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1 MR. FRANKLIN: We'll call the meeting
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- 2 to order. We'll have the roll call.
- 3 (Roll call was taken and Mr. Harvey, Ms. Bragg,
- 4 Mr. Clendenin, Mr. Elser, Ms. Little, Mr. Grant, Mr.
- 5 Kimbrough was present.)
- 6 MR. FRANKLIN: At this time if our
- 7 guests would introduce themselves starting around the
- 8 wall.
- 9 WANDA CHAMPION: Wanda Champion.
- 10 LISA HOLSTEIN: Lisa Holstein, Fort
- 11 McClellan Transition Force.
- 12 BRENDA CUNNINGHAM: Brenda Cunningham,
- 13 Fort McClellan Transition Force.
- 14 KAREN PENSON: Karen Penson, Fort
- 15 McClellan Transition Force.
- 16 PAUL JAMES: Paul James, Army National
- 17 Guard Training Center, Fort McClellan.
- DAN COPELAND: Dan Copeland, Corps of
- 19 Engineers.
- 20 ART HOLCOMB: Art Holcomb.
- 21 STEVE MILLER: Steve Miller
- 22 RON GRANT: TAPP contractor.
- MR. FRANKLIN: Thank you, if all of you

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1 would take a moment to glance at the approval for the
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- 2 approval of the minutes of the April meeting. Does
- 3 anyone have a question or comment on that?
- 4 MR. CLENDENIN: Can we approve minutes?
- 5 Do we have a quorum?
- 6 MS. CUNNINGHAM: Cannot, not without a
- 7 quorum.
- 8 MR. FRANKLIN: I'm sorry.
- 9 MR. HARVEY: But you can look at them
- 10 and see if you want anything added.
- 11 MS. CUNNINGHAM: I need to state for the
- record that the following people are excused: Dr.
- 13 Harrington, Robert Jackson, Fred May, and David
- 14 Steffy. So there are four that are excused.
- MR. FRANKLIN: If there's no comment on
- 16 those minutes, we will proceed with the old business.
- 17 We still need one RAB member. We are still one short.
- 18 I think all of you have access to the application
- 19 forms, if you have anyone in mind, please get those
- forms to them so that they can fill them out and so we
- 21 can possibly get a new member to fill that gap.
- We go on now to the program, Mr. Holcomb who is
- 23 to have the program on Bains Gap Road. And for the

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record, Mr. Schmitter just came in, is present.
                     MR. HOLCOMB: I want to tell you a
 2.
 3
        little brief summary of the Bains Gap Road removal
 4
        project. A portion of the Bains Gap removal project
 5
        was completed during the fish and wildlife roads,
        firebreaks and high use area. During that project we
 6
        cleared twenty feet on either side of the centerline
        in a high use area along Bains Gap. During that
 8
 9
        project we did not investigate or remove the anomalies
10
        under the pavement.
              In September the corps sent out an RFP to the
11
        UXO contractors. We were selected for that, the award
12
        was made in September. And we developed a work plan
13
14
        and it was approved by ADEM in January. Under the new
        task order the scope included doing a hundred feet on
15
        either side of the road with the exception of the one
16
17
        high-use area along Bains Gap Road and also included
        removal of the anomalies under the road.
18
19
               Okay, the project followed the normal MEC
20
        project with surveying the boundaries and the grids,
21
        the surface sweep, brush clearing, geophysical
22
        mapping, intrusive investigation, and one task that's
23
        not on here that's pretty chief to this is the
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geophysical sweep out which we did using the existing

```
GPO plot in the fish and wildlife area, and that was
 2.
 3
        accepted by ADEM also. The boundary and survey and
 4
        grids were done by Skipper Engineering, a local small
 5
        business here. The surface sweep was performed with
        visual assist, instrument assist, and we used the
 6
        Schondstedt for that. The brush removal was performed
        by Envirogrind and included both manual and mechanical
 8
 9
        clearing, and the brush clearing was completed to
10
        allow good geophysical mapping.
               The geophysical mapping used the EM-61, which
11
        is the standard instrument here for GPO. We used two
12
        location methods, a robotic total station, and a
13
14
        constellation laser positioning system. 95% of the
        area was geophysically mapped. The other 5% it was
15
16
        impossible to map due to slope or terrain. And the
17
        areas that couldn't be mapped were cleared by Mag &
        Dig in accordance with our approved work plan.
18
                The reacquire, consistent with the findings
19
20
        of the GPO, we used the same positioning instruments
21
        for that, the robotic total station and the
22
        constellation. Intrusive operations consisted of both
        manual and equipment assisted. We used the Vallon
23
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hand-held detectors to make sure all the holes were

cleared. And in the geophysical areas that were not

geophysically surveyed, we also used the Vallon. We
```

found one MEC item in the project, it was a 75mm Shrap

5 round.

The Mag & Dig was only used in areas that we couldn't map, and you can see the type of terrain that we could not map. For the intrusive operations, we used the mini-excavator in the areas along the road that were too hard to dig manually. And then the roadbed, we used a full-sized backhoe. Following the intrusive operations, we backfilled the roads following an ALDOT standard, and it was packed and tested by EGC, which is a firm out of Gadsden that does the compaction testing.

One thing we did during the project is when we completed the intrusive, we have to put the dirt back in and pack it down so the fish and wildlife could use the road. They didn't like the idea of driving down the road with big four-foot holes in the ground.

The QC was performed following a MILSTD 1916 approach. The area was divided into thirteen lots of eight grids per lot. And then each lot we remapped

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thirty-two lanes and had the geophysicist process the
 2.
        data and then we excavated all the anomalies. None of
 3
        them met the failure criteria. And we did process QC
        throughout the project, where the QC observed the work
 5
        made sure it was in accordance with the work plan.
              The government QA, the government did an
 7
        aggressive seeding project where they went out and
        planted forty-four items. One of the items was
 8
 9
        smaller than the objective item, one of the items was
10
        not ferrous, although none of us knew that for two
        days, while we tried to figure out why we didn't pick
11
        it. But we found all forty-four of the items.
12
        one that was non-ferrous was found in the QC where the
13
14
        data specialists selects ten percent of the items the
        geophysicist does not pick and we dig those, and one
15
        of those was the non-ferrous item. Just happened to
16
17
        be. That almost drove our geophysicists crazy trying
        to figure out why they didn't pick it.
18
              In addition to our QC checking all holes, the
19
20
        Corps of Engineer on-site rep checked each of the
21
        holes to make sure it was clear before we went on.
22
        And then the geophysicist for the Corps also took a
```

percentage of the geophysical data and analyzed it.

                          MR. CLENDENIN: When you say seeds,
        this was not like planting grass seeds?
 2.
                     MR. HOLCOMB: They took inert items and
 3
 4
        planted them throughout, we didn't know where they
 5
        were.
                     MR. CLENDENIN: Like trying to trick you
        to see if you find them all?
                     MR. HOLCOMB: Better to make sure that
 8
 9
        our equipment was working and that we selected the
        items that we should have. And in summary, we
10
        completed the work in accordance with the work plan.
11

        All forty-four seed items were located. One MEK was
13
        removed and disposed. We had over two tons of
       munitions debris, and over two tons of non-munitions
14
        debris at the conclusion. Any questions?
15

                     MR. KIMBROUGH: How much property was
17
        that?
18
                     MR. HOLCOMB: Nineteen acres, plus or
        minus.
19

                     MR. CLENDENIN: Was most of the MD stuff
21
        lead?
22
                     MR. HOLCOMB: No, no, it was bits and
23
        pieces. We had one item that was ADB, we gave to Bob
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for a seed item, and the rest of it was just scrap,
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- 2 expended. Any other questions? All right.
- 3 MR. FRANKLIN: Thank you. For the
- 4 record, also, note that Mr. Burgett and Mr. Miller are
- 5 present.
- 6 Going on to new business, agency reports, ADEM.
- 7 MS. LITTLE: I guess enclosed in
- 8 anybody's information we've listed all the documents
- 9 that we've received since the last RAB meeting and the
- 10 documents that we've completed review on and obviously
- 11 the meetings that we've attended. Right now we have
- four people almost full-time on this project. So
- we're hoping to get things done a little faster.
- 14 That's all.
- MR. FRANKLIN: Any questions? Okay, we
- don't have a representative of EPA, do we? EPA is not
- 17 here. JPA is also not here. The Army Action Summary
- 18 Sheet?
- 19 MR. HARVEY: Okay, and that's in your
- 20 packet there, and I'm not going to read the whole
- thing for you. Most of it stays the same. I'm just
- going to touch on a couple of the main items that have
- 23 happened this quarter. Number one, we received ADEM

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1 concurrence on the MEC removal for Eastern Bypass.
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- 2 266 acres is now there's a FOST been prepared on it.
- 3 It's up for review, and as soon as it comes back down
- 4 here, it will be staffed with ADEM and with downtown
- 5 with JPA with all the players, so we hope to transfer
- 6 that property in six to nine months. That will be the
- 7 last of the Eastern Bypass with the exception of ten
- 8 acres that are still encumbered in the Bravo area in
- 9 the Eastern Bypass. We're about done that one.
- The next part will be going to a FOST we
- 11 thought was going to be in August, now it looks like
- 12 September, we started the former water tank sites that
- 13 Jim didn't want anymore. Twenty-two point nine acres,
- 14 we've received concurrence from ADEM on a MEC removal,
- and we think we'll kick the FOST out the door in
- mid-September going up to DEA for review.
- Now, to explain this, DEA is not going to
- 18 approve it. MEC, Munition Explosive Concern, UXO for
- 19 you old timers, when we do a UXO clearance it has to
- go DEA for review before we start the process, other
- 21 FOST just go straight out and then up. This goes up,
- 22 back down and then up again for approval. So we hope
- 23 to get that out, and that would take care of all the

```
1 transfers with JPA, that twenty-two point nine with
```

- 2 the exception of the highway. When you get the
- 3 Landfill Three done, and that's nine or ten acres out
- 4 there underneath that and that transfer is scheduled
- 5 for `08 right now. And then we have ten acres to go
- 6 to ALDOT that's still in the Bravo area. As soon as
- 7 we get the Bravo area clean, and that part becomes
- NFA, then we'll go straight to a FOST and transfer
- 9 that.
- 10 But we're about done transferring land here at
- 11 Fort McClellan, all forty-five thousand acres. Any
- 12 questions?
- MR. FRANKLIN: Okay, the TAPP report,
- Mr. Grant. Do you have one?
- MR. GRANT: No, not really. I haven't
- had any documents to sign for review, therefore, I
- 17 haven't reviewed any.
- 18 MR. HARVEY: If I can interject here, I
- 19 wanted to wait until he got done, I was going to
- 20 mention the TAPP. The TAPP contract, and we talked
- 21 about it last time, about getting work for Ron. The
- 22 TAPP contract has expired or will expire at the end of
- 23 August. Everybody thought we could continue. When

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you read it, you can't, it was for two years. So if
 1
 2.
        we want another TAPP contract, I'm not sure that the
 3
        new players know what the TAPP contract is. Ron is
 4
        here under contract, in fact, he's got to attend a
 5
        meeting and he's got to put in a bill for doing
        nothing because the contract is written that way. And
 6
        he's here for any documents or anything about
        environment of Fort McClellan that you want taken and
 8
 9
        put in plain English. That's what Ron is here for.
10
        But you've got to say you want something and we'll
        task him to do it and he'll do a presentation for you
11
        and do it. So the question before the board right
12
        now, and I realize we need to wait for more people,
13
14
        but between now and the next meeting, preferably
15
        sooner rather than later is send Brenda a note, do you
        want a TAPP contract? Do you want someone standing by
16
17
        that will interpret things for you? Okay. If you do,
        we'll proceed to issue, we'll have to offer a new
18
19
        contract, issue a contract. And then we're going to
20
        have to rewrite the contract. The present one made
21
        Ron report every month and charge the government, he
22
        was right to do so, because we had him do a report
23
        every month whether he did anything or not, which is
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1 kind of ludicrous.
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- 2 MR. GRANT: And typically I just charge
- 3 half an hour for that which is fifty dollars.
- 4 MR. HARVEY: So, we've got to change
- 5 that part of the contract and get it squared away. So
- if you want it, fire off an e-mail, call Brenda, do
- 7 something just say "Hey we want it." And then we'll
- 8 start the process and then we'll come back to you with
- 9 a concept, okay, here's how we think we ought to do
- 10 it, we'll take your input and put it up there and you
- get to pick what kind of contract you want.
- 12 MR. FRANKLIN: Okay, thank you. TOSC
- 13 report.
- MR. SCHMITTER: As many of you may know,
- we're contracted through EPA to provide assistance
- 16 throughout region four and six. Our contract expires
- in September, and EPA chose to go a different route,
- in terms of how they are going to do that. It used to
- 19 be University based, EPA is going to let that out to a
- 20 private contractor basically, small businesses. So
- our efforts here, basically at the end of September
- 22 will be done. So, I mean, sounds like we've done
- limited work over the last two years, involving this.

And between what Ron does and what we do there was a

```
bit of overlap there. So, I'm just here to let you
 2.
 3
        know that we appreciate the opportunity to work with
             Wish we could have done more for you. Georgia
 5
        Tech will still be around obviously. If there are any
        things that we can do for you in the future, just
 6
 7
        call, same type of program set up, it won't be EPA
        funded to deal with this type thing anymore.
 8
 9
                        MR. FRANKLIN: The upcoming programs
10
        JPA and JSU was to provide a briefing on the Snake
11
        Effigy. Is there anything on that at all?
                          MR. CLENDENIN: There have been
12
        several people trying to get a meeting with R.D.
13
14
        Downing, and I talked with Pete, and JSU is planning
        to map it after the leaves fall this fall and winter.
15
        That's really the next step to map the site. And
16
17
        that's really where it is. An awful lot of people are
        interested in it and several people are interested in
18
19
        it from different directions, and what I'm trying to
20
        attempt to do is get everybody on the same page. But
21
        the next step is waiting on the leaves to fall again
        so we can get up there and the snakes to go home and
22
23
        leave us alone up there.

MR. FRANKLIN: You don't have any
 2.
       ballpark time?
 3
                          MR. CLENDENIN: Again, it will be
        after the leaves fall, after probably the first frost,
 5
        so we're really talking at least Christmas is my
        guess. JPA has already funded the money for JSU to do
 6
 7
        the study. It's really when we can get there safely.
                          MR. FRANKLIN: Okay. Thank you. Do
 8
 9
        we have any audience comments?
10
                          MR.: I have a question for Brandi.
        What's the abbreviations on your report? What's NRN?

                          MS. LITTLE: NRN is usually a "no
        response necessary." Okay, F is "finished," and IR is
13
        "in review." But I think that one may have been
14
        finished it just hasn't gone up yet.

                          MR. FRANKLIN: Any other comments
16
17
        from the audience?
                          MR. KIMBROUGH: Curtis, if I may, we
18
19
       met, the program management team met and to update you
        from a JPA standpoint on what's going on, Bains Gap
20
21
        they are looking -- well, first they have had to
22
        transfer some funds because part of the area that's to
23
       be cleared is in the Bravo area on Bains Gap. So
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```
they've gotten approval on that, and of course they
 1
        have to go through the process, and they are looking
 2.
 3
        -- today they gave us the date of December for them to
        complete that work, by the time they get everything
 5
        through and everything. They are in the final stages
 6
        of the design for Landfill Three. And so the cap,
        they are at that point and they are hoping to do the
        cap and also the treatment remediation as far as the
 8
 9
        groundwater goes. They are hoping to get that done
10
        pretty soon. The problem they had, and Gary might
        know better than I do, I don't understand all of this,
11
12
        but for about four months there was no money flow. It
        seems like the Pentagon had transferred the
13
14
        responsibility for the BRAC to Oklahoma or somewhere
        and they were saying well, we didn't have the
15
        authority. And so they've got a pretty good draw as
16
17
        of Friday. But they had a lot of outstanding bills,
        but that's cleared up.
18
                          MR. HARVEY: I'm not sure, but I'm
19
        quessing from what you said, the ESQA the
20
21
        environmental services quality agreement the Army has
22
        with JPA doing the environmental cleanup was being
23
        managed out of DCCW, defense contracting command
```

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23

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Washington. Now, everybody thought JPA got
        forty-eight million dollars back in `03 and it didn't.
 2.
 3
        That's a nice check there. That money was deposited
        up in defense contract command. It had to be
 5
        deposited before you can make the deal. Contracting
 6
        officers, on-site contractors. So then JPA drew on
        that every ninety days or so, you report what you
        spent the last ninety days and make your draws for the
 8
 9
        next. It's usually a quarter out, so you don't have
10
        down time. Well, that function has changed from
        Washington to Oklahoma City, yeah, one of the engineer
11
12
        districts out there is handling it now. The money was
        transferred out there.
13
14
                          MR. KIMBROUGH: They said they
        didn't have the authority. My understanding is when
15
        they transferred, they didn't think about the on-going
16
17
        projects, they were preparing for the new BRAC
        projects, so it was in there. The other thing, they
18
        hope to have the final negotiations on the Bravo area,
19
20
        they hope to have that in the next two or three
21
        months. They've got some final meetings in the next
22
        week or two. They are supposed to. And so, a big
```

part of the money and the cleanup is really going to

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1 start taking off now because of the new requirements
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- 2 as far as time line and everything.
- 3 MR. CLENDENIN: There's some
- 4 clearing going on already right now at Landfill Three.
- What's happening there?
- 6 MR. HARVEY: The Alpha area, you are
- 7 familiar with the Alpha area with all the briefings,
- 8 ECC is the name of the company that's in there they
- 9 are doing the clearance on Alpha.
- 10 MR. KIMBROUGH: And they are doing
- 11 some work on Bains Gap too.
- 12 MR. CLENDENIN: This looks like it's
- on Landfill Three right there across from the church
- 14 right there on 21. There is a little clearing area,
- and I was wondering what that meant if they were about
- 16 to start.
- 17 MR. HARVEY: I can't tell you about
- 18 that particular project. No, I think they are
- 19 starting at Bains Gap and moving north to get the
- 20 roads done first and then going that way.
- 21 MR. KIMBROUGH: As far as they
- 22 haven't done the final design for approval for the
- 23 cap.

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1 MR. HARVEY: I mean, somebody could
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- 2 have been clearing for a well or anything.
- 3 MR. KIMBROUGH: As far as the final
- 4 remediation, but, I wish I had my notes in here with
- 5 me because I can't remember from one hour to the next.
- 6 MR. CLENDENIN: This is visible, I
- 7 can see it from 21, you can see where they cleared
- 8 some timber back.
- 9 MR. KIMBROUGH: They were giving us,
- 10 I believe, a September date on Landfill Three to
- 11 start, does that sound right?
- MR. HARVEY: That sounds right. I
- don't think they've started now. I'll drive by on the
- 14 way home and I'll look and see if I can figure it out.
- MR. CLENDENIN: It's past the
- 16 church, the little Pentecostal church.
- 17 MR. HARVEY: I know where it's at.
- 18 I used to dump stuff in Landfill Three when I was an
- 19 enlisted guy.
- MR. KIMBROUGH: And they are having
- 21 a problem with people violating the intruding -- they
- are constantly rebuilding the fences and signs, they
- are fining people on bicycles, joggers, and you see

```
1 where the three kids got lost. They were in a pretty
```

- 2 dangerous area.
- 3 MR. HARVEY: These people riding
- 4 bikes, might ride by a UXO sight.
- 5 MR. KIMBROUGH: And they are
- 6 concerned with that.
- 7 MR. HARVEY: And there is a lot of
- 8 stealing going on, wire, aluminum, copper wire, big
- 9 time.
- 10 MR. KIMBROUGH: And I think they
- 11 haven't spent but like twelve or thirteen million out
- 12 of the forty-eight million, and they've got to do that
- within -- what's the deadline for that?
- MR. HARVEY: I'm not sure.
- MR. KIMBROUGH: Two years and have
- to have it committed and have work plans in place.
- MR. HARVEY: Well, yeah, it was
- 18 supposed to be for the grant. But you go, we sit
- 19 there, you know in the Army, they say you can't do
- 20 this and then you turn the page and it shows you how
- 21 to do it. We redid the grant. Now, the first one was
- 22 by law two years so we had to redo it. And that was a
- 23 big problem then, and nobody realized the

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1 authorization act that authorized the ESCCA, and when
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- 2 he did it for two years, they had to seek legislation.
- 3 And, yeah, they put deadlines on it. I'm not sure
- 4 it's two years, I'll check it. That first one caught
- 5 us all by surprise.
- 6 MR. FRANKLIN: All right. Thank
- 7 you. Any other comments from the audience?
- 8 MS. CHAMPION: I'd like to ask a
- 9 question. Can you get one of those things that you
- 10 set a picture on? Can I get someone to sit one of
- 11 those out so I can sit this up on it. I've been
- working for a little while, and I know from looking on
- 13 the thing, Pete Conroy, and I looked at today's
- 14 newspaper and I seen the meeting for tonight so I said
- I would come on out and surprise Pete, but he's not
- here, but anyway, since all of y'all are, that right
- there, if you will pass it on to Pete Conroy, that
- 18 picture of that bird since he's an avid bird watcher,
- 19 I'm donating that to him for all the work that he does
- for this community and he's not even from the State of
- 21 Alabama. I think it's so inspiring that we have a man
- that does so much for our area. And I'm just so
- impressed with the things Pete Conroy does here. And

- 4 MR. CLENDENIN: Can you identify the
- 5 bird?
- 6 MS. CHAMPION: All I know is a
- 7 friend gave me the picture, and he said that he had
- 8 got the bird and it was injured and he turned it over
- 9 to some group that took the bird and rehealed the wing
- 10 and it was in some, I don't even know if it's still
- 11 alive, but it was in one of them places where they
- 12 recover birds, and he had somehow got the picture
- 13 after the bird had got healed up. And I took it and
- 14 had it framed to give to Pete. And maybe that would
- encourage people to like bird watching in this area,
- and as a token of my appreciation.
- 17 MR. FRANKLIN: On behalf of Pete we
- 18 thank you and know he'll appreciate it. Any other
- 19 comments, questions? Do I hear a motion for
- 20 adjournment?
- MR. MILLER: So moved.
