. RON LEVY: We follow it's
16	going to be a combination of both. We follow the
17	JPA's projected use plan. I believe it's
18	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: That area is
19	commercial.
20	Can I ask: Once the thirty-day
21	comment period is over, what is your next step?
22	Where does this go? You finished the document, then

what happens?

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1	MR. RON LEVY: We take whatever
2	comments come out of the public comment period, we
3	consider in the document. And a final decision gets
4	made and it gets made through what's known as an
5	action memorandum. You've all heard that term
6	before. We did that for the eastern bypass. The
7	action memorandum is the actual decision of what we're

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9	They'll be some alternatives
10	considered. The final action will be chosen with the
11	consideration of input from the public, as well as
12	regulatory comments. And then the action memorandum
13	is made and the decision gets signed.
14	Then there's an explosive safety
15	submission. You've heard us talk about that for the
16	eastern bypass that we have to do. Since it's
17	ordnance involved, we've got to get another approval
18	on the part of Department of Defense Explosive Safety
19	Board. So, we work a process of defining how and
20	help me out here, Suzanne, exactly what the explosive
21	safety submission, it says what we can and cannot do
22	from a safety standpoint on the actual clearance. And
23	we get buy-in from the our big regulatory agency,

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1	being	the	Department	of	Defense	Explosive	Safety

2 Board.

3 Once we get that approved, then

4 we're able to start in on the actual clearance and

5 removal.

6 MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: How long do

7	you think it would be before just I'm not I'm
8	just trying to understand. Is this a three months
9	from or six months from now, from once this thirty-day
10	comment period is over, that you would actually be on
11	the ground doing the removal?
12	MS. SUZANNE MURDOCK: It's probably
13	more like six months, by the time we have to go
14	through the action memorandum and then go through the
15	work plans and the ESS. And the approval process on
16	the explosive safety submission is fairly it goes
17	through at least two agencies before it goes to the
18	Explosive Safety Board, prior to their approval. So,
19	it's a
20	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: My question
21	MS. SUZANNE MURDOCK: But probably
22	six I would in the six month time frame before
23	we're on the ground and working.

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1	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: My reasons for
2	asking these: In March of next year, there is an
3	archery tournament planned right next to this location
4	for two thousand people, fifteen hundred to two
5	thousand people. Okay. We need to know that.

6	I think the youth services people
7	should be brought in on this, just as soon as
8	possible, so they're aware that this is going to be
9	going on. I don't know if they would have to move
10	out of their building when you were doing clearance,
11	but I'm sure that would take them a long time to make
12	plans if they had to move out of that building to move
13	their students to.
14	And I would also think it would be
15	good if there was clearance going on, because it is so
16	close to Sacred Heart, maybe it could be done during
17	the summer when school was not in session.
18	MS. SUZANNE MURDOCK: The exclusion
19	zone for that area, as we see it now, is going to be
20	pretty small, two hundred feet, two hundred feet, so I
21	don't think the school

12	the things that we're working with the Army right now
13	trying to understand is, would it cut out some of the
14	layers. And, yes, DDSB is an issue. It's one that
15	we've discussed at the Pentagon is, you know, how can
16	we incorporate them but still maybe cut out a few
17	layers. And we are still looking at that.
18	I wouldn't say no it wouldn't
19	totally cut them out, but it won't cut out I think
20	it would cut out some time, yes.
21	MR. GLYNN RYAN: It might cut out
22	some time, it wouldn't cut out
23	MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Yes.

6	clicked with me that you already had data in the area.
7	I thought I heard her say that they didn't have any
8	data, so I was confused.
9	MS. SUZANNE MURDOCK: We didn't have
10	to collect it.
11	MR. RON LEVY: The pink, which is
12	M-2, we have got data on. And the light yellow, which
13	is the bypass right-of-way and the Summerall
14	extension, we've got data on all that. And based on
15	its proximity, we can make a determination as to what
16	we believe is in there. And plus, we've got other
17	historical information on how the area was used.
18	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: And that's
19	all stuff you'll talk to us about next month?
20	MR. RON LEVY: Yeah, when we do the
21	briefing on the 19th and we hope to be able to get
22	Doyle out in front of you so you understand where we

23 came from and where we're going with our alternatives

1	and recommendation. Any other questions?
2	Okay, one of the things that we
3	needed to do and if you'll bear with me is we

needed to elect another vice-chair. And for those of
you who are not familiar, there is a set of bylaws for
the Restoration Advisory Board. Several years ago
well, actually, when the board was first formed, the
bylaws were written. And then about a year or so
ago, they were amended to include some of the voting
issues.
But just to fill folks in, there's
two positions, there's the community chairperson and
there is the Department of Defense chairperson. So,
there is a co-chair. Right now Craig Branchfield
represents the co-chair. He ascended to the position
by virtue of having been elected as the vice-chair.
And Mr. Ryan, Glynn Ryan, is the co-chair from the
Army's side or from the Department of Defense side.
One of the things that we need to do
tonight is elect a new vice-chair, since Barry, who
served his full year, based on the bylaws, now steps
down. And again, a new vice-chair gets picked up.
Each term for the vice and the

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1	co-chair	is a	total	of	they	both	serve	a year	and
2	then you	ascen	d to	the	chair.	For	those	of you	who

3	don't have a copy of the bylaws, we'll be glad to get
4	you a copy. But I think each of you should have
5	gotten those when you first came into the RAB. Joan,
6	am I right, that you did provide them?
7	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Yes.
8	MR. RON LEVY: So, if you're not
9	sure what we're doing, I would recommend that you go
10	back. And I'm going to let Joan handle the
11	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Yeah. And if
12	you don't have a copy of those bylaws in your binders,
13	just let us know and we'll be sure you get another
14	one. As new members come on, we try to put that
15	binder together for you.
16	As Ron mentioned, we just need to
17	vote for a new vice co-chair, community co-chair.
18	What we need for you to do is nominate within the
19	group and then vote. And we're trying to make it as
20	simple as possible. I have prepared sheets of paper
21	that have each would you mind passing these down
22	that have everybody's name on it. Because in years
23	past, this has gotten into chads and hanging things

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and all kinds of stuff, and we didn't know it was

2 called that then, but -- so, we're trying to do some

- out that the BCT, myself, Philip, and Doyle, are not
- 18 voting members.
- 19 MR. GLYNN RYAN: And I'm not a

- 21 MS. JOAN McKINNEY: But everyone
- 22 else. Those that are listed on here are voting
- 23 members. And, of course, we do have a few folks

- 9 right, we have Reverend Clendenin, Don Cunningham, Mr.
- 10 Elser, Donna --
- MS. DONNA FATHKE: No, not me.
- 12 MS. JOAN McKINNEY: I didn't hear
- 13 right. Mr. Franklin, Mr. Freeman, Mary Harrington,
- 14 Jerry, and Gary are amenable to being nominated. It
- 15 won't take effect until next October. And then if
- 16 Craig is out --
- 17 MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: Unless I
- don't show up for the next eleven months.
- MS. JOAN McKINNEY: And it really
- only is eleven meetings. The floor is open for
- 21 nominations.
- 22 MR. JERRY ELSER: I'd like to

1 MS JOAN McKINNEY: Jerry, (
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- 2 If the nominee accepts, then I recommend you circle it
- 3 so you'll know who you're voting for. Is that

- 6 thinking. Yeah, I will accept. At the same time,

- 9 MS. JOAN McKINNEY: We have nothing
- 10 that says we can't.
- 11 MR. SCOTT BECKETT: I'd like to
- 12 nominate Mary Harrington, if she accepts.
- 13 MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: She's frowning
- 14 at you.
- MR. RON LEVY: Mary, you've been on
- 16 this board a long time.
- MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Mary, it's
- about time you were in charge of this board, you know,
- 19 you've been a part of it since the beginning.
- MS. MIKI SCHNEIDER: Put a woman in
- 21 charge.
- MS. JOAN McKINNEY: We'll have an
- hour meeting, I know Mary. We can circle Mary?

1	DR. MARY HARRINGTON: I guess.
2	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Thank you.
3	MR. CURTIS FRANKLIN: I move the
4	nominations be closed. Can we do that?
5	MR. JAMES BUFORD: So moved.
6	MR. JERRY HOPPER: Second.
7	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: Then I have
8	circled Pete Conroy, Mary Harrington, and Jerry
9	Hopper? Then I just think that probably let's
10	hope that this works this way, the best one. If you
11	would just go ahead and vote for one of those three.
12	And then just pass them back to the back. Diane will
13	go ahead and count them, if you'll pass them that way.
14	The front, the front, the other back. And if there
15	is a tie, we'll have to come back in again.
16	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: While Joan
17	is out there counting the votes, we'll proceed on down
18	the agenda. Was there any other new business, Ron,
19	that we had?
20	MR. RON LEVY: (Shakes head.)
21	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: We completed
22	the agency reports. Is there anything else?
23	MR. PHILIP STROUD: There is one

1	more thing and you brought it up, Craig, and I really,
2	I put a lot of effort into this M-101 area. I want
3	y'all to do the same. And I highly recommend this
4	technical review from you and Cox and the rest of them
5	to really look hard at that one and come up with some
6	good comments. I totally expect it.
7	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: You guys are
8	going to send this piece to us or something, Ron?
9	MR. RON LEVY: Fed Ex.
10	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: All right.
11	MR. JERRY HOPPER: No white powder
12	on it, either.
13	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: I was going
14	to say, don't make it suspicious looking. Are we
15	ready to move on to the action summary sheet?
16	MR. RON LEVY: Yes. As I do every
17	meeting, for those members of the audience who are not
18	aware, we provide to the RAB members an action summary
19	sheet. It's essentially a summary of what went on
20	during the previous month, from the last RAB meeting,
21	Or an update of cleanup actions that are going on in
22	the installation.

The first item was the status of

- 2 report. There is no additional data to report, as of
- 3 the September meeting, nor was there any additional
- 4 information to report based on well installation. As
- 5 soon as we do have additional information, it will go
- 6 into the action summary sheet.
- 7 As I mentioned to you last month,
- 8 the field work in Alpha required some additional -- in
- 9 the Alpha EE/CA area, required some additional field
- 10 work. That field work has now been completed, even
- 11 though it says it was ongoing here. It says it was
- 12 supposed to be completed by October. It's now been
- done and the data analysis is ongoing, at this moment.
- So, hopefully we'll be able to see a report the
- 15 beginning of the next calendar year.
- In the Bravo area, that field work
- is still ongoing. I don't know that there is
- 18 anything specific I can tell you, other than the fact
- 19 we did try to go after some areas in the Bravo area
- 20 earlier that we were sampling for that was impacting
- 21 on some work that Auburn needed to do, which was the
- 22 construction of facility. So, we believe we've
- gotten through that to the point where it's not going

1	to	impact	on	the	construction.
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- We're still working through the
- 3 Charlie area EE/CA work plan. We're still getting
- 4 comments in from the regulatory agencies and we hope
- 5 to be able to conclude those comments so that we can
- 6 get to the field and start the actual work that will
- 7 build this EE/CA.
- 8 Also noted that presently there is
- 9 ninety-five contractors that are supporting the OE
- 10 removal effort on site. As of this date, is that
- 11 still accurate Foster Wheeler?
- MR. STEVE MILLER: Yes.
- 13 MR. RON LEVY: And I believe there
- is about forty some odd individuals associated with IT
- 15 Corporation and the actions that are going on out
- 16 there, contractors that are doing investigative work
- on the post, in and around the post.
- 18 We reported previous that CWM field
- 19 work had been done. That there was, for the most
- 20 part, no agent discovered, nor agent-related items.
- 21 We're still working the report. Hopefully, we'll
- have that done, also, this month in October.
- They'll be a comment period, as well

1	and a press release. But because there really wasn't
2	anything found, it should be insignificant. There is
3	no alternatives that we can define, other than no
4	action even to be done.
5	Eastern bypass, as we said before,
6	the action memorandum was signed back in August.
7	There was an explosive safety submissions put in.
8	That has now gotten through the U. S. Army, what we
9	call U.S.A.T.C., U. S. Army Technical Center for
10	Explosive Safety, and has been sent to the Department
11	of Defense Explosive Safety Board, that was effective,
12	I believe, 1 October, that had ended up going
13	MS. SUZANNE MURDOCK: 3 October
14	MR. PAUL JAMES: 3 October.
15	MR. RON LEVY: 3 October. Stand
16	corrected. 3 October, that ended up going to the
17	DDSB, who now has it in their hands to either approve
18	or comment back to us on.
19	MAYOR KIMBROUGH: Now, is that tract
20	three?
21	MR. RON LEVY: That is tract three
22	MS. SUZANNE MURDOCK: Yes.

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MR. RON LEVY: And as we said

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1	before, ALDOT has placed a fence around the property
2	associated with tract one. That's all that was
3	reported in the action summary. I'll take any other
4	questions, though, at this time, if there's
5	information being sought from the RAB members.
6	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: Any
7	questions for Ron? Joan, do we have a final talley?
8	MS. JOAN McKINNEY: We have a new
9	vice-chair, Dr. Mary Harrington.
10	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD:
11	Congratulations. It's an extremely stressful job.
12	MR. BOB DAFFRON: And you're not
13	going to be here next month?
14	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: That's
15	right.
16	MR. RON LEVY: That is another duty
17	of yours, you get to fill in when he's not here.
18	DR. MARY HARRINGTON: Then I don't
19	want him to miss much.
20	MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: She'll stop
21	giving me grief when I fail to follow the proper

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Is there any other business that any

protocol. Congratulations.

22

1	members of the RAB would like to put on the table for
2	discussion before we move on to audience comments?
3	Real briefly, just as a matter for the record, like to
4	state that Mr. Buford and Mr. Hood came in after we
5	took the roll so we make sure we get them in the
6	minutes.
7	And now we'll turn it over to any
8	comments or questions any members of the audience
9	might have.
10	MR. WHITENER: I've just got one,
11	and I'm quite sure you've heard it asked before. But
12	why was it left up to the City of Anniston to clean up
13	Fort McClellan instead of the government cleaning up
14	Fort McClellan?
15	MR. GLYNN RYAN: What part of the
16	MR. WHITENER: Well, I mean, why
17	wasn't the government held responsible for cleaning up
18	Fort McClellan?
19	MR. GLYNN RYAN: They are.
20	MS. MARY HARRINGTON: They are.
21	MR. GLYNN RYAN: The Army is.
22	MR. WHITENER: The Army is?
23	MR. GLYNN RYAN: Yes. The city is

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1 not cleaning up anything. 2 MR. WHITENER: Oh, I was under the 3 impression that the city was cleaning it up. MR. GLYNN RYAN: No, sir. 5 MR. WHITENER: Oh, okay. Thank you. MR. CRAIG BRANCHFIELD: Sir? 7 MR. RAY CRUMP: For future 8 development and this might be Miki's, I don't --MR. RON LEVY: Can you state your 9 name when you do this? 10 11 MR. RAY CRUMP: Ray Crump, 12 C-R-U-M-P, as in Powell. Is there any plans for high 13 speed computer companies that might be locating here, is there any plans for high speed -- for them to have 14 15 excess -- for it to already be here when we try to recruit this type business to move in? 16 17 MR. GLYNN RYAN: That's really a 18 JPA question. We are cleaning up environmental. We 19 have nothing to do with redevelopment. 20 MAYOR WILLIAM KIMBROUGH: I was 21 just in a meeting on that and they have some areas that are designated for that. But they're just in 22

the first planning stage. We had a redevelopment

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1	plan, but now they're developing a new redevelopment
2	plan, so, they're in the beginning stages or
3	beginning of that. And so that's the JPA.
4	MR. CRUMP: JPA.
5	MAYOR WILLIAM KIMBROUGH: They've
6	hired some consultants that are doing that.
