MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

SUBJECT: US Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) Pre-2015 Regulatory Regime
Approved Jurisdictional Determination in Light of *Sackett v. EPA*, 143 S. Ct. 1322
(2023),¹ SAM-2025-00665-CMS, MFR #1 of #1²

BACKGROUND. An Approved Jurisdictional Determination (AJD) is a Corps document stating the presence or absence of waters of the United States on a parcel or a written statement and map identifying the limits of waters of the United States on a parcel. AJDs are clearly designated appealable actions and will include a basis of JD with the document.³ AJDs are case-specific and are typically made in response to a request. AJDs are valid for a period of five years unless new information warrants revision of the determination before the expiration date or a District Engineer has identified, after public notice and comment, that specific geographic areas with rapidly changing environmental conditions merit re-verification on a more frequent basis.⁴ For the purposes of this AJD, we have relied on section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act of 1899 (RHA),⁵ the Clean Water Act (CWA) implementing regulations published by the Department of the Army in 1986 and amended in 1993 (references 2.a. and 2.b. respectively), the 2008 *Rapanos-Carabell* guidance (reference 2.c.), and other applicable guidance, relevant case law and longstanding practice, (collectively the pre-2015 regulatory regime), and the *Sackett* decision (reference 2.d.) in evaluating jurisdiction.

This Memorandum for Record (MFR) constitutes the basis of jurisdiction for a Corps AJD as defined in 33 CFR §331.2. The features addressed in this AJD were evaluated consistent with the definition of “waters of the United States” found in the pre-2015 regulatory regime and consistent with the Supreme Court’s decision in *Sackett*. This AJD did not rely on the 2023 “Revised Definition of ‘Waters of the United States,’” as

amended on 8 September 2023 (Amended 2023 Rule) because, as of the date of this decision, the Amended 2023 Rule is not applicable in Alabama due to litigation.

3. REVIEW AREA. The review area is comprised of 75 acres located in Section 6, Township 14 South, Range 2 West near Hayden, Blount County, Alabama and is centered at latitude 33.8426, longitude -86.7919.

4. NEAREST TRADITIONAL NAVIGABLE WATER (TNW), INTERSTATE WATER, OR THE TERRITORIAL SEAS TO WHICH THE AQUATIC RESOURCE IS CONNECTED. The nearest TNW is the Locust Fork. The Locust Fork is on the Mobile District's Section 10 waters list beginning near mile marker 22.5. Section 10 waters are a subset of TNWs.⁶

⁶ This MFR should not be used to complete a new stand-alone TNW determination. A stand-alone TNW determination for a water that is not subject to Section 9 or 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act of 1899 (RHA) is completed independently of a request for an AJD. A stand-alone TNW determination is conducted for a specific segment of river or stream or other type of waterbody, such as a lake, where upstream or downstream limits or lake borders are established.

5. FLOWPATH FROM THE SUBJECT AQUATIC RESOURCES TO A TNW, INTERSTATE WATER, OR THE TERRITORIAL SEAS

S1 and S2 exit the review area along the northern review area boundary and flow into Sibleyville Creek just north of the review area. Sibleyville Creek flows approximately 1.25 miles to the east and converges with Hogeland Creek which flows 2.6 miles to the Locust Fork downstream of river mile 61. The Locust Fork becomes Section 10 (TNW) near river mile 22.5.

resource or feature, and how it was determined to be an “isolated water” in accordance with *SWANCC*. N/A

Describe aquatic resources and features within the review area that were determined to be non-jurisdictional because they do not meet one or more categories of waters of the United States under the pre-2015 regulatory regime consistent with the Supreme Court’s decision in *Sackett* (e.g., tributaries that are non-relatively permanent waters; non-tidal wetlands that do not have a continuous surface connection to a jurisdictional water).

S-1 is 804 feet long and approximately 2 feet wide and begins at latitude 33.8425, longitude -86.7960. At the time of the agent’s site visit on August 5, 2025, the area was in the dry season and was experiencing wetter than normal conditions according to the Antecedent Precipitation Tool (APT). The agent’s North Carolina DWQ Stream Identification Form indicates S-1 has a moderate continuity of channel bed and banks, weak sinuosity, lacks evidence of alluvial deposits, depositional bars, baseflow, wrack lines or hydric soils. It scored 11 using the NC DWQ stream identification method, indicating ephemeral, or non-relatively permanent, flow. For these reasons, the Corps has determined S-1 is a non-jurisdictional non-relatively permanent tributary.

S-2 is 205 feet long and approximately 2 feet wide and begins at latitude 33.8429, longitude -86.7940. The agent’s North Carolina DWQ Stream Identification Form indicates S-2 has weak continuity of channel bed and banks, moderate sinuosity, and lacks evidence of depositional bars, headcuts, baseflow, wrack lines or hydric soils. It scored 9 using the NC DWQ stream identification method, indicating ephemeral, or non-relatively permanent, flow. For these reasons, the Corps has determined S-1 is a non-jurisdictional non-relatively permanent tributary.

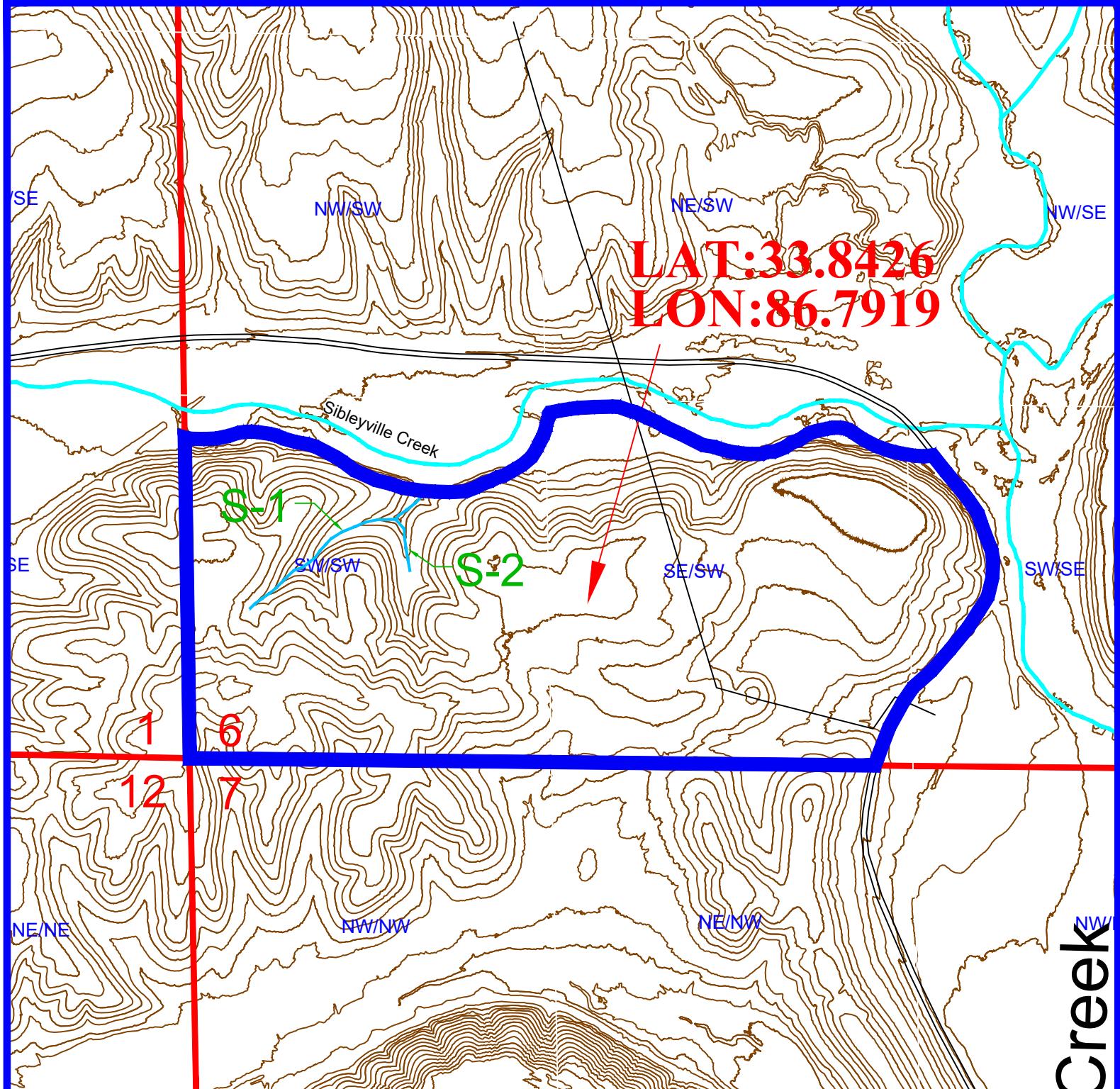
